An Evaluation of the School Sport Partnership Programme 2005

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1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Department for Education and Skills (DfES) commissioned TNS to conduct an audit among schools in the School Sport Partnership Programme. The survey was conducted among all schools in the programme during May, June and July 2005. 11,498 of the partnership schools submitted data, representing a response rate of 95%. This was the second such audit conducted by TNS, fieldwork for the first taking place in 2003/04.

Participation in PE and school sport

- Overall 69% of pupils in partnership schools participated in at least two hours of high quality¹ Physical Education (PE) and out of hours school sport each week.
- Among those partnerships which existed at the time of the 2003/04 survey, the latest survey has recorded an increase of nine percentage points in the proportion of pupils participating in two hours or PE/school sport (from 62% to 71%).
- There was some link between the length of time a partnership has been established and the percentage of pupils participating in PE and school sport. In the longest established partnerships around 70% or more of pupils participated, while in the more recently established partnerships this level was lower (between 63% and 68%).
- There is a wide variation in terms of uptake in different Year groups, with Years 1 and 2 having the lowest uptake, and Years 7 and 8 having the highest.
- Pupils living in the South West and the East of England were most likely to achieve at least two hours of PE/school sport.
- Across all year groups, pupils spent an average of 107 minutes each week on curriculum PE. This peaked at 124 minutes for Year 7 and 123 minutes for Year 8.
 At the other end of the scale, those in Years 1 and 2 received an average of about 96 minutes.

 A comparison between partnerships in the 2003/04 and 2005 surveys shows that there has been an increase from 103 minutes in 2003/04 to 108 minutes in those same partnerships in 2005.

Participation in intra and inter-school competitive activities

- In a typical week 25% of pupils were involved in intra-school competitive activities. In partnerships that existed in 2003/04, this figure has risen from 22% to 28%.
- During the academic year, a total of 35% of pupils in schools were involved in some form of inter-school competition. In partnerships that existed in 2003/04, the level of participation in inter-school competition has risen from 33% to 36%.

Sports Provision

• Schools provided an average of 15 different sports. The most widely available sports were football (97%), dance (95%), gymnastics (93%), athletics (91%), rounders (85%), cricket (85%), swimming (83%) and netball (81%).

Club links

 Schools had club links for an average of about five different sports. This was similar to the 2003/04 survey.

Community sports, dance and multi-skill clubs

- Across all year groups an average of 22% of pupils participated in one or more community sports, dance or multi-skill clubs with links to the school. This proportion was much higher in Years 5 and 6 (32% and 33%) and much lower in Years 7 to 11 (between 12% and 19%)
- Where comparisons can be made with the 2003/04 survey, it is apparent that there has been an increase from 19% to 24%.

Targeting of school sport opportunities

- 87% of schools indicated that they targeted out of hours school sport opportunities by at least one of the listed criteria (age, gender, gifted and talented, SEN, disability, ethnicity and religion).
- In schools that were in partnerships at the time of the 2003/04 survey, there has been an increase of seven percentage points from 84% to 91% in the proportion targeting out of hours opportunities by at least one of the factors.

Gifted and talented pupils

• 5% of pupils in Years 5 – 11 were registered as gifted and talented because of their ability in PE and/or school sport.

Sports volunteering and leadership

- 11% of pupils in Years 10 13 have been actively involved in sports volunteering and leadership during the academic year. The proportion was higher among Year 10 and 11 pupils, but much lower among Year 13 pupils.
- A comparison between the two surveys revealed an increase from 9% to 12% among partnerships that were involved in both studies.

Conclusions

The 2005 audit among partnership schools has provided firm evidence on the progress made within the School Sport Partnership Programme towards the achievement of the Public Service Agreement Target that by 2006, 75% of school children in England will spend a minimum of two hours each week on high quality PE and school sport within and beyond the curriculum. Indeed 69% of pupils in partnership schools now participate in at least two hours of high quality PE and sport – and there has been a rise from 62% to 71% among partnerships which existed at the time of the 2003/04 survey. These results have positive implications for all children in partnership schools around the country. There have also been positive movements on almost all of the measures covered by the survey, which is again very encouraging.

The latest survey has, however, highlighted some areas which need to be addressed – for example, the wide variation in participation level by Year group, and the wide disparity in performance between individual partnerships. These are issues which need further investigation, and lessons need to be learned from those partnerships which manage to achieve excellent results, despite the sometimes unpromising characteristics of the areas they serve.

2 INTRODUCTION

2.1 Background

Physical Education (PE) and sport play an important role in school life, help to raise standards, improve behaviour and health, increase attendance and develop social skills. Over £1.5 billion is being invested by the Government to transform PE, school sport and club links.

