


Initial teacher education inspection outcomes

This initial teacher education (ITE) release contains provisional data for:

- outcomes from inspections completed in the 2014/15 academic year
- most recent inspection outcomes for all partnerships.

The proportion of partnerships inspected which were good or outstanding is lower this year than last year

Inspections of 17 partnerships were concluded in the 2014/15 academic year. Some 82% (14) of these partnerships were judged good or outstanding. This is lower than the 94% seen in 2013/14.



Three partnerships were judged less than good this year

The University of Essex was judged to require improvement in October 2014 and still required improvement at its next inspection in May 2015. Kent County Council was judged inadequate in October 2014.

Ninety eight percent of all partnerships were good or outstanding at their last inspection.

As of 30 June 2015, there were 231 open partnerships which had been inspected by Ofsted. Some 98% of these are good or better.

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Inspections between 1 September 2014 and 31 August 2015

Between 1 September 2014 and 31 August 2015¹, 11 ITE providers were inspected², resulting in 17 sets of inspection judgements for each age phase partnership. Eighty two percent of these 17 partnerships were judged good or outstanding. This is lower than the inspection outcomes for 2013/14 where 94% of partnerships were judged good or outstanding, but is equal to outcomes seen in 2012/13.

There were far fewer inspections concluded in 2014/15 compared to previous years (chart 1) because of the introduction of the two stage inspection process in June 2014. The two stage inspection process requires a second visit in the autumn term to observe the newly qualified teachers or former trainees. This introduced a lag in the conclusion of these inspections and, as a result, a dip in the number of inspections concluded in the 2014/15 academic year. Inspection volumes are expected to return to normal levels in 2015/16.

As chart 2 shows, all partnerships offering training in either primary or secondary education were judged good or outstanding this year. However two of the four further education partnerships were judged to require improvement and one of the two primary/secondary education³ partnerships (Kent County council) was judged to be inadequate.

The National College for Teaching and Leadership has withdrawn Kent County Council's accreditation so that they are no longer able to offer training that leads to the award of qualified teacher status. Kent County Council's initial teacher education provision closed on 1 July 2015.


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¹ The last of the 2014/15 inspections took place in May 2015 and was published in June 2015. The first stage of 2015/16 inspections took place in summer 2015, and will conclude in autumn 2015. The outcomes from these inspections will be reported in subsequent releases.

Two providers judged to require improvement at their previous inspection were inspected again in 2014/15. The University of Leeds improved to good for both primary and secondary phases. Further education provision at the University of Essex was judged still to require improvement.



Most recent inspections for initial teacher education providers

As of 30 June 2015⁴, there were 231 open partnerships that had been inspected by Ofsted. Some 98% of these partnerships were good or better, the same proportion as at 31 August 2014, and slightly higher than the 95% seen as at 31 August 2013.

Three partnerships were judged to require improvement and one as inadequate (table 3)⁵. All but one of these closed by 31 August 2015.

As of 30 June 2015, there were 66 open school centred initial teacher training partnerships (SCITTs) that had been inspected by Ofsted. All of these were judged to be good or outstanding at their most recent inspection. This is similar to the proportion of partnerships based in higher education institutions (HEIs) where 154 out of 156 (99%) partnerships were good or outstanding at their most recent inspection.

Ofsted has now completed inspections of 101 partnerships under the new framework that began in September 2012. This represents just under half (44%) of partnerships open on 30 June 2015 (table 3a).

Ninety six per cent of providers whose latest inspection was after 1 September 2012 are good or better compared to 100% of those last inspected prior to September 2012 (table 3b). The very positive profile of most recent inspection judgements is in part a reflection of the National College for Teaching and Leadership's policy for determining the number of trainees which each provider is eligible to accept. Where 'provision is repeatedly of requires improvement or lower quality'⁶, the National College for Teaching and Leadership will often withdraw trainee allocations until the partnership has been judged to be good. As a result, some providers close all or part of their provision upon being judged less than good.

Ofsted inspect weaker partnerships more frequently than stronger partnerships. The grade profile for partnerships last inspected prior to September 2012 is higher than

In order to publish official statistics which are timely and useful to users the data are being published in September rather than in December as in previous years. Most recent inspection outcomes are based on partnerships which were open on 30 June 2015 and therefore include some providers which have since closed.

the profile for those inspected since September 2012 (tables 3a and 3b). This is partly because any partnerships that were less than good in September 2012 have now been inspected under the current framework.
