## **East of England**

#### Introduction

The East of England has an area of over 19,000 km<sup>2</sup> and has one of the fastest growing populations in England. The total population is 5.8 million, 11 per cent of England's entire population. Between 2001 and 2009 it had the highest percentage increase in population of all regions in England at 6.8 per cent, compared with the England average of 4.8 per cent.

Population density of 300 residents per km<sup>2</sup> is above the UK average of 260 but below the England average of 400. In 2009 it was highest in Luton Unitary Authority with 4,500 people per km<sup>2</sup> and lowest in Kings Lynn and West Norfolk and Breckland local authority districts, each with 100 people per km<sup>2</sup>.

### The economy

The East of England is responsible for 9 per cent of the UK's gross value added (GVA). The region's headline GVA was £107.2 billion in 2009. In the period October to December 2010 the unemployment rate was 6.6 per cent. Although this is one of the lowest rates among the regions, it represents a rise from 4.5 per cent in the first quarter of 2008.

Gross disposable household income (GDHI) of residents in the East of England has remained consistently above the UK average since 1997. At £15,900 per head in 2009, it was the third highest of the English regions and 4 per cent above the UK average. Within the region it ranged from £12,330 in Luton to £18,700 in Hertfordshire.

#### **Qualification levels**

In 2009, 26.8 per cent of the East of England's working age population's highest qualification was Level 4 or above, and this compares with 30.0 per cent for England. 51.9 per cent of pupils achieved five or more grades A\* to C at GCSE level or equivalent including English and mathematics in 2008-09, compared with 49.8 per cent for England as a whole.

### **Higher education provision**

There are 11 higher education institutions in the region: eight universities and three higher education colleges. In addition there are 18 further education colleges (FECs) teaching higher education courses. The higher education student population is 158,955; this equates to 115,135 full-time equivalent students, of whom 420 are registered at FECs. The higher education institutions range in size from Anglia Ruskin University, with 20,890 students, to Norwich School of Art and Design with just 1,485.

The south, just north of the M25, has the highest concentration of universities and colleges within the region.

### Student profile

The East of England has the highest proportion of postgraduate research students, and a high percentage of mature students. The region is a major exporter of young full-time first degree students, and the proportion of this group of students studying in their home region is one of the lowest in England. The region has the smallest proportion of students taught and registered at an FEC, but the third highest proportion of those franchised from an HEI to a FEC.




### Profile of students' study methods in the East of England (based on student FPEs)


# HE students taught at HEIs in the East of England 2007-08 to 2009-10 (OU and distance learners excluded)

# HE students taught at FECs in the East of England 2007-08 to 2009-10


# Higher education student numbers for further education colleges 2007-08 to 2009-10


# HE students taught at East of England HEIs 2009-10: characteristics (OU and distance learners excluded)



# HE students taught at East of England HEIs: subject 2009-10 (OU and distance learners excluded)




# HE students taught at East of England FECs 2009-10: characteristics






# Flows of young, full-time, first degree students between regions (OU and distance learners excluded)

### Where do young students at East of England HEIs in 2009-10 come from?




# Where in England do young students from the East of England study? 2009-10


## **Employment destinations of first degree graduates**





### Total income\* by source 2009-10





Performance indicators for participation and non-continuation








