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## Education and Labour Market Status of Young People in England Aged 16-18: 1992-1998

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## Introduction

1 This bulletin is the third in an annual series which reports on the labour market status and the education and training activity of young people aged $16-18$ in England.

## Summary

2 Many young people are active both in the labour market and in education and training.

3 Of 16-18 year olds, 47\% - 865,000 - were both engaged in some form of education and training and active in the labour market at end 1998; being active means that they were either in employment or ILO unemployed (see paragraph 17 for full definitions).

4 A further 27\% - 505,000 - were engaged in education and training but not active in the labour market and $22 \%$ - 401,000 - were active in the labour market but not receiving education or training.

5 The remaining 4\%-69,000 - were neither active in the labour market nor engaged in education or training; of these about 32,000 were looking after their family or home.

6 Overall, some 9\% - 173,000 - were not in education, training, or employment.

7 There were age differences in the profile of the labour market status and education and training activity of young people.

- At $16,86 \%-514,000$ - of the cohort were in education and training, $43 \%-255,000$ in education, training and employment and $31 \%-188,000$ in full-time education and employment. $8 \%-47,000-$ were not in education, training or employment.
- At $17,78 \%-481,000-$ of the cohort were in education and training, $49 \%-300,000$ in education, training and employment and $34 \%-207,000$ in fulltime education and employment. $8 \%-49,000$ - were not in education, training or employment.
- At 18, 60\% - 374,000 - of the cohort were in education and training, with only $32 \%-200,000$ in
education, training and employment and $16 \%$ 102,000 in full-time education and employment. $12 \%$ -77,000 - were not in education, training or employment.
8 Most young people who were in education and training and also in employment were either students fitting in a part-time job around their studies or young people on Government Supported Training.

9 The proportion not in education or training, and the proportion in employment without education or training, rose steeply by age.

- Only $14 \%$ - 86,000 - of 16 year olds were not in education or training, and only $7 \%-39,000-$ of 16 year olds were in employment without any education or training.
- $22 \%-133,000-$ of 17 year olds were not in education or training, with $14 \%-85,000$ - of 17 year olds in employment without education or training.
- $40 \%-250,000$ of 18 year olds were not in education or training, with $28 \%-173,000$ - of 18 year olds in employment without education or training.

10 There were also differences between males and females, with $58 \%-520,000-$ of females aged 16-18 in full-time education but only $52 \%-495,000$ - of males. However, there were more males than females in the other training and education categories, $21 \%$ - 200,000 males compared with $17 \%-156,000$ - females. This means that the overall proportions in education and training were similar, at $75 \%$ for females and $74 \%$ for males.

11 In the early 1990s there was an increase in the proportion of young people in education and training. Between 1992 and 1995 the proportion of 16-18 year olds in education and training rose from $73 \%$ to $76 \%$, before falling to $74 \%$ by 1997 where it has remained until end 1998. The proportion in full-time education rose from $52 \%$ to $57 \%$ between 1992 and 1995; by end 1998 the proportion was $55 \%$. Within this latter group, there was an increase in the proportion of those in both full-time education and in employment, from $19 \%$ to $22 \%$ by end 1994; from 1994 onwards the increase continued and the proportion at end 1998 was $27 \%$.

12 In 1996/97, 97\% of 16 year olds who achieved 5+ A*C GCSEs in year 11 were in education and training, compared with $53 \%$ of those who reported no academic qualifications.

## Background

13 These estimates are consistent with those in the Statistical First Release: Participation in Education and Training by 16-18 year olds in England: 1988 to 1998 (SFR 13/1999). The estimates refer as closely as possible to the same time of year as the SFR - the end of the calendar year - and ages are as at 31 August of that year. The coverage is England.

14 The information here adds an extra dimension to the figures presented in the Statistical First Release, with the addition of the labour market analysis. This information provides a broader picture of young people's activities than is contained in SFR 13/1999, although it contains less detail about the type of education and training, and qualification aims.

