# Access Funds 1999-2000

# Introduction

1 This circular details the provisional allocation of access funds to sector colleges and external institutions for the 1999-2000 teaching year.

## Background

2 The Department of Education and Employment (DfEE) has allocated access funds in 1999-2000 amounting to £36.1 million for distribution to colleges in the further education sector and to external institutions. This is an increase of £24.56 million from the £11.54 million allocated in 1998-99. Funds are also available to support childcare costs for further education students and for a scheme of residential bursaries. These are described in separate Council circulars.

3 The number of eligible students has been based on the ISR12 (1 November 1998: 1998-99) return, or latest data where this has not yet been provided. For 1999-2000, the DfEE has agreed to extend access funds to eligible further education students aged 16–18 and to students in external institutions. The Council has, therefore, included 16–18 year-old students in the eligibility criteria and has converted them to full-time equivalent student numbers (FTEs) by dividing their guided learning hours by 660, the estimated average for full-time students.

4 The Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE) has also transferred to the Council a sum of £1.258 million from its access funds allocation. These funds are to support part-time HE students attending further education colleges who are in receipt of benefits, and also to support the payment of fees for part-time HE students who lose their job through no fault of their own. For the purpose of access fund support, the HEFCE defines a part-time HE student as a student who is working to a minimum of 60 credit points in a teaching year where the full-time equivalent is 120 credit points, or 50% of a course in other schemes.

5 In 1999-2000 local education authorities (LEAs) will retain responsibility for discretionary awards for further education students eligible for awards in 1998-99. LEAs will also retain responsibility for financial support for transport costs for FE students.

### **Basis of distribution**

Ministers have issued guidance to the Council 6 on the use of access funds for 1999-2000. Ministers wish to focus help through access funds on those in greatest need. To do so, they have increased the weight to be given to widening participation in the allocation of funds between colleges. Within the general context of widening participation, ministers also wish to see allocations used to give special priority to groups identified by the social exclusion unit as potentially excluded from further education. These groups include students who have been in care, on probation, or are otherwise considered to be at risk, and also students who reach the age of 19 before they complete their GCE A level or other further education courses. These students face particular financial difficulties because their families will cease to receive child benefit and dependency additions in social security benefits from their nineteenth birthday.

7 In line with the guidance from ministers, the various elements of the total access funds allocation for 1999-2000 of £37.41 million have been distributed among colleges and external institutions according to the following criteria:

- £5.26 million for 16–18 year olds
   This has been distributed on the basis of
   full-time equivalent numbers of students
   aged 16–18. Eligible student numbers
   include both full-time and part-time
   students. The provisional rate is £10.96
   per FTE. Allocations to colleges recruiting
   students eligible for education
   maintenance allowances (EMAs) will be
   based on student numbers excluding
   estimates of 16 year olds from EMA pilot
   areas (see paragraph 9 below.)
- £10.55 million for adult students This has been distributed on the basis of full-time equivalent numbers of adult students. Eligible student numbers include both full-time and part-time students. The provisional rate is £29.51 per FTE

- £19.3 million for widening participation This has been distributed on the basis of colleges' proportionate shares of the funds provided in respect of widening participation (WP) factors. The provisional rate is £7.72 per unit
- £1 million for external institutions
   Half of this sum (£500,000) has been allocated on the basis of FTEs including both full-time and part-time students.
   The provisional rate is £18.98 per FTE.
   The remainder has been distributed on the basis of external institutions' shares of the funds provided in respect of widening participation. The provisional rate is £4.68 per unit
- Funds of £1.258 million transferred from the HEFCE

This has been allocated on the basis of eligible part-time HE student numbers to recognise the purposes for which they have been provided. The provisional rate is £464.40 per FTE.

8 The student number data have been taken from the ISR12 (1 November 1998: 1998-99) return. Where these have not yet been provided to the Council, the latest available data have been used. Any data subsequently received by the Council will not be used, since this would further delay the access funds allocations for the 1999-2000 teaching year.

