INTRODUCTION - SCOTTISH EXECUTIVE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Given the recent constitutional changes in Scotland, the role of education in preparing our young people to be outward looking citizens of the world is likely to become ever more important. The Scottish Parliament is concerned to ensure that Scotland takes full advantage of the many opportunities available to students and staff in education and training on the international stage.

This booklet provides a first stop, basic information resource on a range of international opportunities that are available to the education, training, youth and community sectors in Scotland. Details where further information can be obtained are included at relevant points. There are several Agencies which can offer full advice and information to all those interested in exploring the exciting possibilities open to us in Scotland to work and/or study abroad – details of what they can offer, their addresses, telephone numbers, email addresses and, where appropriate, websites are also given. We expect that after identifying an area of work or a possible funding source, the reader of this booklet will contact the agency direct for full details of how to go about accessing the assistance they need.

This booklet will be distributed to every school, college and university in Scotland and can also be viewed on the Scottish Executive website www.scotland.gov.uk. It will be published and distributed annually until every school is linked to the National Grid for Learning. Education establishments will then be able to view and download information directly from the website. Paper copies will continue to be made available on demand. 3 EUROPEAN FUNDING PROGRAMMES

Many opportunities arise through the European programmes SOCRATES, LEONARDO and YOUTH. All three of these programmes began new phases in 2000. The contact point listed for each area will be happy to provide up to date information and advice, particularly on transitional arrangements between former and current programmes.

3.1 SOCRATES

SOCRATES is the European Union's action programme in the field of education. The programme aims to support the participating countries' policies to improve the quality of education and encourage lifelong learning. The second phase of the SOCRATES programme runs from January 2000 to December 2006 and comprises eight Actions:

- Comenius (school education)
- Erasmus (higher education)
- Grundtvig (adult education and other educational pathways)
- Lingua (the learning of foreign languages)
- Minerva (Open and Distance Learning and ICT in education)
- Observation and Innovation
- Joint Actions
- Accompanying Measures

The following broad types of activity may be supported:

- Mobility of pupils, students, teachers and lecturers
- The use of ICT in education
- The development of Networks to facilitate the exchange of experience and good practice
- Promoting foreign language skills and inter-cultural understanding
- Transnational pilot projects designed to develop innovative teaching, training and assessment materials
- Observation and analysis of education policies and systems

Joint Actions

The emphasis on lifelong learning and the increasing convergence of training and education call for greater cohesion between Community programmes. Under Joint Actions, possibilities exist for pilot projects which work across SOCRATES, LEONARDO and YOUTH programmes. A Call for proposals will be issued by the European Commission which details such aspects as selection criteria, application procedures and support available.

3.2 LEONARDO DA VINCI

LEONARDO da Vinci is the European Commission's main action programme in the field of vocational training. The programme's aim is to support Member States' policies to improve the quality of vocational systems and their capacity for innovation through transnational partnerships.

LEONARDO II lasts for seven years: from January 2000 to December 2006. This programme is much simpler than the original LEONARDO programme, focusing on three main objectives:

- Improve the skills and competencies of people, especially young people, in initial vocational training through for example, work-linked training and apprenticeship
- Improve the quality of, and access to, continuing vocational training and lifelong learning
- Promote innovation through training, to improve competitiveness and entrepreneurship, and to foster co-operation and partnership

Particular attention will be paid to people at a disadvantage in the labour market and the promotion of equality. The use of ICT is actively encouraged throughout the whole programme. These actions will be implemented through the following types of measures, in the form of transnational operations that may combine several of the measures:

- Support for the transnational mobility of people undergoing vocational training, especially young people, and for those responsible for training
- Support for pilot projects based on transnational partnership designed to develop innovation and quality in vocational training
- Promotion of language competencies including less widely taught languages, and understanding of different cultures in the context of vocational training
- Support for the development of transnational co-operation networks facilitating exchange of experience and good practice
- The development and updating of reference materials through support for surveys and analysis, comparable data, the observation and dissemination of good practices and the comprehensive exchange of information
- Joint actions with other EU programmes

LEONARDO da Vinci aims to add a European dimension to vocational training by supporting:

Placement projects

These projects provide opportunities for individuals from the UK to spend three weeks to one year working in another European country as part of their vocational training. Applications involving Modern Apprentices and young workers are particularly encouraged. These work-based placements aim to

promote the acquisition of new skills and competencies including the development of foreign language skills and provide access to new working practices.