15 The figures in this bulletin include data from surveys, and so are subject to sampling error. This has little effect on larger estimates but, particularly when dealing with smaller estimates, it should be remembered that some of these data are estimates and not exact measures. This affects the employer funded training, other education and training and not in education or training categories, and the split of full-time education by labour market status. The totals for full-time education and Government Supported Training are from census data, and are therefore not subject to sampling error.

16 Some categories are combined in the time series. This is because of small numbers in some age/gender groups in the survey data in earlier years.

## Definitions

17 In labour market terms young people may be:

- in employment (including those on Government Supported Training);
- ILO unemployed, i.e. out of work, looking for and available for work;
- or economically inactive, that is not employed, nor seeking, or not available for work.

18 The first two groups comprise the economically active, which, at end 1998, consisted of over 1.2 million young people aged 16-18 from a total cohort of about 1.8 million. Young people active in the labour market fall into three broad groups. First, people who are still in full-time education and who are doing (or seeking) mainly part-time work to fit in around their studies. Second, people who have left full-time education and are either employed or seeking work and are engaged in some form of training or other education. Third, people who have left full-time education to enter employment (or seek employment) and are not engaged in any education and training.

19 In line with Statistical First Release 13/1999 tables 1-4 use the following categories of education and training:

- Full-time education - those at school, college or (mainly for 18 year olds) university, including people in full-time education who are on Government Supported Training.
- Government Supported Training - this includes Modern Apprenticeships and National Traineeships.
- Employer-funded training - on or off-the-job training provided in the four weeks prior to the survey and funded, or mainly funded, by an employer.
- Other education and training - covers young people studying for qualifications not in other categories, e.g. attending independent colleges or training centres, or at any college on part-time study not reported as released from job, or receiving training or in part-time education but not currently employed.
- Not in education or training - those who are not participating in any of the four categories described above.

20 There is a small overlap between those who are in Government Supported Training and those studying full-time at a college which is shown in tables 1-4. Where the categories are presented as mutually exclusive, for example in the charts and in tables 5-12, these people are included in the full-time education category only.

21 Tables 5-12, and the charts, simplify the education and training categories listed above into two groups, one for full-time education and one for the rest, labelled as training and other education.

22 Percentages are based on the population cohort as a whole unless stated otherwise.

23 Figures and percentages may not sum to totals, or sub-totals, due to rounding.

## Latest estimates of education status

24 Tables 1-4 demonstrate that young people are not, in general, either in the labour market or in education or training. Often they are in both. In considering the position at the end of 1998, each of the education and training categories are examined in turn and the labour market status within them explored. There are some notable contrasts between 16, 17 and 18 year olds (chart A).

## Education and Training Overall

25 Most young people aged 16-18 were in some form of education and training at the end of 1998. More precisely, $86 \%$ of the 601,00016 year olds, $78 \%$ of the 614,00017 year olds and $60 \%$ of the 625,00018 year olds were in this category.

## Full-time Education

26 Participation in full-time education declines by age cohort. Over two thirds - 424,000 - of 16 year olds in England at the end of 1998 were in full-time education; at 17 the proportion in full-time education was over half $-358,000$. Among 18 year olds there were less than $40 \%$, representing some 233,000 young people.

27 Many young people in full-time education seek (mainly) part-time work to fit around their studies. Of the 16 year olds in full-time education, $44 \%$ - 188,000 were in employment and a further $9 \%-39,000$ - were ILO unemployed. Among 17 year olds in full-time education, there were $58 \%$ - 207,000 - in employment
and $5 \%-17,000-$ ILO unemployed. A smaller proportion of 18 year olds in full-time education were also in employment $(44 \%-102,000)$ and in ILO unemployment ( $5 \%-12,000$ ).

## Government Supported Training

28 One out of every eleven 16 year olds was on Government Supported Training at end 1998, rising to one in nine at age 17. At 18 the ratio was one in twelve.