## **EMAs**

9 From September 1999, the government is piloting a scheme of education maintenance allowances (EMAs) in 12 areas of England. The LEAs participating in the scheme are listed in annex G. In 1999-2000, EMAs will be paid to eligible 16 year olds in the pilot areas. Such students are not entitled to further support through access funds except in an emergency by way of a loan. In allocating access funds between colleges, the Council has, therefore, not counted 16 year olds from pilot areas (other than South London or Leeds). The Council has deducted numbers for such students from college FTE totals on the basis of forecast patterns of recruitment from each LEA area. In South London and Leeds, only certain students within the relevant age cohort will be eligible for EMAs. As the pattern of EMAs in relation to college

attendance is not entirely clear at this stage, the Council has not made any adjustment for the availability of EMAs in these areas in allocating access funds for 1999-2000 to colleges.

# **Reallocation of Funds**

10 Colleges which return their monitoring information (annex D) by the due date of 25 August 2000, and have shown in annex D that they have distributed additional funds from their own resources, may be eligible for a share of any unused funds returned to the Council. It is anticipated that this redistribution will take place in October 2000.

11 The position regarding the effect of student support for those on benefits is unchanged. Under the relevant regulations, the following types of expenditure are normally disregarded, and therefore not deducted from benefits:

- tuition fees
- examination fees
- travel based on real costs
- allowances for books and equipment.

Any payments made by colleges to students in respect of the following may be deducted from benefits:

- registration fees
- childcare
- visits/field trips.

Support for students to help them with the costs incurred in studying made 'in kind' will not normally be offset against benefits. Institutions should, therefore, make payments for registration fees, childcare and visits/field trips direct to a third party in kind to avoid students' social security benefits being reduced under the social security regulations.

12 Colleges are advised that the following changes have been made for 1999-2000 to the arrangements for access funds:

• funds for part-time HE students are to support the payment of fee remission to such students who lose employment which they rely on for maintenance during their course and for part-time HE students who are in receipt of benefits

- by the end of each teaching year, the Council will require each institution to show how grant for access funds was used in that year and its contribution to improving college access and retention and the national learning targets
- students receiving an EMA will not be eligible for access funds; however, emergency payments may be made to these students, but the payment must be treated as a loan
- colleges and institutions will have discretion to provide bursaries to students in the absence of discretionary awards
- colleges may use up to 5% of their access funds allocation towards administration costs (see paragraph 18 below).

# Allocations

13 The allocations shown in annex A are provisional and may be amended once the enrolment data have been validated.

# **Payments**

14 The DfEE has set terms and conditions under which access funds may be paid and these are set out in annex B. Failure to comply with the terms and conditions could result in access funds being withheld from the Council or individual colleges. Some changes have been made to the terms and conditions this year. These are outlined in paragraph 12 above, and are included in annex B.

15 Before access funds may be paid to a college or institution, the Council must receive a completed copy of the certificate included in annex C to confirm that the institution accepts the allocation made and will comply with the terms and conditions. Institutions which return a completed certificate by 30 July will receive half their allocation during August; 25% of the allocation will then be paid in December and the remaining 25% in March 2000.

16 It is open to a college or institution to decline the allocation offered if it considers that the level of the allocation is such that the administrative burden of complying with the terms and conditions outweighs the possible benefit to students. Colleges or institutions declining their allocations are asked to complete an annex C certificate. 17 As in previous years, to comply with the terms and conditions, colleges and institutions should have administrative procedures to:

- record the details of student applications for support through access funds
- account for the access funds distributed
- identify funds, including interest, which remain unspent at the end of the teaching year.

18 Colleges may use up to 5% of their access funds allocation towards administration costs. Where it has been agreed that a large college or institution will administer a small college's access funds for them, the larger college or institution will also be able to use up to 5% of the smaller institution's access funds for administration. Interest earned on an institution's access funds account may be used to defray audit costs.

