Higher Education enrolments have increased over the period 2013/14 to 2017/18....

Higher Education enrolments at FE colleges have increased by a net 2.3% (272), from 11,576 in 2013/14 to 11,848 in 2017/18.

....although fewer qualifications have been awarded.

Fewer qualifications were awarded in FE colleges in 2017/18 (82,770) than in 2013/14 (90,851), a net fall of 8.9% (8,081). Net decreases occurred in five colleges [NWRC (22.0%), SWC (18.6%), BMC (9.3%), SERC (6.6%) and NRC (3.2%)].

Proportionately more people are staying on and completing their course.....

Over the period 2013/14 to 2017/18, the retention rate at FE colleges has increased by 1.2 percentage points, from 89.1% to 90.3%.

....but fewer people who complete their course are achieving their qualification. The achievement rate at FE colleges has fallen by 1.8 percentage points, from 87.1% (2013/14) to 85.3% (2017/18).

The success rate (that is, the proportion of students staying on their course and achieving a qualification) fell by a net 0.6 percentage points, from 77.6% to 77.0%, over the period 2013/14 to 2017/18.
