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Explanatory note

Introduction

This explanatory note sets out the background details behind the figures in your Funding Factors statement for the 2014 to 2015 academic year (2014/15). This is the first step towards calculating your 2014/15 funding allocation, which we will communicate to you by the end of March.

Purpose

We are providing this information now so that you have an opportunity to check and comment on it, or raise any queries you may have. Any queries should be raised with us as soon as possible and at the latest by the end of January 2014. The information in the statement will also give you an initial basis on which to plan.

Policy implementation

Peter Mucklow's letter of 10 December 2013 sets out the main policy changes for 2014/15. The main change reflected in this statement is the funding for 18-year olds, and more detail is given on this below. The letter can be found on our website.

Funding formula changes

As in previous years, your funding allocation for 2014/15 will be based on lagged student numbers. We will confirm your lagged student numbers to you in spring 2014. This statement includes the other factors which affect your funding for 2014/15. A box-by-box explanation of the numbers in the statement is given in annex A.

18-year olds

Ministers have decided to make the savings required in 2014/15 by reducing the participation requirements for full-time 18-year-olds, as defined by their age at the start of the academic year. From 2014/15, we will return to the previous definition of full-time for these students as was applied in 2012/13 and fund them in funding band 4 (450-539 hours) as a maximum. This means the funding rate for full-time 18-year-old students in 2014/15 will be 17.5% below the rate for full-time 16- and 17-year-olds. Students with a learning difficulty assessment or a statement of special educational needs will not be affected by this change.

The data on programme size on the funding factor statements shows the split between 16 and 17 year olds (including students aged 18 or over with high cost ALS – as a proxy for those with an LDA) and students aged 18 or over (without high cost ALS). For the

allocation for 2014/15 students aged 18+ without an LDA will be funded at a maximum of band 4 (450-539 hours) – that is any students in band 5 in the data for 2012/13 will be treated as in band 4 for the purposes of the allocation. Conversely, students aged 16 or 17 (or 18+ with an LDA) in band 4 will be treated as the equivalent of band 5 for the purposes of the 2014/15 allocation, as was done in 2013/14. Explanatory diagrams showing how the bandings for 450-539 hours and 540+ hours will work are included in Annex B.

Programme cost weightings

Following the review earlier this year, we have now confirmed that the programme cost weightings for 2014/15 are unchanged from those used in allocations for 2013/14. A <u>list of programme cost weightings</u> is given in the funding guidance for 2013/14 on our website.

Allocations calculation toolkit (ACT)

This year the funding factor statements also include a comparison with the equivalent figures for 2013/14, to allow you to see whether there are any significant changes year-on-year. As for 2013/14, we have produced an allocations calculation toolkit (ACT). This explains how we have used your data to arrive at some of the key figures in the statement. It does not include data on area cost, care leavers or disadvantage block 2. We are not distributing the toolkit routinely, as it is unlikely to be of interest to every institution particularly where factors are very similar year-on-year, but we will provide it on request through the contact details listed below.

Next steps

If you have any queries or wish to raise any issues with the figures in your funding factor statement, please raise them with us as soon as possible and at the latest by the end of January 2014. This will allow us to take into account any issues you raise as we finalise your 16-19 allocation. Issues raised after this date may not be taken into account for your 2014/15 allocation.

The next steps in the allocation process and the procedures for handling business cases will follow the timeline set out in Peter Mucklow's letter of 10 December. In particular, in mid-January we will confirm to colleges, and any other institutions normally funded on the basis of R04 data, the numbers that we have calculated from the R04 return. This will allow those institutions time to check their data and ensure that all issues with this figure are fully resolved before the R06 return in early February.

We will then calculate an R04 equivalent figure (using the 1 November reference date) based on the R06 data and confirm that to institutions in March. We will also confirm in March the lagged numbers for those institutions (mainly commercial and charitable providers) funded on a rolling twelve-month figure based on R06.

We will confirm your funding allocation to you by the end of March 2014.

Table 1: Distribution of Students by funding band

| Title | Comments |

| Proportions in 2013/14 allocation | The percentage of students in each band in the 2013/14 allocation. This is usually based on 2011/12 data, but will include the effect of any agreed business cases, where applicable |
| Starting point for 2014/15 allocation (student number percentages in 2012/13) | The proportion of students in each band in 2012/13 based on ILR return R14. The first figure is the total percentage in the band, for comparison to the 2013/14 allocation. |
| | This is then split into students aged 16 and 17 and those aged 18+. Students aged 18+ with high needs (flagged as having additional support costs >£5,500) are included with 16 and 17 year olds. |
| | All of the percentages relate to the total number of students across both age bands. For example, consider a college that had 100 students in total of whom 45 were in band 5. 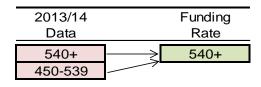

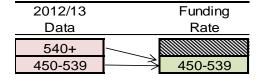

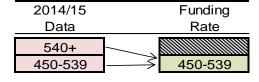

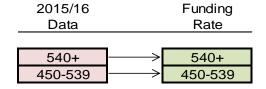
Single rate for all students with 450+ hours in both allocations and outturn

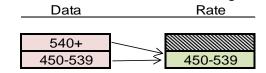
New system fully in place. Now using 2013/14 data in allocations, so no longer make an assumption about increased programme size for 450-539 band