A joint Department for Education and Skills (DfES)/Department for Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) Public Service Agreement Target (PSA) has been set, to enhance the take up of sporting opportunities by 5-16 year olds as follows:

'Enhance the take-up of sporting opportunities by 5 to 16 year olds so that the percentage of school children in England who spend a minimum of two hours each week on high quality² PE and school sport within and beyond the curriculum increases from 25% in 2002 to 75% by 2006 and to 85% by 2008, and to at least 75% in each School Sport Partnership by 2008.'

The national PE, School Sport and Club Links strategy brings together eight different strands, one of which is the School Sport Partnership Programme. The programme is based around 'families' of secondary, primary and special schools which have a Specialist Sports College acting as the hub of the family. At the heart of the programme is the Partnership Development Manager (PDM) who is responsible for managing the partnership, while in every secondary school there is a School Sport Co-ordinator (SSCo), and in every primary or special school a Primary Link Teacher (PLT) or Special School Link Teacher (SSLT) who is responsible for leading the strategy at that particular school. Staff are funded by the programme to allow them to do this.

The partnerships were set up in a number of phases, starting in September 2000, as follows:

There are now 12,134 schools within the School Sport Partnership Programme, arranged into 312 different partnerships.

During 2003/04 TNS, an independent research company, conducted the first audit of schools³, which involved the participation of 6,547 of the 8,105 eligible schools (representing a response rate of 81%). This survey demonstrated that 62% of children aged 5-16 participated in at least two hours of PE and school sport, and that this percentage varied considerably by the age of the child, and also, to an extent, by the length of time the partnership had been established for.

In 2004 TNS was commissioned by DfES to undertake the second audit of the programme, the findings from which are outlined in this report.

2.2 Research objectives

The objectives of the research were to collect the following information:

 What proportion of pupils in schools undertake at least 2 hours of high quality PE and sport within and beyond the curriculum?

How does this vary by year group?

How does this vary by type of school?

How does this vary by a range of other factors – for example, uptake of FSM, incidence of languages other than English, ethnicity etc

 What is the average curriculum time pupils in Partnership schools spend undertaking high quality PE and school sport?

How does this vary by year group?

How does this vary by type of school?

How does this vary by a range of other factors – for example, uptake of FSM, incidence of languages other than English, ethnicity etc

- How many pupils by year group are involved in intra PE and school sport competitive activities?
- How many pupils by year group are involved in inter school competitions?
- What is the range of sports offered?
- Is the range delivered via a formal link between schools and clubs?
- How many pupils participate in clubs linked to the schools in the Partnerships?
- Are out-of-school-hours activities targeted at specific groups of pupils, and if so what groups are these?
- How many pupils are registered as gifted, talented or able because of their ability in PE/school sport
- How many pupils are actively involved in sports volunteering and leadership?

2.3 Methodological approach

The 2005 audit required schools to provide answers to 10 questions. These questions could either be answered on paper or via a dedicated website. As in the previous audit, two models of data collection were offered to partnerships, with the PDM making the choice between the two models:

The Schools Model, which involved TNS sending materials directly to schools.
 Where necessary this was then followed up with a reminder mailing.

 The PDM Model, which involved PDMs having a much greater level of responsibility for data collection in their partnership. They were sent the questionnaires in bulk for distribution to their schools, and were then asked to take responsibility for tracking responses, and ensuring that questionnaires were returned to TNS.

76% of PDMs chose the PDM Model, with the remainder selecting the Schools Model. The latter group includes a small number of PDMs who did not make a choice by the stated deadline.

Packs were sent to schools/PDMs (as appropriate) between 9 May and 13 May 2005. Each pack contained a questionnaire, covering letter, a step-by-step guide to the audit and a list of definitions. For those using the Schools Model, a reply-paid envelope was also included.

In the instructions schools/PDMs were informed that they should ideally complete the questionnaire over the web, but that a paper copy of the questionnaire had also been sent in case they could not do this. A deadline for submissions of 23rd June 2005 was given, and by this date 80% of schools had submitted their data.

Immediately after the deadline, schools in the Schools Model which had not submitted their data were sent a reminder letter, and a further copy of the survey materials. All PDMs with partnershships with less than 100% returns were sent a reminder letter. Those partnerships with the lowest response rates were also telephoned. A revised and final deadline of 14 July 2005 was given.

By the final deadline, a total of 11,498 usable responses had been received, as follows:

- 42% on the web
- 58% on paper

This represents an overall response rate of 95% with just over half (52%) of partnerships – 161 - obtaining a response rate of 100%.

