#### **South East**

#### Introduction

The South East region encompasses 19 county and unitary authorities and 55 districts, stretching in an arc around London, from Thanet in the east, to the New Forest in the south-west and to Aylesbury Vale in the north-west.

The South East region covers an area of just over 19,000 km<sup>2</sup>. It has the largest population of any English region, 8.4 million people, and a population density of 440 people per km<sup>2</sup>, the third highest region.

While it is without a single dominant urban centre, significant urban areas include Brighton and Hove, Oxford, Guildford, Milton Keynes, Portsmouth, Reading, and Southampton. Since 1981 the population in the South East has been steadily increasing and showed an increase of 5.1 per cent between 2001 and 2009, higher than the England average of 4.8 per cent.

#### The economy

Overall the South East is relatively prosperous. It is the second largest economic contributor among the regions of England and countries of the UK. The South East has one of the highest employment rates and one of the lowest unemployment rates. Real estate, renting and business activities contributed 29 per cent of the South East's total gross value added (GVA) in 2008, an increase of almost 3 per cent since 1998. The region accounted for 17 per cent of the UK total, the second largest share (after London). In the South East manufacturing accounted for less than 14 per cent of the GVA in 2009.

Gross disposable household income (GDHI) of South East residents was also the second highest, after London, at £17,300 per head. There was a wide spread of GDHI within the region, being lowest in Portsmouth at £11,690 per head and highest in Surrey at £21,420.

The total income of the region's higher education institutions is £787 million per year.

#### **Qualification levels**

Qualification levels in the South East are relatively high. In 2009, 32.1 per cent of the working age population were qualified to Level 4 or above, compared with 30.0 per cent in England. This was the second highest percentage after London. In the South East, 53.7 per cent of pupils achieved five or more grades A\* to C at GCSE level or equivalent including English and mathematics in 2008-09, compared with 49.8 per cent for England as a whole.

#### **Higher education provision**

Apart from the Open University there are 20 higher education institutions with their main campus in the South East: 19 universities, one of which is a directly funded school of the University of London, and one higher education college. In addition four higher education institutions, not themselves in the South East, have campuses in the region. The headquarters of the Open University is in Milton Keynes but we have excluded it from the regional data. There is one privately funded university in the region, the University of Buckingham, which is also excluded from the data. Forty-nine of the region's further education colleges (FECs) offer higher education courses.


There are 290,140 higher education students in the region; this equates to 220,475 full-time equivalents. Some 5,985 of these higher education (HE) students are registered at FECs in the

region. The largest higher education institution in the South East is the University of Southampton with 23,540 students, and the smallest is the University for the Creative Arts, with 5,810 students. The largest concentration of HE provision is in the Southampton/Portsmouth area, which has three universities and eight further education colleges offering higher education courses.

#### Student profile

A relatively low percentage of young full-time first degree students from the region stay on to study at higher education institutions in the region, and there is a large net outflow of such students from the region. There is little variation between the student profile of the region and that for England as a whole.




#### Profile of students' study methods in the South East (based on student FPEs)

# HE students taught at HEIs in the South East 2007-08 to 2009-10 (OU and distance learners excluded)



## HE students taught at FECs in the South East 2007-08 to 2009-10


Higher education student numbers for further education colleges with more than 200 FPE 2007-08 to 2009-10


# HE students taught at South East HEIs 2009-10: characteristics (OU and distance learners excluded)

Based on student FPEs (percentage in brackets represents average for England)





# HE students taught at South East HEIs: subject 2009-10 (OU and distance learners excluded)




# HE students taught at South East FECs 2009-10: characteristics

Based on student FPEs (percentage in brackets represents average for England)








# Flows of young, full-time, first degree students between regions (OU and distance learners excluded)

#### Where do young students at South East HEIs in 2009-10 come from?




### Where in England do young students from the South East study? 2009-10


### **Employment destinations of first degree graduates**

#### First degree students graduating from HEIs in 2008:




### **Employment destinations of first degree graduates**

#### First degree students from the region graduating in 2008:




#### Income to HE institutions in the South East

#### Total income\* by source 2009-10






#### Young full-time degree entrants to HEIs in the South East


