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## Primary assessment

### Information: P scales remain statutory for the 2016 to 2017 academic year

On 19 October, we published the [Rochford Review](#) report, which makes recommendations for assessment arrangements of those pupils working below the standard of the national curriculum tests.

The report's recommendations include removal of the statutory requirement to use P scales to assess pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), who are working below the overall standard of the national curriculum assessments. We will consult on the report's recommendations in early 2017 and final decisions will be made following that consultation.


In the meantime, schools should continue to use [P scales](#) in 2017, for statutory assessment of pupils with SEND who are working below the standard of the interim pre-key stage standards.

### Publication: provisional key stage 2 marking review outcomes

On 3 November, we published [provisional information](#) on the outcomes of clerical reviews and reviews of marking for the 2016 key stage 2 tests.

Fewer than 2 per cent of more than 1.7 million tests marked were submitted for review and, of those, fewer than 1 in 10 were successful.