2.4 Validation of key findings

In addition to the main data collection, a small-scale validation exercise took place to verify the accuracy of the answers to two of the key questions within the survey. These were the first two questions, as follows:

Question 1: What is the total curriculum time in minutes that all pupils in each year group spend taking part in PE in a typical week?

Question 2: What is the total number of pupils in each year group who participate in at least two hours of high quality PE and out of hours school sport in a typical week?

The validation exercise involved personal visits to twelve partnerships, selected at random. At each partnership a face-to-face interview took place with the PDM, an SSCo and a PLT. This exercise took place in early July 2005, shortly before the deadline for submissions to the main survey. TNS concluded it was 'satisfied that the data had been collected in an appropriate way and that all twelve partnerships provided sufficient validation'.

2.5 Reporting

This report covers all schools from Phases 1 original, 1 expansion, 2 original, 2 expansion, 3 original, 3 expansion 4, 5, 7 and 8 which returned a completed questionnaire by the deadline.

The figures shown in the text and charts in this report have been rounded to the nearest percentage point.


3 PARTICIPATION IN PE AND SCHOOL SPORT

Schools were asked to submit figures to indicate the number of pupils in each year group who participated in at least two hours of high quality PE and out of hours school sport in a typical week.

3.1 Participation in at least two hours of PE and school sport - overall patterns


Overall, 69% of pupils in partnership schools participated in at least two hours of PE and out of hours school sport each week. This proportion varied considerably by year group. Those in Years 1 and 2 were *least* likely to achieve two hours (51% and 54% respectively), while those in Years 7 and 8 were *most* likely to achieve two hours (87% and 86% respectively). Looking across all pupils in partnership *primary* schools, 64% participated in at least two hours of PE/school sport, while in *secondary* schools the figure was much higher at 75% of all pupils. In *special* schools the figure was 69%.

The following chart shows the same results, but this time analysed by partnership phase. The phases are presented in the date order in which they were established. It shows that there is some link between the length of time a partnership has been established, and the percentage of pupils participating in at least two hours of PE/school sport, with the longer established partnerships achieving higher levels of participation. Specifically in all phases which were established before September 2003 (Phases 1 original, 2 original, 3 original, 4, 5 7 and 1 expansion) around 70% or more of pupils participated in a minimum of two hours high quality PE/school sport. Two of the more recently established phases (8 and 2 expansion) achieved rather lower levels of uptake, while the recently established Phase 3 expansion (established in September 2004) achieved a participation level of 68%.


Figure 2: Percentage of pupils who participated in at least two hours of high quality PE and out of hours school sport in a typical week - analysed by Partnership Phase



3.2 Participation in at least two hours of PE and school sport - trends

The chart below compares the results from the 2005 survey with those from the 2003/04 survey, focusing solely on those partnerships which were in existence at the time of the first survey. It shows that overall, in the 2005 survey, 71% of pupils in these partnerships had at least two hours of high quality PE/school sport in a typical week – which represents an increase of nine percentage points over the 2003/04 findings (62%). Such increases are apparent for all partnership phases, but particularly for Phase 7 and Phase 1 expansion, which were only relatively recently established at the time of the 2003/04 survey.


Figure 3: Percentage of pupils who participated in at least two hours of high quality PE and out of hours school sport in a typical week – comparison of 2003/04 and 2005 results



3.3 Participation in at least two hours of PE and school sport – more detailed analysis

It is apparent that pupils in some regions were slightly more likely to participate in at least two hours of PE/school sport than in other regions. Specifically pupils in partnerships located in the South West and East of England were most likely to achieve at least two hours of PE/school sport, with figures of 74% and 73% respectively.

Figure 4: Percentage of pupils who participated in at least two hours of high quality PE and out of hours school sport in a typical week – analysed by Government Office Region




In Appendix A, table 1 shows a full analysis of uptake, analysed separately for the 312 partnerships, while table 2 provides the information analysed by Local Education Authority. Both tables show a wide disparity in terms of take up. Focusing firstly on *partnerships*, the best performing partnerships (King Alfred School partnership and Oldfield School partnership) had 90% of pupils participating in at least two hours of PE/school sport, while the worst performing (Archbishop Beck) had just 34%. In total 100 of the 312 partnerships achieved a participation rate of at 75% of more, while 48 partnerships had a participation rate of less than 60%.

Given that the South West was the best performing region on participation, it is not surprising that two of the top Local Education Authorities are both in that area (table 2 in Appendix A). Bath and North East Somerset achieved a participation rate of 90% and Devon achieved a participation rate of 83%. Isle of Wight, Windsor and Maidenhead, St Helens, Telford and Wrekin and Lambeth all did very well with at least 83% of pupils in each area participating in at least two hours of PE/school sport. Many of the highest performing Local Education Authorities were either rural or relatively affluent. However, this was not always the case, as shown by the inclusion of Lambeth and Newham among the top performers. The worst performing Local Education Authorities were Hackney, the Isles of Scilly and Salford.