Trainer visits

Aimed at those involved in the delivery or design of training, grants are available to support short visits of one to six weeks to other European countries.

Costs

Grants can cover up to 75% of total costs.

How to apply

There are normally three application deadlines per year.

Funding is available for UK organisations who are involved in sending work based trainees, including students, from HE institutions to undertake training placements that focus on enhancing vocational, linguistic and key skills.

Opportunities also exist for trainers who wish to update their professional skills and look at good practice in innovative training provision.

3.3 GRUNDTVIG

Grundtvig is the action of SOCRATES which aims to strengthen the European dimension in adult education and lifelong learning. It targets adult learners, teachers and trainers in both formal and non-formal education across Europe in a range of projects and initiatives, and reflects a commitment at national and European level to ensure learning opportunities continue throughout life.

European Co-operation projects (Grundtvig 1)

Partnerships of organisations which develop teaching and training materials and approaches in adult education, awareness raising activities and methods for assessing and recognising adult learning.

Learning Partnerships (Grundtvig 2)

Partnerships involving adult learners who work together with other learners from across Europe on projects of common interest.

Training grants (Grundtvig 3)

For staff involved in adult education to undertake training courses and activities abroad.

Networks

Supporting networks of organisations involved in Grundtvig, enabling them to share best practice, exchange information and ideas and support the development of further projects.

3.4 MINERVA

Minerva supports innovation in Open and Distance Learning (ODL) and the use of information and communication technology (ICT) in education. Its main aims are to promote understanding of the role of ODL and ICT in education, to ensure a balance between pedagogical and technological input in the development and use of ICT-based tools, and to open up access to ODL and ICT to learners of all ages, levels and abilities across Europe.

Projects supported under Minerva may aim to produce new learning approaches and tools or to survey and analyse particular aspects of the role of ODL and ICT in education.

3.5 YOUTH

YOUTH is the European Commission's main action programme in the youth field and in the promotion of informal education and lifelong learning. The programme particularly assists young people who, for cultural, social, physical, economic or geographical reasons find it more difficult to participate in programmes at Community, national, regional or local level.

YOUTH lasts for seven years; from January 2000 to December 2006 and has 5 actions:

- 1. Youth for Europe
- 2. European Voluntary Service
- 3. Youth Initiatives
- 4. Joint Actions
- 5. Support measures

These actions will be implemented through the following types of measures, in the form of transnational operations that may combine several of the measures:

- Support for the transnational mobility of young people
- Support for the use of information and communication technologies (ICT) in the youth field
- Support for the development of European level co-operation networks permitting mutual exchanges of experience and good practice
- Promotion of language skills and understanding of different cultures
- Support for pilot projects based on transnational partnership designed to develop innovation and quality in the youth field
- Development at Community level of methods for analysis, follow-up and dissemination of good practice of youth policies and their evolution (eg Databases, key figures, mutual knowledge of "systems")

Joint Actions

The emphasis on lifelong learning, and the increasing convergence of training and education, calls for greater cohesion between Community Actions. It is likely that certain activities will cut across the education (SOCRATES) and YOUTH programmes. 3.6 EUROPASS

EUROPASS, the Community Initiative that came into effect on 1st January 2000 is a passport like document which sets out to assist mobility by providing a transparent and voluntary means of recording periods of training undertaken by trainees outside the Member State in which their training is based. The European Pathway (a period of work linked training in another Member State) must be part of a structured vocational training programme. Like a European "Record of Achievement", it outlines key skills and activities completed by the students during their placements. EUROPASS is currently being linked to existing training programmes such as LEONARDO da Vinci, Training Bridge and IAESTE, although application forms are available for external promoters.

4.1 INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES FOR PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS

4.1.1 Teacher Exchange and International Study Visits opportunities.

British Council Scotland and Developing Effective International Education Practice (DEIEP) contact details in Chapter 5.2, page 25, provide the following services and programmes which can be accessed by teachers, education providers and staff working in Primary and Secondary schools.

