Vocational and Other Qualifications Quarterly: April to June 2012

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Key findings

In this bulletin we present data on achievements for all regulated qualifications (excluding GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma and its components) in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, during the quarter April to June 2012.

There were over 2 million achievements during April to June 2012 in regulated qualifications (excluding GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma). This is an increase of 8 per cent on the same quarter of 2011. These achievements covered 7,166 individual qualifications, offered across 132 awarding organisations.

In this quarter, there were 17,331 qualifications available and eligible for awarding, an increase of 17 per cent on the previous year. Of these, 952 were new qualifications added to the list of available regulated qualifications during the quarter April to June 2012.

During the 12-month period ending June 2012, there were over 8.2 million achievements, representing a 5 per cent increase on the 12-month period to June 2011.

In this bulletin we see that Qualifications and Credit Framework (QCF) and functional Skills qualifications saw the largest percentage increases. This growth is based on the number of achievements awarded – increases of 135 per cent and 65 per cent respectively – when comparing the 12-month periods ending June 2012 and June 2011.

The awarding organisation with the greatest number of achievements during this period was Pearson Education Ltd (Edexcel) with 1.6 million achievements. This represents 20 per cent of all achievements – except in GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma – in the 12 months to June 2012. Of the top ten organisations with the highest number of achievements, NCFE showed the greatest percentage growth: 23 per cent, with 258,150 achievements.

The qualification with the greatest number of achievements in the 12-month period to June 2012 was the CIEH Level 2 Award in Food Safety and Catering qualification on the QCF. There were 184,050 achievements, representing an increase of 58 per cent on the previous 12 months.

Preparation for life and work was the sector subject area to see the greatest proportion of achievements, with over 2.8 million in the 12 months to June 2012, representing 34 per cent of the total (8.2 million). Achievements in this sector increased by 12 per cent on those in the previous 12 months. The highest growth was in the retail and commercial enterprise sector (17 per cent), and this was across

all levels of qualifications. The largest decline was in the health, public services and care sector (20 per cent).

Across all of England, there were 7.6 million achievements in the 12 months to June 2012 (representing 92 per cent across all three countries), 475,000 achievements in Wales (6 per cent) and 177,000 achievements in Northern Ireland (2 per cent).

In each of the three countries, England, Wales and Northern Ireland, QCF qualifications dominated with the largest share of achievements, followed by vocationally related qualifications (VRQs) in England, occupational qualifications in Wales and key skills qualifications in Northern Ireland.

Introduction

This statistical bulletin is published by Ofqual. We regulate qualifications, examinations and assessments in England, and vocational qualifications in Northern Ireland.

Under the Apprenticeships, Skills, Children and Learning Act 2009, one of our objectives is to improve public confidence in regulated qualifications and assessments by raising awareness and understanding of the qualifications we regulate. This bulletin contributes to our meeting this objective.

In this bulletin we present data on achievements for all regulated qualifications (excluding GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma¹) in England, Wales and Northern Ireland during the quarter April to June 2012. Similar statistics for Scotland can be found on the Scottish Qualifications Authority website.²

This is the first edition of the Vocational and Other Qualifications Quarterly bulletin, which replaces the Vocational Qualifications Quarterly report that we previously published. It focuses on **all** regulated qualifications, rather than just national vocational qualifications (NVQs), vocationally related qualifications (VRQs), qualifications on the QCF and occupational qualifications. Please note, this bulletin **does not** report on any achievements in GCSEs, GCEs or the Diploma and its components. When referring to regulated qualifications in this bulletin, GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma are excluded.

It presents achievements for the latest quarter and the 12-month period to the end of the latest quarter. We are also now able to provide a breakdown by country (England, Wales and Northern Ireland). These changes are in response to feedback from users.

The bulletin is one of a suite of three publications presenting quarterly statistics on achievements for regulated qualifications. The other two bulletins are:

- Higher Qualifications Quarterly (covers all qualifications at level 4 and above), hence there will be some overlap between figures in this bulletin and those in the Higher Qualifications Quarterly bulletin
- Supplemental Qualifications Quarterly (covers entry to level 3 for basic skills, entry level, English for speakers of other languages, free-standing mathematics qualifications, functional skills, key skills and other general qualifications). Again, there will be some overlap between figures in this bulletin and those in the Supplemental Qualifications Quarterly bulletin.

