#### Introduction

Amendment	All published funding rates on LARS are the fully-funded rates for learners aged 19-23. As apprenticeship methodology uses a historic rate-setting method, some programme weightings appear that are not used in the matrix of rates shown in paragraph 31 - these weightings are F (1.4), H (1.2), J (1.25), K (1.5) and L (1.15. The earnings in the table above have been calculated according to the principles in paragraph 23, with a 7.23% increase in funding for learners aged 16 to 18 and a 20% reduction in funding for learners aged 24 or older. The calculations are shown below.						

### Changes from the 2014 to 2015 document to the 2015 to 2016 version 1 document

- This section sets out the changes to the Funding rates and formula 2015 to 2016 version 1 document from the 2014 to 2015 version.
- 4. The funding matrix, on which all rates are based, will remain unchanged from 2014 to 2015. Apprenticeship framework rates will remain unchanged for 2014 to 2015. The Trailblazer standards funding model is being trialled in 2014 to 2015 and this trial will continue into 2015 to 2016.
- 5. Minor amendments to text, applied for purposes of clarity or simplification, are not included within the amendments and additions detailed below.