19 Colleges and institutions are not required to maintain their access fund allocation in a separate interest-bearing bank account. However, colleges should ensure that administrative procedures exist to ensure that appropriate interest is identified and recorded. Bank charges may not be deducted from the access funds grant.

20 The secretary of state for education and employment requires colleges and institutions to provide information detailing how the funds were spent in 1999-2000. For this purpose, a form is provided in annex D for colleges or institutions to photocopy, complete and return to the Council by 25 August 2000.

21 Funds identified by colleges as undistributed at the end of the teaching year will be recovered by the Council from the normal monthly payments to the college. For 1999-2000, recovery of such funds will be made in October 2000.

# **Guidance to Institutions**

22 The terms and conditions attached to the payment of access funds gives colleges discretion in the use of funds. Guidance notes which amplify and explain the terms and conditions have been prepared by the DfEE and are published in annex E to this circular. The guidance has been amended for 1999-2000 to reflect the requirement for institutions to take account of the eligibility criteria and the secretary of state's priorities as set out in paragraph 3 of annex B. 23 Colleges and institutions should provide full information to students about any extra costs of courses before students enrol. Colleges and institutions should develop and publicise application, decision-making and appeal processes for access funds which are fair, transparent and effective. Colleges and institutions should aim to make this information available to students both at the college or institution and through their local careers service.

24 Each year, officials from the DfEE visit a selection of colleges to identify how the funds are distributed to students. Examples of good management practice identified by the DfEE are listed in annex F.

# **Key Dates**

25 Table 1 lists key dates and action required by those dates. Failure to observe these dates could lead to funds being recovered from the college or prevent or delay funds being made available.

## **Unspent Funds**

26 If, during the course of the teaching year, a college or institution considers that it will be unable to spend part of its access fund allocation, it is asked to contact the Council and arrange to repay funds which are not required. The Council will then be able to distribute these funds to other colleges which can make use of additional access funds. Colleges or institutions which do not comply with this request may prejudice their future eligibility to access funds.

27 Colleges or institutions which supplement their access fund allocation from their own resources during the year, and return the monitoring information (annex D) reflecting their expenditure by 25 August 2000, may be considered for a share of any funds which are returned to the Council following the year-end. It is anticipated that this redistribution will be made in November 2000.

## Terms and Conditions for the Payment of Access Funds 1999-2000

### Introduction

1 These terms and conditions have been approved by the secretary of state for education and employment and are in addition to those set out within the Council's financial memorandum with colleges.

### **Purpose of the Fund**

2 Any grant for access funds is paid by the Council to colleges or institutions so that they may provide financial help to students whose access to, or completion of, further or higher education might be inhibited by financial considerations or who, for whatever reason including physical or other disabilities, face financial difficulties. An element of the grant is also intended to support the payment of fee remission to part-time HE students who lose employment which they rely on for maintenance during their courses and for part-time HE students who are in receipt of benefits.

### **Eligible Students**

3 The grant must be used for the following groups:

- further education students all home students except those 16–18 year olds living in educational maintenance allowance (EMA) pilot areas (listed in annex G), following full-time (including sandwich) or part-time courses of further education who are aged 16 or over, subject to the final bullet point below (including those in adult education)
- higher education students all home students following full-time or part-time (including sandwich) courses of higher education other than postgraduates, subject to the next bullet point

- in cases of severe hardship, postgraduates

   all home students following full-time courses of higher education studying at levels above first degree
- in each case, 'home students' means persons who satisfy the residence conditions of eligibility for a student loan specified in regulation 4(1) of the *Education (Student Support) Regulations* 1999. They include European Economic Area migrant workers, their spouses and children. Further guidance is given in annex E below.

4 Students currently in year 11 in EMA pilot areas will have no entitlement to access funds. However, emergency payments may be made to these students but the payment must be treated as a loan.