Each quarter, awarding organisations submit data to us on achievements in all regulated qualifications (including Diploma components but excluding GCSEs and GCEs) during the quarter. Achievements are awarded in the quarter during which the final certificates are issued. This bulletin shows the number of achievements in the quarter April to June 2012 and during the 12-month period ending June 2012 broken down by awarding organisation, sector subject area and level of qualification, by type and country. Information on the availability of qualifications is also provided. All qualifications (excluding GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma) regulated by us are included, regardless of age of student, centre type and funding status of the qualification.

Geographical coverage

In this bulletin we present achievements for regulated qualifications³ (excluding GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma) in England, Wales and Northern Ireland during the quarter April to June 2012.

In 2011 we started to collect data for England, Wales and Northern Ireland individually. As of this quarter, this bulletin publishes achievements by country. From 2012 we are also producing a separate bulletin presenting achievements in Northern Ireland only. This is available on our website: www.ofqual.gov.uk/standards/150/909.

Qualification type

At the point of accreditation, regulated qualifications are classified into 18 qualification types. We recognise that the classification system is not ideal, as very similar qualifications may appear under different types, for example NVQs and the QCF, and some qualifications are miscoded. We are working with experts to

investigate how this situation might be improved in the future. This bulletin presents figures on 12 of these types.⁴

Revisions

Once published, data on the number of achievements for any qualification is not usually subject to revision. However, data may be revised in subsequent bulletins due to late-received data or if an error is identified. Qualifications may also be recategorised to a different type, level, sector subject area or awarding organisation. In some cases, this may result in previous data being amended to reflect the new categorisation.

In this bulletin some figures have been revised since the January to March 2012 bulletin. These revisions were due to historical updates from two awarding organisations.

Completeness of the data

Awarding organisations send us data every quarter. We contact any awarding organisation that does not return a complete set of data within the collection to ensure that the data is as complete as possible. For this quarter, we received data from all the awarding organisations.

Figures in the commentary and tables for the number of achievements awarded are rounded to the nearest 50. This reflects the inaccuracies inherent in any large-scale data collection. As a result of rounded figures, the percentages shown in pie charts will not necessarily sum to 100 per cent.

Due to seasonal variation in the number of achievements over the year, comparisons in this bulletin are only made with data in the same quarter of the previous year.

Definitions

Some of the key terms used in this bulletin are defined as follows:

- Accreditation a process that reviews and confirms achievement to specific criteria and standards.
- Achievement any award that is not graded as U, Absent or X
- Available qualification a qualification eligible for an award
- Awarding organisation organisations recognised to develop, deliver and award descriptions of qualifications.
- Active qualification a qualification eligible for award to students, even if the qualification is no longer available for enrolment
- Certification a formal acknowledgement of student achievement
- Recognition an evidence-based process of achieving compliance with the criteria for recognition.

A glossary is available on our website at: www.ofqual.gov.uk/files/2010-11-26-statistics-glossary.pdf . It provides further details on sector subject area classifications and qualification types and levels.

In this bulletin 'quarter' refers to calendar quarters. So quarter 1 (Q1) refers to January to March, quarter 2 (Q2) to April to June, quarter 3 (Q3) to July to September, and quarter 4 (Q4) to October to December.

We are continually striving to improve the quality and coverage of information in these quarterly updates, and we welcome any suggestions or comments regarding this bulletin. Our contact details are at the end of this document.

Achievements this quarter

To provide an overall perspective on achievements during the quarter April to June 2012, this section presents figures for all qualification types, except GCEs, GCSEs and the Diploma.

The total number of achievements across all qualification types for the period April to June 2012 is shown in the table below (with April to June 2011 figures shown for comparison).

In the quarter April to June 2012, there was an 8 per cent increase in achievements on the same quarter in 2011 (from 1.9 million to just over 2 million).

