
## Education expenditure (UK)

- UK education expenditure increased consistently from the late 1990s to reach 5.6% in 2010-11; the highest rate since the mid 1970s.
- Substantial increases in education spending as a proportion of GDP ٠ occurred in the early 1990s and the decade from 1999-00.
- Spending has increased in real terms in most years since 1979-80. The ٠ only periods where it fell for two or more consecutive years were in the mid-1980s, mid-1990s and since 2010-11.
- Education and training expenditure was 5.8% of GDP in 2009-10. ٠ Real terms cuts to 2015-16 took it below 4.5% in 2016-17.
- The Treasury has excluded the (impairment) cost of student loans from ٠ these figures from 2011-12. If this were added back in, the 2011-12 total would still be below the 2010-11 level.
- The OECD ranked the UK highest out of 32 states on total education ٠ expenditure as a percentage of GDP in 2012.
- At 6.7% of GDP (OECD measure), total public and private UK . education spending was well above the OECD average of 5.2%.