5 Grant shall not be used to assist students who are eligible for a student loan in an academic year but who have chosen not to apply for one. In addition, grant shall not be used to assist new students from 1999-2000 onwards if they have not applied for their full entitlement to a student loan. Grant should not normally be used to assist students eligible for a hardship loan unless they have applied for such a loan. Institutions may also decide to make an access funds payment instead of, or as well as, a hardship loan if they judge it appropriate.

6 In addition, for these purposes, 'home students' referred to in paragraph 3 above shall include students who started their courses prior to September 1995 and are in receipt of LEA discretionary awards under section 1(6) of the *Education Act 1962* (that is, those who do not meet the normal residency requirement or the requirements on previous study or are otherwise personally ineligible for a mandatory award).

7 In respect of support for part-time FE and HE students, priority should be given to students who demonstrate high levels of commitment to learning through regular and significant attendance patterns and for whom part-time attendance is necessary in the light of their learning needs, family or financial commitments.

8 Support in respect of tuition fee remission for part-time undergraduate students is available for students who have lost their jobs, provided they are able to show they were employed or self-employed for at least 20 hours a week when they entered higher education. Such students must have been working for a minimum of six months before losing their job or ceasing to be employed through no fault of their own. Access funds should not be used to contribute to the £1,025 tuition fee that HE students are required to pay in any other circumstances. Part-time HE students who are in receipt of benefits may be entitled to a fee waiver.

### **New Deal Students**

9 New Deal participants are not eligible for access fund payments as their funding should take account of the associated costs of participation to the student.

### Conditions

10 The Council will pay access funds to colleges and institutions subject to the following conditions:

- subject to paragraphs 11 and 12, the grant may only be used for the purposes described in paragraph 2
- the grant must be paid for the benefit of eligible students as defined in paragraphs 3 to 8
- the use of any interest earned from the access funds is subject to the terms and conditions set out in this annex
- the college or institution is required to provide to the Council by 25 August 2000 the monitoring information on the form in annex D, and any other relevant information as and when requested by the Council
- the interest on such grant may be used to defray audit costs.

### **Audit Requirements**

11 Colleges and higher education institutions must provide audited accounts at the end of each teaching year to show that the grant was used in that year. This will normally be achieved by the inclusion of an appropriate note within the college's audited accounts. Council Circular 99/23 is the Council's most recent statement on sector accounting policies. Supplement B to that circular is a specimen annual report. A sample note on the use of access funds in 1998-99 appears on page 18 of that supplement. The small number of colleges or institutions which require a separate audit certificate for access funds can use interest earned from such funds to defray audit costs.

12 For external institutions, the Council is most likely to require confirmation as to the use of the grant in the annual use of funds statement. Institutions should, therefore, maintain financial records to allow this to be done.

### Revision

13 The Council may revise, revoke or add to any of these terms and conditions after consultation with the secretary of state.

### Interpretation

14 Any matters arising from the interpretation of these arrangements will be resolved by the Council after consultation with the secretary of state.

### Appeals

15 Each institution should resolve internally any appeals from, or disputes with, individual students about the award and payment from the access funds or residential bursaries. Appeals should not be referred to the secretary of state or DfEE. Students applying for access funds must be informed about arrangements for appeals (see paragraph 23 in the main body of this circular). Annex C

## **Guidance Notes:** Access Funds for Further Education

### Introduction

1 These notes are based on guidance issued by the DfEE to the Council for 1999-2000 and are intended to help colleges to administer access funds effectively within the terms and conditions of the scheme.

### **Eligible Students**

2 Access funds can only be paid to eligible students as defined in the terms and conditions.

3 To qualify as a 'home student' a student must satisfy the residence conditions of eligibility for a student loan specified in regulation 4(1) of the Education (Student Support) Regulations 1999 or, where applicable, the equivalent categories in the Education (Student Loans) (Scotland) Regulations 1999 or the Education (Student Support) (Northern Ireland) Regulations 1999. They include EEA migrant workers, their spouses and children. This usually means that they must have been 'ordinarily resident' in the British Isles for the three years before their course began. Colleges and institutions will need to consider eligibility for all students carefully. Paragraphs 19 to 29 below give further guidance on this matter.