From the table above we can see the impact of qualifications being restructured onto the QCF, with an increase of 69 per cent in the number of achievements for these qualifications. The increase in QCF achievements could be due to a variety of reasons, including:

- the Skills Funding Agency's preference to fund qualifications on the QCF
- the revision of qualifications to fit with the apprenticeship framework
- the QCF offering three different sizes of each qualification (award, certificate and diploma), creating potential for a more qualifications and associated achievements
- awarding organisations engaging with sectors to offer new, innovative qualifications based on subject content.

Other qualifications that increased in terms of number of achievements included English for speakers of other languages (14 per cent) and functional skills (23 per cent). Basic skills declined by 14 per cent on the achievements in April to June 2011. This trend is partly due to functional skills qualifications replacing those in basic skills.

Key skills saw a significant increase of 25 per cent. This increase is partly due to a rise in the number of apprenticeships, which require functional skills and key skills qualifications. In addition, key skills qualifications continue to be available until September 2012 (their discontinuation having originally been planned for September 2010). In the 2010/11 academic year there were 200,300 apprenticeship achievements compared with 171,500 in 2009/10.⁵

The largest percentage decreases in achievements were reported in NVQs (82 per cent), occupational qualifications (81 per cent), and in other general qualifications (66 per cent); slightly smaller decreases were seen in VRQs (49 per cent), entry level (37 per cent) and higher qualifications (36 per cent).

Regulated qualifications

There are over 17,000 available regulated qualifications (other than GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma). These are qualifications that may be offered to students formally to enrol on. These qualifications are considered to be available until they pass certification end dates (see figure 1 below and table 1 in the appendix).

Qualifications available

In April to June 2012, there was a net⁶ increase of 17 per cent in the number of qualifications available, compared with the same quarter of the previous year. These qualifications comprise 11,690 qualifications on the QCF (68 per cent of the total), 1,971 VRQs (11 per cent), 1,305 NVQs (8 per cent) and 678 other general qualifications (4 per cent).

The remaining types of qualification each represent less than 3 per cent of the total (of which basic skills, free-standing mathematics qualifications and occupational qualifications each make up less than 1 per cent).

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
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During the last quarter, 952 new vocational qualifications were added to the list of available regulated qualifications. These included 930 QCF qualifications, 14 other general qualifications, two qualifications in English for speakers of other languages and six VRQs.

Qualifications available and awarding

During April to June 2012, 57 per cent of all available qualifications had awarded achievements (9,911 out of 17,331). Figure 2 shows the number of available qualifications and how many of these awarded achievements in the last 12 months to the end of the quarters shown.

Figure 2: Number of available regulated qualifications and the number awarding, between April to June 2007 (2007 Q2) and April to June 2012 (2012 Q2)



We can see from figure 2 that the number of available qualifications grew at a consistent pace from the end of 2008. The most growth occurred around quarter 3 in 2010, when many QCF qualifications became available. We also see that over time the number of qualifications awarding did not grow at the same rate as the number of qualifications available, and that the gap is widening.

Qualifications available but not awarding ('inactive')

To understand the gap between the number of available qualifications and the number awarding (in the 12 months to quarter end), we need to examine the difference between these numbers. The qualifications that fall into this gap are

considered to be inactive qualifications. They are qualifications that are available during April to June 2012 but have not awarded in the 12 months to June 2012.

Figure 3 shows the number of inactive qualifications by type of qualification.

When we examine the types of inactive qualifications we find that the QCF has the most (5,594), followed by VRQs and NVQs.

The number of inactive QCF qualifications increased by 13 per cent compared with June 2011. These qualifications represent 48 per cent of all QCF qualifications, which means the remaining 52 per cent of all QCF have awarded achievements at some point during the 12 months to June 2012. As these are fairly new qualifications, we would expect this figure to increase as they begin to certify.


The number of inactive VRQs increased by one-third from June 2011. These qualifications represent 41 per cent of all VRQs. As some of these qualifications move onto the QCF, the old qualifications cease to award. Over time we expect the availability of both NVQs and VRQs to decline.