## Employer-funded or Other Education and Training

29 The proportion of 16 year olds who were in employerfunded training or some other form of education (such as part-time study) was relatively small: $7 \%-39,000$. At 17 the proportion was $10 \%-61,000$. For 18 year olds the proportion was larger, at $15 \%-91,000$.

## Not in education or training

30 Some 86,000 16 year olds were not in any form of education or training. Just under half of these were also in employment; of the rest more were in the ILO unemployment group than were inactive. Among 17 year olds 133,000 were not in education or training, with $64 \%$ of these in employment. At age 18 there was a higher proportion in all economic status categories who were not in education or training, particularly those in employment.

31 Among the 173,000 16-18 year olds who were not in education, training or employment at end 1998 there were 104,000 ILO unemployed and 69,000 economically inactive (table 1); $27 \%$ of the ILO unemployed group
who were not in education or training had been unemployed for six months or more (Labour Force Survey estimate).

## Labour Market Activity

32 The analysis also allows us to present the figures by economic activity, with the education and training breakdowns within the labour groups (tables 9-12). At end 1998 there were $56 \%-680,000$ - of $16-17$ year olds and $60 \%-373,000-$ of 18 year olds in employment; of these 555,000 of the $16-17$ year olds and 200,000 of the 18 year olds were in some form of education and training.

33 In addition, $12 \%-143,000$ - of 16-17 year olds and $11 \%-70,000$ - of 18 years olds were ILO unemployed, with 83,000 of the $16-17$ year olds and 27,000 of the 18 year olds in education and training; and $32 \%-392,000$ - of $16-17$ year olds and $29 \%-182,000$ - of 18 years olds were economically inactive, within these groups 357,000 of 16-17 year olds and 148,000 of 18 year olds were in education and training.

34 A breakdown of those not in education, employment or training who were economically inactive at end 1997 is shown in table 10. Some $58 \%$ - 40,000 - of inactive 16-18 year olds said they would not like work; most of the rest would like work but were not actively seeking it. There are different reasons given for inactivity, but the only one quoted by a large number of young people not in education or training was 'looking after family/home'. This accounts for around 32,000 of inactive 16-18 year olds.

## Latest estimates by gender

35 There was a higher proportion of females aged 16-18 in full-time education at end $1998,58 \%$ compared with $52 \%$ of males (table 1).

36 There are also more females than males who were in both in full-time education and in employment. However, more males than females were in employer funded training and in GST.

37 The overall proportion of 16-18 year old females and males not in employment, education or training were the same at $9 \%$.

## Recent trends in education and labour market status

38 Tables $5-12$ show how the education and labour market status of young people has changed, in both numbers and percentages. The charts also show changes over the last six years, for percentages only. In both the tables and charts the education status is simplified into the following groups:

- Full-time education.
- Training and other education - includes Government Supported Training (but excludes those also in full-time education) and Employer-funded training as well as "other education and training" from the classification used in the first two tables.
- Not in education or training.


## Full-time education

39 The proportion of 16-18 year olds in full-time education increased during the early 1990s, but has
remained fairly steady since end 1993. However, there has been a marked shift, since 1992, from those who are in full-time education and economically inactive to those who are in full-time education and in employment (table 5).

40 Table 6 shows that for $16-17$ year olds a similar steady rate of increase (since end 1993) for participation in full-time education is apparent. Again, a shift from those in full-time education and economically inactive to those in full-time education and in employment has been taking place over the past four years, but to a lesser extent than the shift for 16-18 year olds.

41 Looking at individual ages, it is noticeable that the proportion of 17 year olds participating in full-time education has been rising steadily since end 1995 (table 8). The proportion of 16 year olds and 18 year olds participating in full-time education has remained broadly steady since end 1993 (table 8 and table 7 respectively).