UK / US Teacher Exchange

Participants work in all levels and sectors of the education system from kindergarten to further education and in a range of subject areas. Many undertake their partners' duties exactly. In the other cases more flexible arrangements are made. Scottish teachers and lecturers are also required to undertake a professional project agreed with their home school. There is now greater flexibility with shorter-term exchanges and Headteacher workshadowing.

UK / Europe Teacher Exchange

The majority of these post-to-post exchanges offer valuable in-service training for language teachers who are able to improve their linguistic skills, update their knowledge of the culture and develop opportunities for their students in terms of correspondence links, student exchanges, joint curriculum projects, work placements and exchanges of video and other materials. Applications from other subject teachers and from those teaching at primary level may in some circumstances be accepted but a high degree of fluency would normally be required. For exchanges with Denmark knowledge of the language though desirable, is not essential.

UK / Europe Non-linguist Teacher Exchange

As noted above, the exchange programme with other European countries is primarily aimed at language teachers. However, where a school already has established contacts, and has an agreed exchange proposal with a foreign school, it may be possible to support the proposal.

International Study Visits

British Council Scotland and DEIEP provide opportunities for facilitating the study of particular aspects of a foreign educational system.

4.1.2 Exchanges and Study visits with Commonwealth Countries

The League for the Exchange of Commonwealth Teachers (LECT) – contact details at chapter 5.3, page 28 facilitate the following visits and exchanges among and within Commonwealth countries which can be accessed by Primary and Secondary Schools.

Calendar and Academic year exchanges

These exchanges are organised on a post to post basis with successful applicants exchanging accommodation as well as jobs. In most cases LECT will find exchange partners for applicants although they also assist teachers who have identified their own exchange partner – perhaps through a long-standing link with their school or community.

Short term exchanges

Short-term programmes vary in length from two weeks to one or two terms and can take the form of exchange study visits or job shadowing. All applicants for short-term programmes must be supported by their school/LEA, they must have clear learning objectives and must be able to demonstrate how the proposed programme enables part of the school/LEA's Development Plan to be met. Applicants will also be asked to demonstrate how they intend to disseminate the results of their visit both within and outside their school. These exchanges may be either simultaneous or consecutive.

Study visits within Commonwealth countries

Study visits may be undertaken by individuals or groups sponsored by schools or LEAs and can take between one week and a month.

Opportunities for all teachers

All programmes are open to all teachers in schools and FE colleges, as well as qualified teachers working as teachers in other institutions – for instance in Adult Education, prisons, hospitals, theatres, etc. The short programmes are open to professions other than, but allied to teaching; i.e. educational administration.

Job shadowing for head teachers

These programmes are arranged between UK heads and principals of schools overseas, the participant agrees the duration of the visit with their overseas partner (usually between two and four weeks). Job shadows can be either one way or reciprocal and participants will usually stay in the home of their exchange partner.

4.1.3 SOCRATES

British Council Scotland – contact details in Chapter 5.1, page 24, are responsible for the implementation and administration of all elements of the SOCRATES programme including Comenius 1, 2 and 3. The Comenius Action of the EU's SOCRATES programme provides a range of opportunities for joint curriculum projects with schools in other countries and initial and in-service training projects and courses for school education staff.

Comenius 1

Comenius School Projects involve at least three schools across at least three countries who work together on a cross-curricular project for up to three years.

Comenius Language Projects involve students aged 14-25 in two schools who take part in a curriculum project which includes a reciprocal two-week exchange of students in order to help improve foreign language skills.

Comenius School Development Projects support partnerships of schools who co-operate on a variety of school management or development issues.

All applicants for Comenius 1 projects (as well as for Comenius Language Assistants-see below) must be contained within a Comenius Plan, which is submitted at the same time as the project application. The Comenius Plan allows schools to place all their European activities within one overall framework. Funding is also available for a preparatory visit in order to lay the foundation for a Comenius 1 project.

Comenius 2

Supports initial and in-service training through providing training bursaries for teachers, trainee teachers and other staff. Courses normally centre around one of the following themes: supporting the European dimension in schools; raising achievement whilst ensuring pupils with special needs are integrated into the class; the teaching of foreign languages; supporting the children of Gypsies, Travellers, occupational travellers and migrant workers and those at risk of exclusion or discontinuity in education.