The number of inactive key skills and inactive basic skills qualifications has grown by 22 per cent and 69 per cent respectively. This is partly due to key skills and basic skills qualifications being replaced by new functional skills qualifications.

By June 2012 there were fewer inactive functional skills qualifications (39 compared with 48 the previous year). These qualifications were first introduced in 2010 and have begun to award during the period July 2011 to June 2012.

The number of inactive free-standing mathematics qualifications decreased from 4 in April to June 2011 to only one in April to June 2012. This represents a large percentage decrease (75 per cent), but as there is a total of 20 available free-standing mathematics qualifications, a high proportion (95 per cent) are still available to students.

Figure 4 shows the percentage of inactive qualifications by their age.





Of the inactive qualifications, 66 per cent were less than 2 years old and had not awarded during the past 12 months (37 per cent were less than one year old and almost one-third of the qualifications were between 1 and 2 years old). The majority of these qualifications are QCF qualifications that have not yet awarded. Other types of qualification include other general qualifications, entry level and functional skills qualifications. These are partly due to new science qualifications (categorised as occupational qualifications) which were first introduced in 2010 and functional skills qualifications which only became available in September 2010 and have not yet awarded.


Figure 5 also shows the number of inactive qualifications has reduced in the sector subject areas of arts, media and publishing, languages, literature and culture, and agriculture, horticulture and animal care.

Approximately 27 per cent of inactive qualifications are over 3 years old. These comprise mainly VRQs, NVQs, other general qualifications, and higher, key skills and entry level qualifications. The majority of these qualifications are being phased out as they are restructured onto the QCF. Figure 5 shows the number of inactive qualifications by sector.

The sectors subject areas of engineering and manufacturing technologies, and retail and commercial enterprise showed the highest number of inactive qualifications, representing 53 per cent and 52 per cent respectively of the total qualifications in the sectors.

Achievements in the 12 months to June 2012

In the 12-month period, ending June 2012, there were over 8 million achievements awarded in all regulated qualifications (except GCSEs, GCEs and the Diploma), an increase of 5 per cent on the same period ending June 2011 (see figure 6 below and table 2 in the appendix).

Figure 6 shows the trend in achievements per quarter and the 12-month periods to the end of each quarter.

Figure 6: Total number of achievements in vocational and other qualifications, between April to June 2007 (2007 Q2) and April to June 2012 (2012 Q2)



From figure 6 we see that the overall number of achievements increased from 5.1 million in the 12-month period to 2007 to around 8.2 million in the same period to 2012, representing an increase of 61 per cent across the five-year period. However, if we look at the trend over time, we see the line has started to flatten from 2010 quarter 3.

The number of achievements awarded in the 12 months to June 2012 by type of qualification is shown in figure 7 below.

During the 12 months to June 2012, there was a 5 per cent growth in achievements from 7.8 million achievements in 2011 to 8.2 million achievements in 2012. This growth was in line with the 8 per cent increase we saw in April to June 2012 (2 million achievements) compared with the same quarter of 2011(1.9 million).

From the table above, we can see the impact of the QCF, an increase of 135 per cent in the number of achievements awarded in this qualification type.

Achievements in functional skills also increased (by 65 per cent when comparing 12-month periods and by 23 per cent when comparing quarters). These qualifications were first available in September 2010 and, unlike other new qualifications, they are very active in awarding, partly due to their being a requirement of apprenticeship programmes.

Interestingly, achievements in key skills have decreased by 23 per cent in the 12 months to June 2012, (partly due to replacement by functional skill qualifications). Yet, if we compare achievements in the quarter April to June 2012 with achievements in April to June 2011, we see an increase of 25 per cent. This increase is partly due to the extension of key skills qualifications to September 2012.

Awarding organisations

The 50 awarding organisations with the most achievements during the quarter April to June 2012 are shown in table 4 in the appendix.

During April to June 2012, 132 awarding organisations awarded achievements, representing 75 per cent of all recognised awarding organisations. Of these organisations, 63 increased the number of achievements awarded compared with the same period in 2011 and 47 organisations awarded fewer achievements. Twenty-two organisations had awarded no achievements in April to June 2011.

