Department for Education (DfE) has implemented the NLE advisory group recommendations (published in February 2020). The teaching schools programme will end in August 2021 and there will be no further designations to this programme. We recently confirmed that 87 schools have been selected as teaching school hubs (TSH), forming centres of excellence for teacher and leadership training and

development, focusing mainly on the Department's 'golden thread' of Initial Teacher Training (ITT), the Early Career Framework (ECF) and National Professional Qualifications (NPQs). DfE is implementing recommendations for NLG reform, published in September 2020, and there will be no further NLG designation rounds until this work is concluded. The