Comenius Language Assistants are prospective teachers of foreign languages from other countries who support the European dimension across the curriculum and may also help teach their native language

Comenius 3

Institutions who are or have been involved in Comenius 1 and 2 may also apply to become part of a Comenius Network under Comenius 3. The Networks themselves share innovation, best practice, experience and research in the field of school education. Outcomes from Networks could include conferences, publications and teaching materials.

4.1.4 MontageWorld

MontageWorld is a global web-based programme of collaborative curriculum projects, which encourages international communities.

Made by teachers for teachers, it encourages global communication, creates virtual communities, provides practical and educationally valid activities and develops research, problem-solving and communication skills.

MontageWorld is now being localised out to a number of country sites to allow greater relevance to local needs and enable more focused linking with UK schools.

What's in it for pupils?

MontageWorld Internet projects are used for motivating students and creating more effective learning. Pupils become involved in real life situations that require communication, collaboration, self-directed learning, problem solving, researching and the publishing of findings. The projects set up a purpose or goal and require pupils to work with others using the Internet. They may seek information, relay their findings or work directly with students in another place.

Other benefits include:

- Gaining cultural understanding of other societies
- Promoting good literacy, numeracy and communication skills therefore raising standards
- Providing opportunities for pupils to learn about new technologies by developing websites in the learning process
- Encouraging collaboration and group activities
- Gaining a wider general knowledge

What's in it for Teachers?

- Assists teachers to become confident and successful in the use of online technology
- Provides examples of teaching and learning using online methodology
- Gaining knowledge of new and emerging technologies
- Taking education beyond the classroom into the global community
- Linking to the worldwide British Council network (offices in 109 countries and 230 towns and cities)
- Providing professional development resources and opportunities
- Building on-line educational communities

4.1.5 International School Linking

Windows on the World

Windows on the World is a website set up by the British Council to link schools and colleges worldwide and promote international curriculum projects. It offers advice and guidance on developing partnerships and projects; highlights a range of exciting activities undertaken by school/college partnerships across the world; provides hotlinks to other related website and includes an interactive partner-finding database.

North South School Linking

NSSL supports and promotes school partnerships between the UK and Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean and South Asia. Advice is available on types of partnerships, initial approaches, curriculum development and setting up teacher and pupil exchanges. A database of links is held which can help put schools in touch with each other, especially if they are setting up partnerships in the same area or planning similar kinds of projects. Workshops are run at which educators can share ideas and experiences. An evaluative report has been commissioned and guidance has been published offering practical advice to teachers and educators involved in all aspects of development education through linking. A termly bulletin is produced and funding is available for reciprocal teacher visits and curriculum development projects.

East West Schools Programme – Linking Schools in Great Britain and Ireland

Following the Good Friday Agreement, the East-West Schools Programme Initiative was set up to strengthen school partnerships between young people in Ireland and Great Britain. The Initiative has the following aims:

- To promote school partnerships and opportunities for transnational cooperation and mobility
- To focus on young people and their teachers
- To contribute to the professional development of teachers
- To bring added value to the learning experience
- To target the school in its widest sense

There are 4 strands of activity:

- Seminars for partner finding
- Grants for preparatory visits enabling teachers to meet to plan and develop projects within the partnership
- Funding for joint projects to include project-related field trips for pupils
- Two-week exchanges for teachers

Both North South School Linking and East West Schools Programme are the responsibility of British Council Scotland.

Commonwealth Linking Trust

The Commonwealth Linking Trust was developed from the work of the Commonwealth Youth Movement and is an educational charity. More than 3,400 schools have been linked in 40 Commonwealth countries since the 1950s involving tens of thousands of school pupils. The purpose of fostering international understanding through sharing educational experiences has much in common with the League for the Exchange of Commonwealth Teachers. Many teachers have arranged links between schools through the Commonwealth Linking Trust.

