

# Destination Measures 2010/11 and 2011/12

Impact Indicator [12]: Percentage of children on free school meals progressing to Oxford or Cambridge University

#### About the indicator

This indicator measures the percentage of children who were eligible for free school meals in year 11 who took A levels or other level 3 qualifications and then progressed to Oxford or Cambridge University.

#### Why we measure it

The Government believes that progression to higher education can advance social mobility. This means ensuring that every child – regardless of their background, their circumstances or their social class has an equal opportunity to progress to Britain's top universities, including Oxford and Cambridge. This indicator will show if the government's education policies are raising standards and aspirations so that more disadvantaged young people are able to go to Oxford and Cambridge University.

### The data
