Savings in time and workload

By providing one access point to all the data and information that teachers need

Professional development

Through peer-group networks and online research databases

Easier transitions

Less disruptive transitions between institutions as a result of easier exchange of information

Reduced administration overheads

All aspects of running a school are linked: the learning environment, management of information, registration, catering and the library

By March 2008 all local authorities will be offering their schools access to a personal online learning space.

A personal online learning space supports learning through a range of systems:

- Tools such as email, messaging, forums, wikis and blogs to support communication and collaboration
- An area personal to the user, for storing files and data
- Tools to support the creation, development and management of digital content
- Safe and secure anytime, anywhere access.

By March 2010 all schools should be using a learning platform. This is a system that incorporates all of the tools listed above whilst also integrating with the school's information management system (or MIS).

Learning platforms have taken education beyond the classroom walls. Class material and coursework can be accessed 'anytime, anywhere' and students can communicate and collaborate in a safe online environment.

Benefits for learners

Learners can take a more active part in their education

Learning at a pace that suits the individual's capacity and needs

Anytime, anywhere learning

Email and internet access enable students to submit homework, as well as view timetables and outstanding tasks from home, with parent involvement

Secure environment

Safe and secure access to protect users and their data, as well as to prevent bullying

Re-engaging disaffected learners

Instant messenger technology allows students to collaborate in a familiar setting (such as social networking) and the use of mobile phones and games consoles to connect with their learning environment

Benefits for both teachers and learners

Collaboration

Having a personal online learning space encourages collaborative working both within and between institutions for teachers as well as learners

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"You can ... send ideas to your friends. You can also send a message to the teacher and ask for help when you are stuck on a part of your coursework. I use my e-portfolio to send work there and back to my teacher. It is effective as my teacher can then review my work or help me with issues I am stuck on."