Foreign Language Assistants

Foreign language assistants are undergraduate students or recent graduates who elect to spend a year abroad as part of their Higher Education course. The majority are specialising in English and most plan to become teachers. They tend to be products of systems which emphasis an understanding of the grammatical basis of their own language. A few come from commercial or technical backgrounds and bring specialist language skills.

Foreign Language Assistants in Scottish Schools

A Foreign Language Assistant could be a good investment if your school is:

- Training students for examinations which emphasis oral performance
- Anxious to promote a positive image of language learning
- Becoming more involved in European projects
- Keen for pupils to have the personal and social development benefits of interacting with young people from abroad
- Concerned to help staff keep their language skills up to date

What do they do?

They give support in the language classroom by:

- Stimulating genuine classroom communication in the foreign language
- Assisting the teacher in oral work in the classroom (group work, role play, etc) or working with small groups of students away from the classroom
- Enabling more students to take part in individual conversations in the foreign language
- Bringing the foreign country and its culture into the classroom
- Producing authentic resources for use in the classroom
- Bringing printed and recorded materials from their country

They can also contribute by:

Helping language staff keep their skills up-to-date

- Assisting with the running of international projects throughout the school
- Being available to help other subject departments in promoting the European Dimension
- Visiting local primary schools to work with pupils and/or teachers

4.1.6 Achievers International®

Achievers International® is an entrepreneurial programme which allows school and college students to import and export products with an international partner school(s). Over 25,000 students (aged 7-25) from more than 30 countries have participated in Achievers International® since 1995.

At the start of the academic year, students form companies and link with an overseas partner school(s). The students communicate on a weekly basis using e-mail, fax and video conferencing. Companies source products, exchange samples, conduct market research, import and export. Each company is responsible for selling its imports to the local community.

Students raise capital to pay for shipping/customs charges on imports by selling shares, getting sponsorship and holding fund raising events. Many students have also become involved in other ventures, such as running the school tuck shop, vending machine or book exchange. Through arrangements with programme sponsors, all UK companies are entitled to free banking and discounted shipping services, as well as a wide range of business advice.

As Achievers International® concerns real business in real time, there are challenges to meet. Creativity and entrepreneurship are continually developed. Students gain and enhance skills essential to the world of work – teamwork, communication, problem solving, confidence and self-esteem to name a few. As mentors and facilitators, teachers see the benefits for students, and their working relationships.

Achievers International® is very flexible and can run as part of various Higher and Standard Grade courses, or as a stand-alone extra curricular activity. Participating in the programme also creates many new opportunities such as exchange trips, parental involvement, external business support, town twinning relationships etc. It should also be noted that many schools run Achievers International® with their Comenius partners.

4.1.7 Council of Europe In-Service Training Programme for Educational Staff

This programme is a Council of Europe activity and falls within the framework of the Council for Cultural Co-operation (CDCC). It enables teachers, headteachers, school inspectors/pedagogical advisors and teacher trainers from 47 CDCC member States to take part in:

- Short national in-service training courses (three to five days) held in one of those countries
- A week-long European seminar held four times a year in Donaueschingen (Germany), organised by the Council of Europe with the German authorities and the Land of Baden-Wartenburg

The programme's objectives are:

- To help educational staff to widen their cultural horizons, enrich their professional experience and disseminate knowledge
- To help them exchange ideas, information and teaching material and establish links with colleagues in their countries
- To associate educational staff more closely with the Council of Europe's work on education

4.2 INTERNATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR FE COLLEGES

4.2.1 Scotland / US Teacher Exchange

Participants work in all levels and sectors of the education system from kindergarten to further education and in a great range of subject areas. Many undertake their partners' duties exactly. 4.2.3 CEDEFOP

The CEDEFOP study visit programme provides opportunities to find out more about vocational training in another European country. An important objective is to encourage the exchange of ideas and share best practice. Through this European Union programme, themed study visits are organised for groups of 10-12 people from different countries. Participants are vocational training specialists from a wide range of organisations including colleges of further education.

What does a visit involve

General visits provide an overview of training for young people or training for adults in the host country. More focussed visits look at specific issues such as quality assurance, ICT and small businesses and skills acquisition. You will have the opportunity to visit training providers and companies.

How to apply

You can apply twice a year, normally in April and September.

