

Attainment of Level 3 by age 19

Impact Indicator 3: Proportion of young people attaining Level 3 by age 19

About the indicator

The indicator is the percentage of young people in England who have attained a full Level 3 qualification by the end of the academic year in which they turn 19. A full Level 3 equates to 2 or more A-levels or an equivalent qualification

Why we measure it

Attainment of Level 3 is seen as the minimum requirement for entry into higher education, and has demonstrable returns in the labour market - it is estimated that the lifetime productivity gain associated with two or more A levels, compared with getting 5 GCSEs (including maths and English), is around £80,000 (in 2008 prices).

A key aim of the Department for Education is to raise attainment for all children and young people. By measuring overall levels of attainment at Level 3, this indicator should also help to focus on narrowing the L3 as disadvantaged young people are currently less likely to achieve this.




Figure 1 - Attainment of Level 3 at 19
