ITT Recruitment 2019 to 2020 - request your places now

The window to request initial teacher training places for 2019 to 2020 opened on 4 June 2018 and will close at midday on Friday 22 June 2018. ITT providers and School Direct lead schools must inform us via the ITT data management system (DMS) of the subjects and routes in which they plan to offer ITT for 2019 to 2020 before this date.

All accredited ITT providers and School Direct lead schools were issued full guidance on 4 June 2018.

Prestigious scholarships open for applications - priority subjects

As you continue to recruit trainee teachers in physics, maths, chemistry, computing, languages or geography, please promote our prestigious scholarship schemes to your candidates.

Successful applicants receive a package of benefits, which includes:

- additional support to enrich their subject knowledge
- access to high quality continuing professional development
- an enhanced tax-free bursary of up to £28,000 (maths scholars receive a financial package made up of a £22,000 bursary during their ITT year, followed by two early-career bonus payments of at least £5,000)

The scheme targets the most-gifted trainees in these subjects. Candidates must have secured an ITT place allocated by the Department for Education (DfE) by September 2018. The course must lead to QTS

status. Applicants must have a 2.1 degree (or predicted) in a relevant subject. Candidates with a 2.2 (or predicted) may be considered if they can demonstrate significant subject knowledge.

DfE international STEM programme - now open for applications

The DfE international STEM programme covers all recruitment costs for high quality maths and physics teachers who have a minimum of 2 years' teaching experience and qualified teacher status.

The programme also has a school-led network in all regions of England, which work in partnership with international recruitment providers to source teachers from Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the USA.

The programme is open to state-funded secondary schools and academies, and offers free acclimatisation and continuing professional development (CPD) to support teachers' transition into the English school system.

Teacher workload toolkit update

We are continuing to work with the sector to develop a practical workload reduction toolkit, which will contain advice, tools and practical examples to help reduce teacher workload. We expect to publish the toolkit later this year.

On 10 March 2018, the department published reports from <u>12 school-based research projects</u> which looked into effective, efficient and sustainable school practice to reduce teacher workload whilst maintaining and improving standards. We've also published <u>a summary report</u> which draws together the findings from the 12 projects. Please review these reports and share key findings with your trainee teachers.

Teacher subject specialism training (TSST) - grant funding applications to deliver programmes for 2018 to 2019 now open

TSST is designed to improve the subject and pedagogical knowledge of non-specialist and returning teachers. It is aimed at teachers who already teach, or would like to teach, secondary maths, physics or MFL. As well as improving subject knowledge, TSST can help boost teacher confidence and improve skills.

We are inviting applications for grant funding to deliver TSST or coordinate provision. The local lead school role is to design and deliver TSST programmes; we have also introduced a regional lead school role to coordinate provision and further develop TSST, and aim to select a regional lead school for each of the eight regions.

Does your school have maths and physics A level students with predicted grades of B or above? The Future Teaching Scholars programme might be for them. Students should also be planning to study a maths- or physics-related degree at an English university and be interested in a career in teaching. The programme is also open to international students, mature applicants, and career changers with equivalent qualifications.

Participants benefit from a £15,000 grant and classroom experience whilst at university, followed by bespoke employment-based teacher training, earning while they train, and receive additional support for two years.

Recruitment is open for applicants starting university in autumn 2018.

The UCAS Teacher Training recruitment pilot will run again this year from Sunday 1 July 2018, when the number of working days training providers have to make decisions on applications will reduce from 40 to 20. During the pilot, applicants will still have 10 working days to accept an offer.

The pilot runs from Sunday 1 July 2018 until 6pm on Friday 28 September 2018. Applications received up to, and including, 30 June 2018 will still have 40 working days' consideration.