Costs

Grants are awarded to help cover travel and accommodation.

4.2.4 League for the Exchange of Commonwealth Teachers (LECT)

Opportunities for all teachers

All of the exchange programmes and study visits described under the section on International Opportunities for Primary and Secondary Schools organised through the LECT are also open to all teachers in FE colleges, as well as qualified teachers working as teachers in other institutions – for instance in Adult Education, prisons, hospitals, theatres, etc.

4.3 INTERNATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR HE INSTITUTIONS

4.3.1 League for the Exchange of Commonwealth Teachers (LECT)

All of the International Opportunities available to teachers under the LECT in earlier chapters are also open to teacher educators in the Higher Education sector. However these will be examined closely for relevance to teachers/students areas of importance.

4.3.2 Erasmus

Erasmus is the Higher Education Chapter of the SOCRATES programme. It is based on co-operation between Higher Education Institutions in the EU, EEA, the Associated East and Central European countries, Cyprus, Malta and, it is expected, Turkey.

Each participating institution must submit an application to the European Commission for an Institutional Contract to support their co-operation with other institutions in the organisation of student mobility, teacher mobility, curriculum development and involvement in Thematic Networks. Each institution is also required to indicate in its Institutional Contract application any other part of the SOCRATES programme in which it plans to participate such as Comenius, Grundtvig, Lingua or Minerva.

Student mobility represents the major part of the programme and involves students spending a minimum of 3 months and a maximum of 12 months in a partner institution taking a programme of study for which they receive full academic recognition. Students may receive an Erasmus student grant to help with the additional costs of their study period abroad.

More and more institutions participating in the programme are using the European Credit Transfer System. This is designed to help students and academic staff have a common understanding of the different course structure and weightings in all European Higher Education Institutions by allocating credits to course units on the basis that a normal academic year of study is equal to 60 ECTS credits.

Universities that adopt ECTS agree to implement a code of practice providing clear and detailed information to students on course content, level and methods

of assessment. A Learning Agreement is concluded involving the student, the student, the home and the host institution and the host institution provides a transcript at the end of the period of study.

Erasmus also provides support for Teacher Mobility and for Curriculum Development projects. In addition there are large Thematic Networks covering the major subject areas and issues which cut across subject boundaries.

4.3.3 English Language Assistant Opportunities Abroad

The English Language Assistant Scheme is administered by British Council Scotland in Edinburgh on behalf of the Scottish Executive Education Department and is aimed at students, graduates and young teachers from Scotland. English Language Assistant posts are expected to be available for the academic year 2002-03 in Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Canada (Quebec), Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, Ecuador, France, Germany, Guatemala, Italy, Mexico, Netherlands, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Peru, Portugal, Russia, Spain, Switzerland, Uruguay and Venezuela. Candidates should usually be between 20 and 35 years of age. Normally university modern language under-graduates who will have completed their second year at the time of taking up the appointment, colleges of education students, graduates or modern language teachers with no more than 2 years' service at the time of accepting the Assistantship.

Closing Date

The closing date for the receipt of application for the year 2003-04 is 31 January 2003. Students will obtain further information and application forms from their University department. Others should contact British Council Scotland – contact details in Chapter 5.1, page 24.

4.3.4 International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE)

The IAESTE programme was founded at Imperial College in 1948 and since that time over 21,000 students from the UK have travelled as IAESTE trainees to

undertake course-related training abroad. IAESTE now comprises 70 member countries and remains true to its original aims to promote international understanding and goodwill amongst students from all nations while fostering the exchange of technical knowledge and helping to globalise tomorrow's workforce of scientists and engineers. The IAESTE programme is conducted as an exchange between member countries, and placements are set up on a broadly reciprocal basis.

Through IAESTE undergraduates may secure short-term vocation training abroad, usually for periods of 2 to 3 months in the summer. Placements are available in industrial and commercial organisations, research institutes, local government bodies, state enterprises, consultancies, laboratories and academic institutions. Longer term placements are sometimes available (primarily in computing), but departments offering sandwich degrees should be aware that IAESTE cannot guarantee that the appropriate long term offers will be available in a given year, nor that the IAESTE administrative timetable will suit the departmental schedule. Knowledge of a foreign language is not a pre-requisite for applicants.