If we consider the number of achievements by awarding organisation in the 12 months to June 2012, figure 8 shows the top ten awarding organisations. The awarding organisation coming top was Pearson Education Ltd (also known as Edexcel with 1.6 million achievements (a 14 per cent increase on same period in 2011). The organisation coming second was City & Guilds with 1.4 million achievements (a 1 per cent increase).


The 50 awarding organisations with the highest achievements in the 12 months to June 2012 are shown in table 5 in the appendix.


From table 5 we see that Skillsfirst Awards Ltd and Highfield Awarding Body for Compliance were the two organisations with the most growth, 146 per cent and 78 per cent respectively. This is not surprising, given that both organisations became recognised in April 2010.

We also see that AQA appears in 19th place when we examine the number of achievements in April to June 2012 (see table 4). Yet, if we compare AQA's achievements across the 12-month periods to June 2011 and June 2012 (in table 5) it appears in the top ten. This is due to the increase in functional skills achievements, which, for AQA, makes up approximately three-quarters of its total achievements.

The second graph in figure 9 shows the percentage growth and decline in the top ten organisations shown above.

Figure 9: The ten awarding organisations with the most achievements in the 12 months ending June 2012; the second graph shows percentage growth/decline (the red line representing average change for all qualifications of 5 per cent)





Of the top ten awarding organisations, NCFE had the most growth in achievements, with a 23 per cent increase to 258,150 achievements. NCFE was followed by EDI and the National Open College Network with increases of 20 per cent and 17 per cent respectively. The Chartered Institute of Environmental Health (CIEH) showed the greatest decline in achievements, with 298,450 a 16 per cent decrease compared with the same period in 2011.

Qualifications

The 50 qualifications with the most achievements in the quarter April to June 2012 are given in table 6 in the appendix.

There were achievements in 7,166 available qualifications during April to June 2012, representing 41 per cent of all available qualifications. This proportion is the same as April to June of 2011, when 6,182 qualifications awarded out of the 14,871 that were available, representing 41 per cent of the total available at the time.

The ten qualifications with the greatest number of achievements in the 12-month period to June 2012 are shown in figure 10 below. And table 7 in the appendix presents the 50 qualifications with the greatest number of achievements in the 12 months to June 2012.

Figure 10: Top ten qualifications during 12-month period ending June 2012 (equivalent figures for 2011 shown for comparison)




The qualification with the greatest number of achievements was the CIEH Level 2 Award in Food Safety in Catering, with 184,050 achievements during the 12-month period to June 2012. This qualification was previously a VRQ and has now been restructured and moved onto the QCF.

The ABRSM Level 1 Award in Music Performance shows 62 per cent fewer achievements awarded since June 2011. This is because the qualification transferred from being of type 'other general' to the QCF in August 2011, and the 59,700 achievements shown for the 12 months to June 2012 were the last set of achievements awarded.

Figure 11 shows the ten qualifications with the greatest number of achievements in the 12-month period to June 2012 and the second graph in figure 11 compares the percentage change in achievements by the top ten awarding organisations.

Of the top ten, the qualification Sports Leaders UK Level 1 Award in Sports Leadership showed the greatest percentage growth. With 55,650 achievements, it has over three times as many achievements as this time last year. This qualification became available on the QCF from September 2010.

The second qualification with the most percentage growth is the Edexcel Functional Skills qualification in Mathematics at Level 1. Its 46,400 achievements represent an increase of 160 per cent on the same period in 2011.

And if we look at the list of top 50 qualifications in table 7 in the appendix, we see that the Edexcel Functional Skills Mathematics Level 2 also grew by 204 per cent, with 38,750 achievements in 2012 compared with 12,750 achievements in 2011. The City & Guilds Functional Skills qualification in Mathematics at Entry 3 has grew by 210 per cent, with 35,500 achievements in 2012 compared with 11,450 achievements in 2011.


Sector subject area

Regulated qualifications are allocated to one of 15 sector subject area codes (see the glossary on our website for further details).

