Introduction

This guide outlines useful sources of information for adult learners in relation to Undergraduate and Postgraduate Study.

Welsh Government

Funding for the Higher Education (HE) Sector in Wales is provided by the **Welsh Government** through the **Higher Education Funding Council for Wales (HEFCW)**, whilst support for students is administered by **Student Finance Wales**.

The Welsh Government has produced a general funding guide which is available from their website entitled: **A Guide to Funding for Adult Learners**. The link provided displays the latest sources of financial assistance available to students wishing to continue on to Higher Education.

Student Finance Wales

Student Finance Wales provides students with the financial support and information they need to enter in to Higher Education. Funding available will be dependent on the set eligibility criteria.

Funding available through Student Finance Wales includes:

For full-time study:

- Tuition fee support
- Maintenance loan
- Welsh Government learning grant
- Special support grant
- Additional support (learners with a disability or for students with caring responsibilities)

For part-time study:

- Tuition fee support
- Course grant
- Additional support (learners with a disability or for students with caring responsibilities)

The Student Finance Wales website has a **student finance calculator** which can provide students with estimates of how much support they could receive.

The website also provides students with information and guidance on applying, including the correct forms needed to make an application for funding.

Research Councils

There are seven Research Councils in the UK. Each Research Council has their own portfolio which covers a variety of subjects ranging from the medical and biological sciences to astronomy, physics, chemistry and engineering, social sciences, economics, environmental sciences and the arts and humanities.

The seven Research Councils are:

- The Arts and Humanities Research Council
- The Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council
- The Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council
- The Economic and Social Research Council
- The UK Medical Research Council
- Natural Environment Research Council
- The Science and Technology Facilities Council

All the research councils consider funding individual postgraduates, although funding from any research council is competitive, and getting a place on a postgraduate programme does not entitle a student to an award. National Postgraduate Committee (NPC)

The National Postgraduate Committee is a registered charity dedicated to the advancement of postgraduate education in the United Kingdom. The NPC's activities do not include financial sponsorship of individuals or of courses but they have a section on the website which contains information and outlines sources of **financial assistance** available to Postgraduates studying in the UK.

Subject Specific Support

Law

The **Law Society** represents solicitors across England and Wales. The society provides a variety of support including negotiating with and lobbying regulators, government and others and offers training and advice. The Law Society also operates a Diversity Access Scheme offering assistance with fees for the Legal Practice Course (LPC) to exceptional aspiring entrants to the solicitors' profession. Social Work

The Care Council for Wales launched the **Social Work Bursary Scheme** in 2004 as an incentive to train for Social Work students.

The Bursary is open to Undergraduate and Postgraduate students.

The scheme offers eligible Undergraduate and Postgraduate students a non-income assessed bursary and a practice learning opportunity allowance.

Postgraduate students may also be eligible to apply for the following:

Income assessed Child Care Grant

- Income Assessed Parents Learning Allowance
- Income Assessed Adult Dependents Grant
- Disabled Students Allowance

NHS Bursaries

The NHS Wales Student Award Unit implements the NHS Wales Bursary Schemes, which provides funding for healthcare students on NHS funded courses in Wales and Welsh domiciled medical and dental students within the UK. Further information can be seen on their [website](#).

Association of Accounting Technicians

The Association of Accounting Technicians (AAT) is the UK's leading qualification and membership body for accounting and finance staff. They award vocational qualifications in accounting and are sponsored by the following professional accountancy bodies CIPFA, ICAEW, CIMA and ICAS.

The AAT has over 125,000 members in more than 90 countries worldwide including students, people working in accountancy, and self-employed business owners.

They offer support to their members through AAT approved training providers and have a branch network offering support and training. The AAT doesn't source funding but signposts other sources of **financial support** available to people who wish to undertake training.

Initial Teacher Training

The Welsh Government provides incentives for those undertaking Initial Teacher Training. The incentives are announced annually. Further information can be seen on the [Teacher Training & Education in Wales](#) website.

Professional and Career Development Loan (PCDL)

Professional and Career Development Loans (PCDLs) are available to anyone aged 18 or over wishing to undertake a course or training which will equip the applicant with the skills needed for an occupation, trade or profession.

PCDLs are available for full-time or part-time learning and loans of between £300 and £10,000 can be borrowed. The PCDLs are available from three high street banks participating in the scheme. Charities, Trusts & Funding Resources

Set out below are several charities, trusts and foundations that aim to provide support to individuals wishing to continue in to Higher Education.

The **Thomas Wall Trust** provides grants to students who are in financial need and who wish to undertake educational courses at any level and duration, especially courses which are vocational or are concerned with social service in a broad sense and which will lead to paid employment.

The **Sidney Perry Foundation** primarily helps first-degree students, but does award to second degree courses that are related to first degrees. It provides financial assistance to individuals of great promise of either sex who would otherwise be unable through lack of means to proceed with their education. Students must be younger than 35 when the course starts.

The **Lawrence Atwell's Charity** provides financial support in the form of grants and loans to young people aged between 16 and 26 based in the UK.

Financial support is available to help towards the cost of vocational training or equipment that is essential for work. The charity's aim is to assist young people who come from a low-income background to become qualified or equipped to work in their chosen career. The **James Pantyfedwen Foundation** objectives are the advancement, encouragement and promotion of religion and education in Wales, and other charitable purposes for the benefit of Welsh people, including Eisteddfodau, churches, Sunday schools and students (mainly postgraduate).

Turn2Us is a charitable service which offers a similar service helping people locate and access appropriate sources of financial support based on their particular needs and circumstances. Turn2us's funding database can help people find information on Welfare Benefits, Grants, Benevolent funds and other help.
