## Special Consideration in GCSE and GCE: June 2012 Exam Series

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## **Summary**

Awarding organisations must have procedures in place for making adjustments to the marks of candidates who have not been able to demonstrate attainment because of exceptional circumstances. Adjustments may be made for candidates who were present for an assessment but disadvantaged due to temporary injury, illness, indisposition or other unforeseen incident immediately before or during the exams period. Awarding organisations must also have procedures for making a qualification award by special consideration where a candidate has covered the course but is unable through temporary illness, injury or indisposition to be present for the exam of a unit/component and therefore to fulfil all of the usual assessment requirements.

Awarding organisations approved 341,500 requests for special consideration during the June 2012 exam series, representing 2 per cent of the total number of exam scripts completed by candidates.

They received 365,900 requests, of which 93.3 per cent were approved. The approval rate decreased from 95.1 per cent in 2011; the difference is statistically significant. The proportion of requests approved by awarding organisations has declined slightly year on year since 2009.

Of the approvals, 320,200 were for candidates who were present for assessments but disadvantaged in some way (94 per cent of all approvals), and 21,400 were for candidates who were not able to be present for an assessment due to temporary illness, injury or indisposition.

## **Introduction**

This statistical bulletin, published on behalf of the regulators for England, Wales and Northern Ireland, presents data on the number of requests for special consideration approved for GCSE and GCE exams in relation to the June 2012 exams series. These qualifications are offered by six awarding organisations in England, Wales and Northern Ireland:

- Assessment and Qualifications Alliance (AQA)
- Council for the Curriculum, Examinations and Assessment (Northern Ireland) (CCEA)
- Edexcel
- International Curriculum & Assessment Agency (Examinations) ICAAE
- Oxford, Cambridge and RSA Examinations (OCR)
- WJEC.

Please note: figures within this commentary have been rounded to the nearest hundred.

## **About special consideration**

The qualifications covered by this report are regulated by Ofqual, the Welsh Government and the Council for the Curriculum, Examinations and Assessment (CCEA). Each regulator publishes conditions that set out the requirements that the awarding organisations it regulates have to meet. These conditions state that 'An awarding organisation must have in place clear arrangements for Special Consideration to be given to Learners in relation to qualifications which it makes available.' This may be for a student who has temporarily experienced an illness or injury, or some other event outside of their control, which has had, or is reasonably likely to have had a material effect on that student's ability to take an assessment or demonstrate his or her level of attainment in an assessment.

In addition, the *GCSE, GCE, Principal Learning and Project Code of Practice (2011)*<sup>1</sup> aims to promote quality, consistency, accuracy and fairness in assessment and awarding. It helps maintain standards, both within and between awarding organisations, and from year to year. The code lays down agreed principles, processes and practices for the awarding organisations that develop and deliver these qualifications.

Section 7 of the code of practice requires awarding organisations to have procedures for making adjustments to the marks of candidates who have not been able to demonstrate attainment because of exceptional circumstances. Adjustments may be given to candidates who were present for an assessment but disadvantaged due to temporary injury, illness, indisposition or other unforeseen incident immediately before or during the exams period. These procedures allow for only relatively minor adjustments to a candidate's mark: up to 5 per cent of the maximum mark of a question paper. The maximum adjustment is reserved for exceptional cases, such as candidates disadvantaged by the recent death of an immediate family member. Most adjustments for special consideration are smaller, such as a 2 per cent adjustment of the maximum available mark for candidates who have a minor illness on the day of the exam. Each case is assessed on its merits and the decision made by the awarding organisation is based on various factors, which could include the severity of the circumstances, the date of the exam in relation to the circumstances, and the nature of the assessment.

The code also requires awarding organisations to have procedures for making a qualification award by special consideration where a candidate has covered the

course but is unable, through temporary illness, injury or indisposition, to be present for the exam of a unit/component and therefore cannot complete all assessment requirements.