IAESTE UK offers an effective placement and administrative service to students seeking international work-based learning relevant to their course of study, encouraging them to take a more global approach to their chosen careers. Through the newly founded *IAESTE UK Trainee of the Year Awar*d, which exercises key skills in communication, and fosters management of personal and career development, students are encouraged to take a pro-active approach to their placements.

The programme is open to full time undergraduates, aged between 19 and 30, who are studying science and engineering, agriculture and architecture, and related fields. Applicants should contact IAESTE UK on an individual basis and register in the autumn term (before 10 December) for placements beginning the following summer. Priority will be given to those in their penultimate year of study who are either UK nationals or normally resident in the UK. Students (or their departments) who can raise reciprocal offers in the UK for foreign students will also be prioritised.

4.4.2 Commonwealth Youth Exchange Council

CYEC is an educational charity and national voluntary youth organisation. It promotes two-way exchanges between locally based groups of young people in the UK and their counterparts in the Commonwealth. CYEC works closely with youth and community education organisations and schools throughout the UK.

CYEC's exchange model is both a programme for increasing international awareness and a means of meeting social education and personal development objectives. Exchanges are open to young people from all sections of the community. Projects require considerable commitment from young people over a two year period – from planning, preparation and fund-raising through visiting and hosting, to follow on activities. Young people participate fully in the ownership and management of the exchange in order to develop their skills, knowledge, awareness and understanding. A Personal Record of Achievement (PRA) linked to core skills is available for young people to pursue throughout the exchange.

To be eligible for funding, groups should comprise 5 -13 young people aged 16-25 plus 2 leaders, on visits of at least 21 days. CYEC prioritises exchanges with Africa, Asia and the Caribbean involving young people who would not normally have access to international opportunities. Exchanges that are primarily classroom based and curriculum based are not funded: so school exchanges must be based on informal education with themes appropriate to young people and their communities.

5 FUNDING AGENCIES

There are three principal funding agencies which administer the bi-lateral and multi-lateral international education opportunities available in Scotland. Details of these agencies are noted below, and the specific opportunities that they administer are set out in the relevant chapters of this booklet. In addition, Connect Youth is the UK National Agency for international programmes for young people and those who work with young people. Further details of the Connect Youth can be found in Chapter 5.4, page 29.

5.1 British Council Scotland

All activity previously undertaken by the Central Bureau for International Education and Training (CBIET) is now promoted within the British Council (Education and Training Group). The Education and Training Group of British Council is the UK national office for information and professional advice on education exchange, the administration of exchange programmes and support for the development of an international dimension in education and training. Education and Training Group's principal aim is to improve education and training provision in the United Kingdom through international opportunities for mobility, linking and exchange, partnerships and vocational and in-service training.

The British Council Scotland's education services enhance the quality of learning provision, especially in the areas of foreign languages, communications and other key skills. They add value to primary and secondary education and curriculum development, thereby raising standards of achievement and extending the professional development of educators.

British Council (Education and Training Group) is the principal national agency for the administration of many parts of European Union programmes such as SOCRATES, LEONARDO and YOUTH. The Education and Training Group activity in British Council Scotland is funded by the Scottish Executive Education Department. The former CBIET in Scotland, now British Council Scotland (Education and Training Group) has over twenty-five years' experience of international work in the field of education. 5.2 Developing Effective International Education Practice (DEIEP)

The pilot initiative commenced in September 1998 with the aim of examining ways of promoting staff development opportunities overseas, which reflected national educational priorities and key targets/issues of those thirteen local authorities involved in the partnership. The local authorities are:

Argyll and Bute North Lanarkshire
East Ayrshire Renfrewshire
East Dunbartonshire Stirling

East Renfrewshire South Ayrshire
Glasgow South Lanarkshire
Inverclyde West Dunbartonshire

North Ayrshire

The national agencies, the League for the Exchange of Commonwealth Teachers and the British Council Scotland, which are funded directly from the Scotlish Executive Education Department, work in partnership with the consortium awarding annually, a global sum to be used for all international continuous professional development opportunities

The immediate purpose of the DEIEP pilot project was to identify how certain aspects of teacher exchanges and international study visits could be improved and how such learning experiences for teachers might be brought clearly into the field of continuing professional development (CPD). The wider purpose was to help move the education system towards establishing clear, up-to-date standards and performance measures for international continuing professional development (ICPD).