## Training and other education

42 About one in five 16-18 year olds are participating in training and other education, a figure that has remained fairly constant since the early 1990s. During this period, however, the proportion of those in other education and training and in employment fell slightly (table 5).

43 The proportion of 16-17 year olds in training and other education fell slightly from $20 \%$ at end 1992 to $19 \%$ by end 1994 . Since end 1995 the figure has remained at $18 \%$ (table 6).

44 For 18 year olds the proportion in training and other education remained fairly steady before rising slightly from end 1995 (table 7).

## Not in Education or Training

45 Just over one quarter of 16-18 year olds were not in education or training at the end of 1998. This represented no change from the end 1997 figure and the proportion of 16-18 year olds not in education or training has now remained at around the one quarter mark since end 1993.

46 The proportion of 16-17 year olds not in education or training rose slightly between end 1994 and end 1997, before falling very slightly in 1998. The latest fall is due solely to a fall in those not in education and training but in employment (table 6).

47 The proportion of 18 year olds not in education or training fell from $45 \%$ in 1992 to $39 \%$ in 1996, before rising slightly (to $40 \%$ ) in 1997. This figure has remained at $40 \%$ in 1998.

## Recent Trends by Gender

48 The proportion of both male and female 16-17 year olds in full-time education has remained broadly steady since end 1993, with the gap in participation between female and male 16-17 year olds remaining at about 3\% in favour of females (table 6a).

49 Among 16-17 year old males the proportion not in education or training has risen slightly since 1994, with those also not in employment showing a similar small increase. A similar increase for 16-17 year old females was evident between 1993 and 1997, but the latest year has seen the proportion fall back. The proportion also not in employment has remained steady at $7 \%$ since 1995 (table 6a).

50 Among 18 year olds there was an increase in the proportion in full-time education in both males and females in the early 1990s (table 7a). After 1994 there was little change. However, there was an increase in the proportion in training and other education for 18 year old females, leading to a fall in the proportion not in education or training. The proportion of males not in education and training varied only slightly between 1994 and 1998.

## Additional information on the activity of young people

51 Additional information on the activity of young people is available from the Youth Cohort Study (YCS).

52 According to the YCS, $86 \%$ of 16 year olds were participating in education and training in spring 1998 and $6 \%$ were in employment without any education or training. The YCS slightly overestimates the proportion of 16 year old participants relative to the Participation estimates based on administrative data. This small overestimation is due, in part, to differences in population - see Technical Note.

53 As table 14 shows, young people are more likely not to be in education, training or work at 16 if they gained low or no qualifications in year $11(26 \%$ of those reporting no qualifications were not in education, training or employment at 16 , compared with $1 \%$ of those with 5 or more GCSEs at grades $\mathrm{A}^{*}$-C and $6 \%$ of those with 1-4 GCSE A*-Cs). $97 \%$ of those achieving $5^{+}$ $\mathrm{A}^{*}$-C GCSEs continued in education and training, compared with only $54 \%$ of those without any GCSEs.

54 Table 14 also shows the proportion within each ethnic group who are participating in education, training and employment. A smaller proportion of young White people remain in education and training, 85\% compared with $90 \%$ or higher in the other groups. In addition, more of the 16 year olds in the White group are in employment without education or training.

55 Table 15 shows participation status at 18 by both GCSE attainment and by ethnic group. Young people who had gained 5 or more GCSEs at A*-C when they were 16 were much more likely to be participating in full-time education at 18. Nearly a third of those with either 1-4 GCSEs D-G or no GCSEs were not in education, training or work.

56 The proportion of Black and Asian 18 year olds participating in education or training was significantly higher than for Whites and 'Other' ethnic (table 15).

## Technical note

57 The main estimates combine data from a number of sources. The method of combining data sources is subject to ongoing development, so some figures may be subject to revision. In particular estimates for end 1997 and end 1998 are provisional.

58 Population data are derived from the Office for National Statistics (ONS) mid-year estimates and the Government Actuary's Department projections. The age of a person is measured at the beginning of the academic year, 31 August.

