Dame Christine Lenehan is seeking evidence on the experiences and outcomes of children and young people in residential special schools and colleges.

- people running or working in residential special schools or colleges
- children and young people who are attending, or have attended, residential special schools or colleges, and their parents/carers
- adults who have left residential special schools and colleges
- local authorities
- representative bodies from across the sector
- academics with an interest in special educational needs

About this consultation

The Minister of State for Vulnerable Children and Families has asked me to lead an independent review into the experiences and outcomes of children and young people in residential special schools and colleges, reporting in summer 2017. These children and young people are some of the most vulnerable in the country and I am delighted to have this opportunity.

The review will recommend the practical action that government departments and other agencies can take to support positive experiences and outcomes for these children and young people. Throughout the review, I intend to explore the following:

- the characteristics of the children and young people currently in residential special schools and colleges;
- how and why these children and young people come to be placed in residential special schools and colleges;
- the pattern of provision across the country and how it is commissioned and procured;
- what good quality support looks like for these children and young people, both pre- and post-placement (including the role of early intervention, family support and community services):
- the experiences and outcomes of these children and young people and their families, and how these can be improved;
- how schools and colleges are supported to meet the needs of these children and young people by all agencies;
- how effectively the workforce in residential special schools and colleges meets the needs of these children and young people; and
- destinations for these children and young people.

To ensure that this review is informed by as wide a range of views and evidence as possible, I am today launching a call for evidence, covering the areas set out above. I would like to hear from people working in residential special schools and colleges; children and young people attending residential special schools and colleges and their parents or carers; and children, young people and adults who have left residential special schools and colleges. I would also like to hear from local authorities, representative bodies from across the sector and academics with an interest in this area.

Additional information for children and young people and their families

If you are a child or young person who is resident in a residential special school or college, we would be particularly interested in your answers to the following questions:

- What are the best things about living in a residential special school or college?
- What are the worst things about living in a residential special school or college?
- What are the staff who look after you like?
- What would you like to do after living in a residential special school or college?

If you are the parent or carer of a child or young person who is resident in a residential special school or college, we would also be interested in your answers to the following questions:

- How did you find the process of getting a residential place?
- Are you happy with your child's residential placement?
- Are you supported to keep in touch with your child?
- What outcomes would you like to see from this placement?

Guidelines for responding

To assist the review secretariat with their analysis of the responses, each submission to this call for evidence should:

- · comprise a single document;
- be no longer than 2,000 words in length;
- include references for any evidence cited, where possible;
- state clearly who the submission is from, i.e. whether from yourself in a personal capacity or sent on behalf of an organisation;
- include a brief introduction about yourself/your organisation and your reason for submitting evidence; and
- link to published documents rather than reproducing their content.