The experiences of the DEIEP pilot initiative suggests that it is possible to stimulate ICPD opportunities which will have a national benefit to raising standards in education and career development for educators.

Evidence and research undertaken enabled a holistic and co-ordinated approach to be adopted that has produced a sound infrastructure and support

system that has enabled local authorities to focus on accessing ICPD opportunities available to them that reflect their key educational targets/issues to raising achievement within education. It also gave them the flexibility to manage more effectively their co-ordination of international education.

The structure developed through DEIEP I:

- Is systematic and developmental
- Provides local authorities with flexible identifiable pathways to progress International Continuous Professional Development
- Offers a range of opportunities to every level (but particularly in the DEIEP format) to promoted staff within an educational context
- Relates to the needs of education authorities, its educational establishments and staff by operating a system of selection of personnel and key educational topics/issues of their choosing within the context of national educational priorities. (Eighteen key educational targets/issues have been identified for 2002/2003)
- Enables other educationalists, not personally involved in ICPD, to learn from the educational experience of those who have. This is done in a variety ways through information technology, newsletter, catalogue of information available and open evenings/in service training events
- Assists in delivering the aspirations of Best Value, which is now a core part
 of the culture of the Scottish Executive and all local authorities in raising
 educational standards

Following a highly successful external evaluation report by SEED it was agreed to continue the initiative until at least March 2004.

In DEIEP II the 13 local authorities involved have agreed to fund annually a percentage of the total costs of the project.

Revised strategic aims and operational objectives have been developed for DEIEP II. There are 3 strategic aims-

- To raise the quality of learning and teaching process in local authorities through effective international continuous professional development programmes. This aim has three objectives:
 - to continue to develop and promote best practice in ICPD within the 13 local authorities currently involved in the DEIEP initiative
 - to extend best practice from DEIEP to other local authorities in Scotland
 - to maximise the impact for ICPD opportunities by identification of funding sources
- To explore ways at a national level re support for ICPD opportunities with the concept of international education based on DEIEP policy and practice. This aim has one objective:

- to raise levels of awareness and gain support from Scottish wide agencies
- To examine the feasibility of gaining accreditation and identification of standards for work undertaken as part of ICPD opportunities. This aim has one objective:
 - through results of data produced by DEIEP to contribute to development of accreditation process that is recognised within the national CPD framework

Within the 3 strategic aims there are 18 continuing tasks from DEIEP I and 40 proposed new tasks for DEIEP II. A copy of the Progress/Monitoring Work Plan, Flow Chart and Planning Cycle can be obtained from the International Office.

It is envisaged that during the 2 year period of DEIEP II that the impact of the project on raising the quality of the learning and teaching process can start to be measured. This will be carried out by the Quality in Education Centre at the University of Strathclyde.

6 INFORMATION SOURCES

6.1 Eurodesk

Eurodesk acts as a first point of contact for European information for the education, training and youth sectors. Eurodesk's information is aimed at young people and those who work with them and relates mainly to European funding opportunities and youth mobility.

Eurodesk also acts as a European Resource Centre (ERC) which has been set up to provide the schools and colleges sector with information on Europe and can help with the development of the European dimension in the curriculum.

Eurodesk/European Resource Centre Scotland holds stocks of books, directories, journals and leaflets on Europe, the EU and European issues, and has access to comprehensive and up-to-date databases. It can provide information on the following areas:

- Free and priced publications for the introduction of the European Dimension

6.3 Commonwealth Institute

The Commonwealth Resource Centre

The Commonwealth Resource Centre (CRC) offers an information service as well as a postal loan service. Multi-media resources on all members of the Commonwealth community are available for loan. The postal loan resource pack is £15.00, inc. outward and return postage, again up to 10 items may be borrowed. Teachers must be members to take advantage of the postal loan scheme.

The Commonwealth Resource Centre is open Monday-Saturday, (except Public holidays) from 10.30-16.00 and is open for reference use to non-members.
