

1. National marketing activity – starts with TV campaign

If you've been tuning into the Educating Greater Manchester series on Channel 4, you'll have seen the new television advert to support our teacher recruitment campaign.

To support the campaign we'll also be visiting university graduate fairs and campuses from September.

3. UCAS - setting up entry profiles

Entry profiles are your opportunity to communicate with applicants and offer specific information about your training programmes; they're published in the UCAS Teacher Training search tool, which will open shortly, and will allow potential applicants to view your profile when they're researching their choices. If applicants are well informed, they're more likely to make targeted and appropriate applications that will make selection more efficient for you.

We recommend you update your profile before the 2018 UCAS Teacher Training search tool goes live in October 2017.

6. School experience programme – recruitment to ITT 2017

There is still time for potential candidates to access school experience for a 2017 ITT course.

Please ensure you upload your available placements onto the <u>School Experience Portal</u> to attract eager candidates who may have struggled meeting conditional offers around school experience over the summer. Candidates will start to book as soon as schools return after the summer holiday.

7. Trained teachers ready to teach in England – international recruitment

NCTL has access to a pool of fully qualified mathematics, physics and Spanish teachers recruited internationally; further subject specialisms are in the pipeline. Every teacher has been recruited using a thorough sifting and interview process and meets the high standards required to teach in England. Schools will also have the opportunity to interview candidates.

All teachers will receive an extensive acclimatisation package, inclusive of continuing professional development that will both support their transition into life in England and increase their knowledge of the national curriculum.

The recruitment and acclimatisation service is free to schools; we recommend that schools assign a teacher buddy or mentor to support faster integration.

8. Teacher subject specialism training (TSST) – courses now available for 2017 to 2018

TSST is available to improve the subject knowledge of non-specialist and returning teachers and increase the number of hours taught. For 2017 to 2018, it is available in mathematics, core maths, physics and modern foreign languages (MFL), and training is free for participants.

TSST is also available to specialist MFL teachers who are not currently teaching MFL but who want to return to an MFL role or those able to teach a new language in addition to their language specialism.

9. Teacher subject specialism training (TSST) – grant funding for modern foreign languages

Schools and sixth-form colleges can now apply for grant funding to design and provide TSST in modern foreign languages.

For the academic year 2017 to 2018, we are focusing on French, German and Spanish, but cases for other approved languages that count towards the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) will be considered against available funds.

The application round opens on Monday 11 September 2017 and closes at 5pm on Thursday 12 October 2017.

10. Call for evidence – does your school employ teachers from the EU?

The Migration Advisory Committee is currently collecting evidence from anyone with relevant knowledge, expertise or experience to help inform a response on the impact of the UK's exit from the European Union on the UK labour market, and how the UK immigration system should be aligned with a modern industrial strategy.

Schools with experience of recruiting teachers who are EU nationals will be in a good position to respond to this request.

11. Newly Qualified Teacher (NQT) - 2017 survey open

The NQT survey is taking place until the 9 October 2017. A sample group of NQTs will receive an email or letter inviting them to take part; they will be asked for their views on how well their training has prepared them for teaching.

If you have NQTs in your school, please ask them to look out for communications from Ipsos Mori, and encourage them to complete the survey.

12. Subject knowledge enhancement (SKE) courses – for inclusion in ITT census

If your trainee teachers completed SKE courses this year, don't forget to include them in this year's ITT census so that we know how many SKE trainees successfully progressed onto teacher training. If you're an ITT provider, you can do this in the ITT DMS system by simply selecting the correct SKE dropdown option.

13. School Direct (salaried) grant funding agreements 2017 to 2018

All lead schools that have recruited School Direct (salaried) trainees to NCTL allocated places in fundable subjects, due to commence training in autumn 2017 must have a grant funding agreement in place in order to receive funding.

New lead schools should complete the grant funding agreement for School Direct (salaried) 2017 to 2018 template and return to gfa.nctl@education.gov.uk as soon as possible, ensuring that the appropriate person has signed it as per the footnotes on page 3.

Schools that were lead schools in the academic year 2016 to 2017 are required to acknowledge the variations to Annexes E, F and G of the grant offer letter. Acknowledgement must come from the accounting officer and be sent from their email account.

We are unable to release grant funding until the grant offer letter or acknowledgement has been received and accepted by us.

14. SCITT annual return – academic year 2016 to 2017

We are currently working with the Institute of Chartered Accountants for England and Wales (ICAEW) to support robust assurance processes; this means a pre-populated 2016 to 2017 annual return (audit grant return) will be available in mid-October, to allow you to meet the December 2017 deadline.

For staff new to post, the annual return is our method for gaining assurance that all funds granted have been used in a true and correct manner, and for the intention given in your grant funding agreements. Funding covers ITT Bursaries, SKE, and early years ITT, and there is also a requirement to confirm trainee numbers.

The return deadline will still be the end of December 2017, so do include it in both your finance and audit plans over the autumn term. The annual return must be independently audited, signed off by the auditor, your accounting officer and chair of governors.
