As parents or carers, you may be contacted to help identify close contacts. Children under the age of 18 are no longer required to self-isolate if they're contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case or they live in the same household as someone with COVID-19. Staff who do not need to isolate, and children and young people aged under 18 years 6

months who usually attend school, and have been identified as a close contact, should continue to attend school as normal. They do not need to wear a face covering within the school, but it is expected and recommended that these are worn when travelling on public or dedicated transport.