Total achievements by sector subject area during the quarter April to June 2012 are given in table 8 in the appendix. Table 9 gives a breakdown of achievements by sector subject area into second-tier subject areas.


Figure 12 shows the number of achievements in each sector subject area during the 12 months to June 2012. The sector that awarded the greatest number of achievements was preparation for life and work (2.8 million, representing 34 per cent of total achievements). Qualifications in this sector generally cover numeracy and literacy skills, ranging from basic skills, key skills and functional skills qualifications. Given the increase in functional skills this quarter, it is not surprising that this sector is also the largest.


Figure 12: Number of achievements by sector subject area during the 12-month period to June 2012







Figure 13: Achievements in each sector subject area by quarter between April to June 2007 and April to June 2012 (the black line representing average trend)


















The graphs to the right are presented on a scale of 100,000 achievements for comparability, except for social sciences, which is on a scale of 10,000 achievements as the numbers are much lower.



The sector for retail and commercial enterprise shows continual growth in the number of achievements awarded per quarter since quarter 4 of 2008. In quarter 2 of 2012, this sector awarded the more achievements than in any quarter 2 in previous years. The trend in health, public services and care has been one of decline over the past three years. The engineering and manufacturing technologies sector has fewer achievements this quarter compared with the same quarter in 2011, despite an overall trend of growth since 2007.

Figure 14 shows the number of achievements in each sector subject area during the 12-month period to June 2012, broken down by level of qualification.

We know that preparation for life and work saw the most achievements during the 12-month period to June 2012 (2.8 million, representing an increase of 12 per cent on the same period in 2011). This growth is primarily in qualifications at entry level and level 1, which have seen increases of 46 per cent and 13 per cent respectively.

Arts, media and publishing, the second largest sector in terms of number of achievements, has seen growth in all levels of qualification except level 3 which decreased only slightly by 2 per cent.

The sector for retail and commercial enterprise saw the highest levels of growth in the past 12 months – a 16 per cent increase to 751,700 achievements – and this growth is across all levels of qualification.

The largest decline was in the health, public services and care sector, a 20 per cent decrease overall primarily due to a reduction in achievements in qualifications at level 2 and above.

Country

Awarding organisations have been providing a breakdown of their achievements by country since April 2011. We now have information on achievements for a full 12-month period, and this bulletin is the first to report on country-level achievements.

Tables 10 to 12 in the appendix present the 50 awarding organisations with the most achievements for England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Figure 15 presents the number of achievements in each of the three countries and across all the countries combined.

We know achievements in QCF qualifications represent the largest proportion of total achievements in England, Wales and Northern Ireland combined. From figure 15 we see that QCF qualifications also dominate in England (52 per cent), Wales (35 per cent) and in Northern Ireland (53 per cent).

Key skills qualifications have a greater percentage of achievements in both Wales and Northern Ireland (18 per cent and 19 per cent respectively) than they do in England (7 per cent).

In Wales, achievements in other general qualifications represent 29 per cent of the total for Wales (137,450), but the proportion in both England and Northern Ireland is much smaller, 6 per cent and 9 per cent respectively.

Figure 16 shows the number of achievements during the 12-month period ending June 2012 by the sector subject area and the country in which the qualification was awarded.

The sector subject area preparation for life and work continues to dominate in both England and Northern Ireland (34 per cent and 30 per cent of the total respectively) and more prominently so in Wales with 51 per cent of the total. In Wales, the second largest sector in terms of the proportion of total achievements was retail and commercial enterprise with 22,450 achievements (7 per cent of the total). In Northern Ireland, the sector with the second largest share was arts, media and publishing with 4,750 achievements (15 per cent of the total). Arts, media and publishing is also the second largest sector in England alone and across all three countries together.




Figure 17: Top ten awarding organisations in England

During the 12 months to June 2012 in England, Edexcel awarded the highest number of achievements with over 1.5 million (representing 20 per cent of all achievements), followed by City & Guilds with 1.3 million (representing 17 per cent of the total).




Figure 18: Top ten awarding organisations in Wales




Figure 19: Top ten awarding organisations in Northern Ireland


