### **South West**

### Introduction

The South West has the largest area of any English region, measuring nearly 23,800 km<sup>2</sup>. Its population is 5.2 million. Half of the population live in rural areas, or in towns of fewer than 20,000 people. With 220 people per km<sup>2</sup>, the South West has the lowest population density among English regions. Bristol (population 433,000) is the largest city. Other significant urban areas include Bournemouth/Poole, Plymouth, Exeter, Gloucester and Cheltenham. In 2009, the South West contained the highest proportion of the population that was over retirement age: 19.3 per cent of the population, compared with the UK average of 16.3 per cent.

The South West's population increased by 5.8 per cent between 2001 and 2009, faster than England as a whole which averaged 4.8 per cent. This was also the highest increase in the UK.

### The economy

The South West is responsible for almost 8 per cent of the UK's gross value added (GVA). The region's headline GVA was £95.3 billion in 2009. The latest sub-regional data (2008) show that more than half of this was produced by the Gloucestershire, Wiltshire and the Bristol/Bath area sub-region, which includes Swindon.

In 2008 the South West was responsible for 14 per cent of the UK's agriculture and fishing GVA, and 19 per cent of mineral mining and quarrying. The hotels and restaurants sector is also a relatively large contributor to the South West economy. In 2008 about 9 per cent of jobs were tourism-related, the highest regional proportion.

Gross disposable household income (GDHI) of South West residents was the fourth highest among the English regions, at £15,100 per head. It ranged from £12,770 in Plymouth to £16,400 in Wiltshire County Council area. The unemployment rate was one of the lowest of the regions at 6.1 per cent compared with the UK average of 7.9 per cent. Of those in employment in the South West in the year to March 2010, almost half of females and one in eight males worked part-time. Both proportions were the highest in the UK.

### **Qualification levels**

In 2009, 29.9 per cent of the working age population were qualified to Level 4 or above, compared with 30.0 per cent in England. 51.8 per cent of pupils in the South West achieved five or more grades A\* to C at GCSE level or equivalent including English and mathematics in 2008-09, compared with 49.8 per cent for England as a whole.

### Higher education provision

There are 12 higher education institutions with their main campus in the South West: eight universities and four higher education colleges. In addition, there are 28 further education colleges (FECs) teaching higher education students. The higher education student population is 189,685, equating to 142,820 full-time equivalent students; 2,665 students are registered at FECs. The higher education institutions range in size from the University of the West of England, Bristol, with 29,033 students, to University College Plymouth St Mark and St John with 2,448 students.

The largest concentration of higher education is in the Bristol and Bath area, where there are four universities and four FECs teaching higher education courses.

### Student profile

The South West is dominated by the 'traditional' student: young full-time learners undertaking a first degree. It has the lowest percentage of students from a non-white ethnic background, while study at FECs is dominated by students who are on franchised courses: 15,320 students are registered at HEIs and taught at FECs compared with only 2,665 both taught and registered at FECs. A significantly higher proportion of those taught at FECs are studying towards foundation degrees: 55 per cent of students compared with 42 per cent nationally. Students in receipt of Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA) form a larger part of the student population than the England average.






# HE students taught at HEIs in the South West 2007-08 to 2009-10 (OU and distance learners excluded)


## HE students taught at FECs in the South West 2007-08 to 2009-10

Higher education student numbers for further education colleges with more than 100 FPE 2007-08 to 2009-10




# HE students taught at South West HEIs 2009-10: characteristics (OU and distance learners excluded)

Based on student FPEs (percentage in brackets represents average for England)





# HE students taught at South West HEIs: subject 2009-10 (OU and distance learners excluded)




# HE students taught at South West FECs 2009-10: characteristics

Based on student FPEs (percentage in brackets represents average for England)








# Flows of young, full-time, first degree students between regions (OU and distance learners excluded)

### Where do young students at South West HEIs in 2009-10 come from?




## Where in England do young students from the South West study? 2009-10


## **Employment destinations of first degree graduates**

### First degree students graduating from HEIs in 2008:





### First degree students from the region graduating in 2008:




### Income to HE institutions in the South West

### Total income\* by source 2009-10





#### Young full-time degree entrants to HEIs in the South West




### Research Assessment Exercise 2008 staff volume - 2\* and above