59 Other data are collected around the end of the calendar year. Education and training data are collected in November (Further Education), December (Higher Education) and January (schools and Government Supported Training). Labour market data are taken from the winter (December to February) Labour Force Survey (conducted by the ONS). This means that the timing of the estimates is reasonably consistent.

60 Figures for full-time education and for the overlap between full-time education and Government Supported Training (GST) are taken from the education censuses. That is, the Schools Census, the Further Education Statistical Record (FESR), and, from 1994/95, the Individualised Student Record (ISR) of the Further Education Funding Council (FEFC). Higher education figures are from the Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) from 1994/95, and from the Universities'

Statistical Record and FESR before that. For further education, there are a considerable number of technical differences between the ISR and FESR which are detailed in SPN 159/97.

61 Education estimates exclude students studying overseas, and students from overseas in higher education in England.

62 Figures for numbers in Government Supported Training come from the Training and Enterprise Council's management information, with age breakdowns from the trainee databases, based on returns received up to April 1999. Further information about young people on GST is now published each month in a DfEE Press Notice 'Statistics on Government Supported Training'.

63 Estimates for employer funded training and for labour market status come from the Labour Force Survey (LFS). The LFS is a quarterly survey of about 60,000 households in the United Kingdom, and includes about 50,000 households in England. If an individual is not available for interview another member of the household may respond on their behalf.

64 The definitions of employment and unemployment used in the LFS follow the conventions promoted by the International Labour Organisation (ILO):

- In employment - an employee, self-employed, on a Government Supported Training programme, or an unpaid family worker.
- ILO unemployed - anyone who is out of work and available to start work in the next two weeks, and has either looked for work in the last four weeks or is waiting to start a job they have already obtained.
- Economically inactive - neither in employment nor ILO unemployed, that is not active in the labour market.

65 The LFS covers all residential households and nursing accommodation. Householders are asked to reply on behalf of students living away in halls of residence. The LFS excludes people outside such accommodation - chiefly hospital residents, people in prison, people in army barracks, and the homeless.

66 As the LFS is a sample survey, all estimates of labour market participation are subject to sampling error.

67 The main estimates in this Bulletin are an extension of those in Statistical First Release 13/1999
Participation in Education and Training by 16-18 year olds in England: 1988 to 1998. All estimates have been adjusted where necessary to agree both with those estimates of education and training participation, and with LFS estimates of the share of the age group within
each education activity area by whether they are in employment, ILO unemployed and economically inactive.

68 The discontinuity in 1994 is due to a move from the Further Education Statistical Record (FESR) to the FEFC Individualised Student Record (ISR). Details of the effects of this change were published in the Statistical Press Notice 159/97.

69 Figures for 1997 have been revised to incorporate more accurate data. For more details see Statistical First Release 13/1999.

70 Youth Cohort Study data are taken from the Spring 1998 Study (Cohort 8 Sweep 2 and Cohort 9 Sweep 1) which surveyed nearly 16,00016 and 18 year olds in England and Wales. The YCS excludes those who were in special schools in year 11.

71 Participants have been defined from the YCS as being those who are in one of the following categories (in priority order, to avoid overlapping categories):

- FT education - those reporting their main activity as full-time education at school or college.
- Other education or training - includes those reporting their main activity as governmentsupported training; those in employer funded training i.e. whose main activity is a full or part-time job and who have received on-the-job or off-the-job training in the past four weeks or whose job is an apprenticeship of any kind; and those who are enrolled in part-time education or are studying for a qualification, but who are not in full-time education, GST or EFT.
- Not in education or training - those who are not in full-time education, government-supported training, employer-funded training or any other education or training.
- Of which:
i) In employment, but not in education or training - those reporting their main activity as in a full or part-time job, but not in education or training as stated above.
ii) Not in education, training or employment those not in education or training as stated above, and whose main activity is not a full or part-time job.
