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Introduction

The aim of this consultation is to seek views on a proposed increase to the application fee and the annual fee paid to Ofsted by childcare providers on the Early Years Register, with a view to changes coming into force from April 2020. We are also seeking views on the principles that should underpin a revised Early Years Register fee model to be introduced from April 2021.

The consultation will run for 12 weeks.

Who this is for

This consultation is of primary relevance to childcare providers registered on Ofsted's Early Years Register and others with an interest in early education and childcare, such as local authorities and sector representative or professional bodies.

Early years and childcare regulation in the UK is a devolved matter. As such, this consultation only applies to regulation in England.

The consultation was issued on 18 July 2019.

About this consultation

The aim of this consultation is to seek views from interested parties on proposed changes to The Childcare (Fees) Regulations 2008 (the "2008 Regulations") which were amended by The Childcare (Fees) (Amendment) Regulations 2010 (the "2010 Regulations"). These fees relate to the role and responsibilities of the Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (Ofsted) under the Childcare Act 2006.

This consultation seeks views on:

- A proposed increase, from April 2020, to the application fee and the annual fee paid to Ofsted by providers on the Early Years Register
- The principles that should underpin a revised Early Years Register fee model from April 2021

Background and context

Ofsted regulates and inspects all childcare providers on the Early Years Register. They are responsible for registering and inspecting early years and childcare provision to ensure it meets the standards for learning, development and care for children from birth to five, as set out in the <u>Early Years Foundation Stage</u> (EYFS) statutory framework. The application fee and the annual fee charged by Ofsted is determined by the Department for Education and set out in the <u>Childcare (Fees) Regulations 2008</u>, which were amended by <u>The Childcare (Fees) (Amendment) Regulations 2010</u>. The fees paid to Ofsted by providers on the Early Years Register have not changed since September 2010. Table 1 sets out the current application fee and the subsequent annual fee payable by different categories of childcare provider:

¹ "Domestic group providers" refers to 4 or more childminders who work together to offer childcare in a domestic setting that is not the child's own home. While they can register separately as individual childminders, they need to register separately (as a group) in order to work together, and pay either £35 or £220 depending on their registration and hours of operation.

The cost of inspection and regulatory activity is still substantiality subsidised by tax-payers, with childcare providers currently a long way from paying the full cost of regulatory activity delivered by Ofsted. In the financial year 2017/18, we estimate less than 20% of Ofsted's inspection and regulatory costs associated with the Early Years Register were recovered through fee income paid by providers².

HM Treasury guidance, <u>Managing Public Money</u>, establishes that the basic principle for charging by public sector organisations is that they should aim to recover the economic costs of their activities from customers through the fees they charge. In other Ofsted remits such as the inspection of children's social care settings, fees are either already at, or moving progressively closer to full cost recovery. However, although Ofsted fees represent a small proportion of childcare providers' overall expenses, we recognise that full cost recovery may be challenging for the early years sector.

The aim of the proposed fee increase is to help Ofsted recover more of the costs associated with childcare inspection and regulation. It is not being introduced as a consequence of Ofsted's recently published Education Inspection Framework (EIF). Therefore, we do not expect Ofsted to make any changes to how it delivers its regulatory function.

The purpose of this consultation is two-fold. Firstly, we set out details of a proposed increase in the fees paid to Ofsted by providers on the Early Years Register, to come into effect from April 2020. Secondly, we are seeking views on the principles that should underpin the development of a new fee model from April 2021 onwards. This is an initial consultation on a post-April 2021 model. Any proposals for a new registration fee model will be followed by a further technical consultation on detailed registration fee options – including estimated fee amounts.

Early Years Register

The annual fee paid by childcare providers on the Early Years Register has not changed since 2010 and the cost of inspection and regulation continues to be heavily subsidised by government. We plan to increase Ofsted application and annual fees for childminders, sessional providers and full day care providers as part of our long term approach to recovering more of the costs of inspection and regulatory activity. To minimise the impact this may have on childcare providers, the department plans to introduce an initial inflationary increase from April 2020³. This will be applied equally to all childcare providers on the Early Years Register as a percentage increase equalling the sum of inflation since 2010. Table 2 sets out the proposed fee increases from April 2020.

While the changes are expected to come into force from April 2020, existing providers will not be required to pay the increased annual fee until the next anniversary of the date on which they became registered on the Early Years Register. New providers wishing to join the Early Years Register from April 2020 will pay the increased application fee.

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³ To develop the fee proposals from April 2020, we have calculated an up-rate in the fees, which is based on the **Consumer Price Index** (CPI) inflationary increase between 2011/12 and 2018/19 (available via official ONS statistics) and the Bank of England's projection for 2019/20.

Developing a new Early Years Register fee model

The categories used to determine the level of fee payable by providers on the Early Years Register have not changed since 2010. We are seeking your views on whether these categories are still appropriate and whether we should take other factors into account in developing a new Early Years Register fee model. As a reminder, the current provider categories used to determine the Ofsted fee payable are detailed in Table 3 below.
