CHILDREN ACCOMMODATED IN SECURE CHILDREN'S HOMES AT 31 MARCH 2012: ENGLAND AND WALES

INTRODUCTION

This Statistical First Release (SFR) provides figures on the number of secure children's homes in England and Wales along with the number of places approved and number of children accommodated.


Secure children's homes are children's homes which provide a locked environment and restrict a young person's liberty. They provide care and accommodation to children and young people who have been detained or sentenced by the Youth Justice Board (YJB) and those who have been remanded to secure local authority (LA) accommodation. They also accommodate and care for children and young people who have been placed there on welfare grounds by LAs and the courts. Secure children's homes provide the young people with support tailored to their individual needs; to achieve this they have a high ratio of staff to young people and are generally small facilities.

The number of places approved for use has decreased from last year but the number of children accommodated has risen, resulting in a large increase in the occupancy rate. However, both numbers of places approved and children accommodated are small so even a small increase or decrease can result in a big change in occupancy rates.

KEY POINTS

- The number of secure children's homes open at 31 March 2012 in England and Wales was 17; no change from the previous year. There were 19 homes open at 31 March 2008.
- 239 children were accommodated in secure children's homes in England and Wales at 31 March 2012 – 221 in England and 18 in Wales. The total for England and Wales represents a rise of 8 per cent from 2011 but a 15 per cent decrease from 2008.
- At 31 March 2012, there were 300 approved places in England and Wales, a decrease of 4 per cent from the previous year. This represents a fall of 12 per cent from 31 March 2008.
- 183 approved places were contracted to the Youth Justice Board (YJB) (61 per cent of approved places), a decrease of 4 per cent from last year and a 19 per cent decrease from 2008. These numbers have decreased over the past five years.


• 80 per cent of approved places in England and Wales were occupied, an increase of 10 percentage points from 2011. There was a large decrease in the occupancy rate between 2010 and 2011, from 83 per cent to 70 per cent. Therefore the large increase between 2011 and 2012 brings figures back in line with 2008 to 2010.



- Of the total number of children accommodated in England and Wales, 66 per cent were male and 34 per cent female (the same as in 2008), compared with 69 per cent and 31 per cent in 2011.
- There was an increase of 4 percentage points in children placed by the local authority on welfare grounds (child placed, under section 25 of the Children Act 1989, for the protection of himself and/or others¹), from 28 per cent of children accommodated in 2011, to 32 per cent in 2012. The figure for 2012 is similar to 2009 and 2010. However numbers are small so percentages are volatile.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Background

1. In England and Wales there are three types of secure accommodation in which children and young people can be placed. These are secure training centres, young offender institutions and secure children's homes. This Statistical First Release provides figures on children accommodated in secure children's homes. Data on secure training centres and young offender institutions are published separately, see link under Related Publications.

2. Secure children's homes are children's homes which provide a locked environment and restrict a young person's liberty. They provide care and accommodation to children and young people who have been detained or sentenced by the Youth Justice Board (YJB) and those who have been remanded to secure local authority (LA) accommodation. They also accommodate and care for children and young people who have been placed there on welfare grounds by LAs and the courts. Secure children's homes provide the young people with support tailored to their individual needs; to achieve this they have a high ratio of staff to young people and are generally small facilities.

3. Information has been derived from statistical data reported to the Department by all secure children's homes in England and Wales that were open at 31 March 2012.

4. The Statistical First Release contains information for both England and Wales due to a long-standing agreement with the Welsh Government that DfE will report on the single secure children's home in Wales. The combined figures for England and Wales are presented as the main figures, as cross-border placements mean that Welsh children may be accommodated in English secure children's homes and vice versa. Figures for England are available separately in the Statistical First Release.

Confidentiality

7. In order to ensure confidentiality of children, the following suppression conventions have been used in this statistical release:

- Any numbers less than 6 (1 to 5 inclusive) have been suppressed and have been replaced by an 'x'. It has been necessary to suppress other figures whenever it would be possible to calculate the value of a suppressed number by means of simple arithmetic. The rule applied in these circumstances has been to suppress the next smallest data item.
- Percentages are displayed to the nearest whole number but where the numerator between 1 and 5 inclusive, they have been suppressed.
- Where any number is shown as zero (0), the original figure submitted was zero.
- A '.' represents data not applicable.

National Statistics

8. This is a National Statistics publication. National Statistics are produced to high professional standards set out in the National Statistics Code of Practice. They undergo regular quality assurance reviews to ensure that they meet customer needs. They are produced free from any political interference.