### **Disbursement of Funds**

4 It will be for each college to decide its criteria and procedures for considering applications and making payments to eligible students, subject to the DfEE's terms and conditions and any other guidance given by the Council.

5 Access funds are intended to provide support to students in cases where a need is established, and payments should therefore be made according to individual needs. Support may be provided in cash direct to the student or to a third party, or through the provision of items or services, and may be in the form of a grant or repayable loan. Colleges will have discretion to provide bursaries to students in the absence of discretionary awards (for example, £300 a year which was the average rate for LEA discretionary student awards). Access funds should not be used to provide group or communal facilities, or to adapt buildings. Large items of equipment bought for the use of an individual should remain the property of the institution.

6 When setting up arrangements for paying access funds, colleges will have to determine which factors to take into account. When they consider applications, colleges may wish to take account of the availability of support from other sources, for example:

- mandatory or discretionary student awards
- social security benefits
- payments through career development loans, and similar schemes
- support for transport provided by the student's LEA
- means-tested student fees and loans for those undertaking HE courses
- students with individual learning accounts (ILAs) must give full details of the use of government monies within their ILA when making a claim for access funds (and vice versa) to ensure that double funding does not occur.

7 Institutions must also consider whether the claimed deficit between income and expenditure constitutes real need and cannot reasonably be reduced to a manageable level by the action of the student.

8 Access funds may not be paid to students on higher education courses if their circumstances are not regarded as exceptional or sufficiently difficult. This may arise, for example, if a student has not taken out a student loan or hardship loan, even if entitled to do so.

9 Colleges and institutions should decide in each case, with reference to the incidence of expenditure, whether payments would most appropriately be made as grants or as loans, and as a lump sum or regular instalments, and whether conditions should be attached to payments.

10 Colleges may use up to 5% of their access funds allocation towards administration costs. Where it has been agreed that a large college or institution will administer a small college's access funds for them, the larger college or institution will also be able to use up to 5% of the smaller institution's access funds for administration. Interest earned on an institution's access funds account may be used to defray audit costs.

11 Any amounts above £50 not spent by the end of the teaching year should be returned to the Council for onward payment to the secretary of state.

12 Colleges and institutions should aim to process applications for access funds within four weeks. Where applications are considered at particular times during the year, the dates should be published as far as possible.

### **Advice to Students**

13 Colleges should ensure that students seeking access funds are advised that payments may have implications for their entitlement to social security benefits, particularly income support, housing benefit, family credit and certain payments from the Social Fund. Institutions should make payments for childcare, registration fees and visits/field trips, direct to a third party in kind, to avoid students' social security benefits being reduced under social security regulations.

14 Under arrangements which came into effect from 6 April 1992, students (whether or not they pay income tax) may take advantage of arrangements between the Inland Revenue and colleges to deduct basic rate tax relief at source from payments made for course fees, registration and examination fees, fees payable for assessment purposes (including assessment of prior learning), and for any consequent award or certificate, or entry in an official register. Basic rate relief will be given at source for payments made by individuals for training which can count towards a national vocational qualification (NVQ). Higher rate taxpayers cannot claim further tax relief on payments made on or after 6 April 1999. From 6 May 1996 tax relief is also available for training which does not involve NVQs, to those aged 30 or over paying for full-time vocational courses lasting between four weeks and one year.

15 Before 1 January 1997, the receipt of access funds or a career development loan prohibited the receipt of tax relief for vocational training. With effect from 1 January 1997, changes to the regulations mean that this prohibition has been removed, and students in receipt of access funds or a career development loan may be entitled to such tax relief subject to meeting the normal conditions. As announced in the budget statement on 9 March 1999, vocational training relief will be abolished in 2000-01, though the exact date is not yet known.

