- The allocations for each school in the authority will be published in October 2020 and include schools that were maintained schools on 1 September 2020.

Authorities should not pay the premium to academies that converted before 1 September 2020, as they will receive their funding directly from ESFA.

Academies receive the premium directly from the Education and Skills Funding

The premium must be made available by the authority to the school irrespective of the existence of any deficit relating to the expenditure of the school's budget share. The premium is not part of schools' budget shares and is not part of the individual school's budget. It is not to be counted for the purpose of calculating the minimum funding guarantee.