To be eligible for a qualification award by special consideration candidates must have met the following minimum requirements:

- for GCE, normally at least 50 per cent of the total assessment must have been completed.
- for linear GCSEs, with 100 per cent of the assessment at the end of the course of study, 35 per cent of the total assessment must have been completed.
- for modular GCSE specifications, with assessment opportunities throughout the course of study, 50 per cent of the total assessment must have been completed.

The awarding organisations specify the eligibility criteria for special consideration and must ensure that the criteria, application procedures and deadlines are available to schools and colleges.

## Summer 2012 exam series


### Awards made

In the June 2012 exam series, more than 2.4 million GCE A level (AS and A level) awards were made. More than 5.9 million GCSE qualifications were awarded in England, Wales and Northern Ireland during the June 2012 series.

### Scripts

In the June 2012 exam series, 14.4 million scripts were marked (see Table 1 and Figure 1). Figure 1 covers GCE, Applied GCE, GCSE, Applied GCSE, GCSE Short Course and overseas entries. There has been a consistent decrease in the number of scripts in the summer series. The change in structure of qualifications, such as the move from six to four units in A levels and the unitisation of GCSEs, is likely to have contributed to the reductions seen over the past five years.

Figure 1: Total number of scripts marked for GCSE and A level, summer exam series, 2008–12




Special consideration may be applied to a candidate at question paper/script level or in the qualification award.

## Special consideration in 2012

During the June 2012 exam series, 365,900 requests were received for special consideration, a decrease of 1.7 per cent when compared with 2011. This decrease in requests for special consideration was in the context of a 5 per cent decrease in the total number of exams taken by candidates in summer 2012 when compared with summer 2011 (see Table 2 and Figure 2).


Awarding organisations approved 341,500 requests for special consideration, representing 93.3 per cent of requests received. The approval rate decreased from 95.1 per cent in 2011; the difference is statistically significant.

The requests approved for special consideration represent 2.4 per cent of the total number of scripts marked during the June 2012 exam series. This is consistent with 2011 (see Figure 3).

These figures represent the number of requests for special consideration rather than the number of candidates. This is because an individual candidate may require special consideration for a number of exam papers and is likely to take exams with more than one awarding organisation for which the same special consideration may be appropriate. Special consideration needs to be requested from each awarding organisation separately.

### **The two categories of special consideration**

A breakdown of figures for the two types of special consideration has been included in the report (see Table 3) and covers:

- those candidates who were present for an assessment but disadvantaged in some way
- those who could not be present to complete all of the normal assessment requirements.

This is the second year this data has been collected with a breakdown based on these two categories. Overall, the percentage of special consideration requests that resulted in extra marks being granted where candidates were present for assessments was 93.7 per cent, compared with 92.3 per cent in 2011. Of the overall special consideration requests granted, 6.3 per cent were for candidates who could

not be present for part of the assessment, compared with 7.7 per cent of the special consideration requests granted last year.

### **Special consideration requests resulting in mark adjustments**

The procedures allow for relatively minor adjustments to a candidate's mark: up to 5 per cent of the maximum mark of a question paper. The maximum adjustment is reserved for exceptional cases, such as for candidates disadvantaged by the recent death of an immediate family member.

For the 2012 data, awarding organisations have reported a breakdown of the figures showing the extent of mark adjustments made as the result of special consideration requests (see Table 4).

The most frequent mark adjustment was for marks worth 3 per cent of the total marks available for the exam to be added to a candidate's overall score. Of the 321,400 approved requests resulting in a mark adjustment:

- 17 per cent resulted in a 1 per cent mark adjustment,
- 25 per cent resulted in a 2 per cent mark adjustment,
- 26 per cent resulted in a 3 per cent mark adjustment,
- 21 per cent resulted in a 4 per cent mark adjustment, and
- 8 per cent resulted in a 5 per cent mark adjustment.

In 3 per cent of cases, no extra marks were allocated, where the request was considered valid by the awarding organisation, but due to the total mark of the exam concerned and the nature of the disadvantage experienced, mark adjustment was not appropriate (see Table 4).