16 Tax relief cannot normally be claimed for the cost of books, equipment, travelling or living expenses connected with the training. Exceptions to this rule are:

- the provision of any printed course materials (or audio, video or computer-based materials) of the sort normally provided 'in-house', for example, for open learning courses, which are integral to the training and not available commercially; and
- the costs of any residential study weekends which are an integral part of the course.

17 The above information is only a summary of applicable provisions, and institutions and students should get in touch with the Inland Revenue if they require further information about tax relief for vocational training. The address for correspondence is:

### **Conditions Relating to Residence**

18 To be eligible for help from access funds, a student must meet the residence requirement, unless he/she holds an LEA discretionary award under section 1(6) of the *Education Act 1962* prior to 1994-95. The rules which govern this requirement are the same as those which apply to student loans and are similar to those which apply to mandatory awards. This means that asylum seekers are not eligible for access funds payments. Students from Montserrat are not entitled to special treatment. They must satisfy these rules.

19 A student will meet the residence requirement if:

- i. on the first day of their course he/she is ordinarily resident in England or Wales, and
- ii. on that date, if it is on or after
  1 September 1997, he/she is settled in the
  UK within the meaning of the *Immigration* Act 1971, and
- iii. in all cases, for the three years preceding that date, he/she has been ordinarily resident in the UK, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or the EEA wholly or mainly for purposes other than receiving full-time education.

20 In applying these rules, institutions will need to take account of the following:

- a student will be settled in the UK if he/she is ordinarily resident in it and is not subject under immigration law to any restriction on the length of his/her stay
- a person is not subject to any restriction on the length of his/her stay in the UK if he/she is a British citizen or if his/her passport has been stamped to the effect that the holder has an indefinite right of residence in the UK
- iii. evidence of British citizenship for a student born in the UK, a birth certificate. If a student was born outside the UK, a valid passport, unless he/she is a refugee and does not hold one, and another document issued by a responsible person (minister of religion, doctor, lawyer, teacher, established civil servant, police officer or consular officer) stating the details of the applicant's date, place and country of birth and full name on birth
- iv. students who have lived outside the British Isles during all or part of that period because they or their family were temporarily employed abroad may be treated as if their ordinary residence had not been interrupted
- v. a student who lived in the British Isles during that period for the sole or main purpose of receiving full-time education, and who would otherwise have lived abroad, would not meet the above requirements.

### **Settled Status**

21 From 1 September 1999, an addition to the ordinary residence requirement has been made so that an applicant for a student award would need to be settled in the UK at the beginning of the first year of his/her course, within the meaning of the *Immigration Act 1971* (that is, ordinarily resident here without being subject under the immigration laws to any restriction on the period for which he/she may remain).

22 In certain circumstances, outlined below, students can meet the residence requirement although they do not comply with this three-year rule. Further guidance on ordinary residence is given in paragraphs 25 and 26 below.

## Refugees

23 The residence conditions do not apply to students who have been granted refugee status in the UK, or whose parents or spouse have been granted that status. They are eligible to receive access funds as soon as refugee status has been granted. Students who have been granted exceptional leave to remain are not eligible until they have satisfied the three-year ordinary residence rule mentioned above, although they are not required to satisfy the requirements of settlement.

### European Economic Area Migrant Workers

24 European Economic Area (EEA) nationals employed in the UK, including UK nationals, their spouses and children, who do not pass the three-year ordinary residence test, will meet the residency requirements provided that:

> the EEA national has 'migrant worker status' through having been employed in the UK (not necessarily continuously) since he or she last entered the UK (brief absences abroad, for example, on holiday, should be disregarded); in the case of a UK national having moved to the UK after a period of employment elsewhere in the EEA

- where the student is the spouse or child of the EEA national with migrant worker status, the student is ordinarily resident in the UK as a result of the migrant worker's employment in the UK; and
- iii. the person with 'migrant worker status' has been ordinarily resident in the EEA (the European Union, Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) throughout the period covered by the three-year rule, and has not during any part of that period been so resident wholly or mainly for the purpose of receiving full-time education.

