This pack must be kept secure and unopened until the start of the test on **Tuesday 12 May**.

The levels 3–5 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test must be administered before the level 6 test. Paper 1: extended task must be administered before Paper 2: short answer questions and Paper 3: spelling task.

Early opening, up to 1 hour before the test starts, is permissible only if access to the contents is needed to make adaptations to meet individual pupil's needs.

#### Level 6 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test

The level 6 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test consists of 3 written papers. The papers must be administered in order. Pupils can have a break between the papers. However Paper 2 and Paper 3 must not be opened until the pupils are in the test room ready to complete each test.

#### Paper 1: extended task

The following information explains how to administer the level 6 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test Paper 1: extended task. If you have any questions you should check with your headteacher or key stage 2 test co-ordinator before the test begins.

Please make sure you follow these instructions correctly in order to avoid accusations of maladministration.

Format	<ul><li>This test consists of a single answer booklet.</li></ul>
	<ul> <li>Pupils will have 30 minutes to write an extended piece of writing in the answer booklet.</li> </ul>
Equipment	Required:
	<ul> <li>blue / black pens or dark pencils, pencil sharpeners and rubbers</li> </ul>
	Not allowed:
	<ul> <li>dictionaries, electronic spell checkers or bilingual word lists</li> </ul>
Assistance	Pupils should not require any assistance in the level 6 Paper 1: extended task. You must ensure that nothing you say or do during a test could be interpreted as giving pupils an advantage.
	If a pupil asks a question about test content, you must not explain subject-specific terms or expressions.
Before the test begins	<ul> <li>Review the list of pupils with any particular individual needs, eg pupils who are allowed additional time or who may need a transcript made at the end of the test. Ensure you know how to administer these access arrangements correctly.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>It is important that the pupils' names on their scripts match the names on the test attendance register. Check with your test co-ordinator whether any pupil in your group is known by a different name in school, or has changed their name since pupil registration. This is so you can remind the pupil to write the correct name on their answer booklet.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Check that there are enough administrators to maintain adequate supervision for the test.</li> <li>You should consider the possibility of at least 1 test administrator needing to leave the room with a pupil.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Ensure you understand how to deal with issues during the tests.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Write the school's name and Department for Education (DfE) number on a board that is visible to all pupils.</li> </ul>

# How to deal with issues during the test

It is impossible to plan for every scenario. Whatever action you take, pupil safety must always be your first consideration.

In the following circumstances you will need to stop the test either for an individual pupil or for the whole cohort:

- test papers are incorrectly collated or the print is illegible
- an incorrect test has been administered
- a fire alarm goes off
- a pupil is unwell
- a pupil needs to leave the test room during the tests
- a pupil is caught cheating

If you need to stop the test:

- make a note of the time
- make sure pupils are kept under test conditions and that they are supervised if they have to leave the room, ensure they don't talk about the test
- speak to your test co-ordinator or a senior member of staff for advice on what to do next

You should brief your headteacher on how the incident was dealt with once the test is over.

# What to do at the start of the test

- Check that pupils don't have mobile phones or other disruptive items.
- Check that pupils don't have any materials or equipment that may give them extra help.
- Check that spacing is appropriate and that no pupil can see another pupil's answer booklet.
- Ensure each pupil has a copy of the level 6 Paper 1: extended task answer booklet.
- Write the start and finish times on a board so that all the pupils can see them.

# What to say at the start of the test

It is important to brief pupils fully at the start of each test. You should use this script to introduce the Paper 1: extended task.

- This is the level 6 key stage 2 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test Paper 1: extended task.
- You should have the Paper 1: extended task answer booklet in front of you.
- You will need a blue / black pen or dark pencil, pencil sharpener and rubber for this test.
- You have 30 minutes to write an extended piece of writing in the answer booklet. You are expected to write up to 2 pages, however there is a blank page in the back of the booklet if you need to write more.
- Clearly write your name, school and DfE number on the front of your answer booklet. (If any pupil's name differs to the name provided during pupil registration, instruct the pupil to write both names on the paper.)
- Open your answer booklet to page 3. I will read the instructions to you.
- To make sure your writing is marked, don't write in the grey areas, on the barcode or on the lines at the top and bottom of the edge of the page and don't crumple your answer booklet.
- If you want to change your answer, put a line through the words you don't want the marker to read.
- Remember to check your work carefully.
- If you have any questions during the test, you should put your hand up and wait for someone to come over to you. Remember, I can't help you with your answers.

# What to say at the start of the test (continued)

- You must not talk to each other.
- Are there any questions you want to ask me now?
- I will tell you when you have 5 minutes left. I will tell you when the test is over and to stop writing.
- You may now start the test.

# What to do at the end of the test

- If any pupil needs a transcript, complete it with the pupil at the end of the test under test conditions. Particular care should be taken to ensure accurate transcriptions are made and pupil's answers are not corrected or amended.
- Ensure you inform your senior member of staff / test co-ordinator if you have made a transcript, or if a pupil has used a scribe, or word processor or other electronic or technical device. This is so that they can complete the appropriate online notification.
- Make sure you have collected every test script. Return them immediately to the senior members of staff who are responsible for collating the test scripts.

#### Do not:

- Look at, annotate or review pupils' answers in any way (unless it is necessary to make a transcript). If you amend or tamper with pupils' answers in test scripts, it will be considered maladministration and results could be annulled.
- Keep or photocopy test scripts for any reason.