### **Definition of Ordinary Residence**

25 Interpretation of 'ordinary residence' is, in the last resort, a matter for the courts. A judgement by the House of Lords in 1982 (reported in [1983] 2WLR 16) clarified the law, but questions of interpretation can arise for which that judgement does not provide a ruling. The DfEE can offer advice in such cases but is not able to provide definitive rulings.

26 Temporary or occasional absences from the British Isles may not break ordinary residence. For example, a student will pass the three-year ordinary residence test if absence from the British Isles was solely caused by the temporary employment of the student (or the student's parents or spouse) abroad. As the courts have not defined 'temporary or occasional', each case must be judged on its merits. Institutions should not apply universal rules of thumb or specified periods of time to decide what constitutes a temporary or occasional absence.

### **Existing Award Holders**

27 The position of students who began their course before September 1997 will not be affected by the new requirement for settled status. A student who completes his/her course and embarks immediately on a second course (an 'end-on course') will not need to fulfil the settled status requirement.

28 Institutions should note that an applicant's immigration status may readily be established or verified by reference to the stamp(s) in his/her passport or travelling document. If an applicant's case is currently under consideration at the Home Office, he/she should be able to provide some documentary evidence from them. 29 If an applicant's immigration status is not clear, institutions can contact the Immigration Status Enquiry Unit (ISEU) at the Home Office. The unit deals with all enquiries about known asylum seekers. Addresses for these are given at the end of this annex.

# **Examples of Good Management Practice**

1 The following are examples of good practice which were noted by DfEE officers during visits or which colleges suggested might usefully be brought to the notice of other colleges:

- careful targeting of publicity for the funds
- wide publicity for the availability of financial advice and support, rather than for access funds alone, ensuring that prospective students receive information which may encourage them to apply/enrol
- ready availability of counsellors to discuss financial difficulties and possible means of support; many students do not seek advice until difficulties have reached crisis point
- a well-publicised timetable for applications to be received, decisions taken and payments made at the start of each term
- applications accepted only from students who could show that they had explored all other sources of support
- using standard application forms to ensure a consistent basis for assessment
- using a panel to make decisions on students' applications
- involvement of the governing body, which may be better able than staff to take a detached view
- prompt consideration and processing of applications (with very fast decisions by chairman's action where a panel was in place) in cases of urgent need
- prioritisation of applications according to need
- identifying disadvantaged groups, for example, through research by student services staff
- one college had agreed with the local education authority (LEA) how discretionary awards and access funds might be deployed

- setting a maximum payment on the basis that spreading support widely though thinly provides better value for money than supporting a few students with high levels of need; to many students, a relatively small amount is crucial, for example, as a deposit on accommodation or to pay bills
- disbursing an agreed proportion of funds at the start of the year, retaining the balance to cover unforeseen needs that may arise later in the year, including those of students who attain the age of 19 during the year
- applicants advised of decisions by letter with any necessary explanation; successful applicants are also advised of conditions attached and procedures for payment
- termly/monthly/weekly payments, as wellregulated cash flow encourages better budgeting by students and minimises losses where students abandon courses, enabling funds to be reallocated; instalment payments are conditional upon satisfactory attendance and progress
- wherever possible, making payments direct to a third party, for example, a crèche, childminder or the college in the case of fees
- requiring students to sign an undertaking to repay funds if they abandon their course
- support from tutors, both by advising students about the funds and by reporting on students' attendance and progress where this was a condition of payment by instalments
- a formal appeals procedure for unsuccessful applicants
- maximising the amount of interest earned by using a high-interest, non-cheque account from which funds are transferred as required into a normal current account.