3.4 Curriculum time spent on PE - overall patterns


In addition to information about numbers of pupils participating in PE and school sport, schools were also required to submit information about the total curriculum time (in minutes) that all pupils spend taking part in PE in a typical week. These results are presented in the form of average numbers of minutes for each year group.

Figure 5: Total curriculum time that all pupils in each year group spend taking part in PE in a typical week – analysed by Year group




Across all year groups, pupils spent an average of 107 minutes participating in curriculum PE in a typical week. The pattern varied by year group in the same way that it varied for the percentage of pupils participating in at least two hours of PE and school sport. Therefore, those in Years 1 and 2 received an average of 96 minutes curriculum time PE in a typical week: this rises to a peak of 124 minutes for Year 7 and 123 minutes for Year 8.

In terms of partnership phase, all phases achieved a minimum of 103 minutes. However, there were some small differences between phases, with Phases 1 original, 2 original, 3 original, 4, 5 and 7 achieving the best results.


Figure 7: Total curriculum time that all pupils in each year group spend taking part in PE in a typical week – ranges



The chart above gives further detail of the curriculum time that pupils spend taking part in PE, analysed by Year group. Overall, looking across all Year groups, 14% of pupils took part in less than 75 minutes of curriculum PE in a typical week, 5% took part in 75 - 89 minutes, 31% took part in 90 - 119 minutes, and 50% participated in at least 120 minutes of curriculum PE.

3.5 Curriculum time spent on PE - trends

Figure 8: Total curriculum time that all pupils in each year group spend taking part in PE in a typical week – comparison of 2003/04 and 2005 results




A comparison between the 2003/04 and the 2005 surveys, focusing solely on those phases which existed at the time of the first survey, shows that in these partnerships the average PE curriculum time for all pupils is 108 minutes in the latest survey – up from 103 minutes in the 2003/04 survey. All partnership phases show an increase, although of particular note is the increase in Phase 1 expansion, up from 96 minutes in 2003/04 to 103 minutes in 2005.

4 PARTICIPATION IN INTRA AND INTER-SCHOOL COMPETITIVE ACTIVITIES

4.1 Intra-school competitive activities


In a typical week, 25% of pupils were involved in intra-school competitive activities. Pupils in Year 5 (32%), Year 6 (35%), Year 7 (34%) and Year 8 (32%) were most likely to take part in such events. Only relatively small proportions of pupils in Year 1 (11%) and Year 2 (13%) were involved in intra-school activities.

As for comparisons with the 2003/04 survey, comparing only partnerships which were in existence at the time of the first survey there is a small but positive rise from 22% in 2003/04 to 28% in 2005, as shown in the following chart. It reveals that there have been increases in all Phases, but that these are particularly apparent in Phase 4 (from 20% to 30%), Phase 7 (from 19% to 28%) and Phase 1 expansion (from 18% to 25%).


Figure 10: Percentage of pupils involved in intra-school competitive activities in a typical week – comparison of 2003/04 and 2005 results



4.2 Inter-school competition

During the academic year, a total of 35% of pupils from Years 4 to 11 were involved in some form of inter-school competition. Inter-school competition was most likely to take place among pupils from Year 6 - 53% of pupils in this Year had participated. Involvement in inter-school competition was at its lowest in Years 4, 10 and 11. Across all primary pupils (years 4 - 7), 41% had participated in some form of inter-school competition: across all secondary pupils the figure was lower at 32%.

Looking at a comparison of the results of the two surveys by partnership Phase, it is apparent that among Phases which existed in 2003/04 there has been a small increase in involvement in inter-school competition from 33% to 36%. This increase is more apparent in some phases than others – Phase 7 and Phase 1 expansion (both recently set up at the time of the first survey) show positive increases from 32% to 37% and 31% to 34% respectively, while some of the longer established Phases (eg. Phase 1 original, 2 original, 3 original and 4) show little or no improvement at all.

Figure 12: Percentage of pupils involved in inter-school competition during the academic year – comparison of 2003/04 and 2005 results




Table 3 in Appendix A shows a full listing of LEAs in terms of the percentage of pupils involved in inter-school competition. It indicates that Isle of Wight and North Lincolnshire have the best levels (57% and 51% respectively) while the Isles of Scilly achieves only 5%.

5 SPORTS PROVISION

Schools were asked to indicate the range of sports activities they had provided this academic year. An average of nearly 15 different sports is provided in each school – up slightly from the 2003/04 figure (14.9 compared to 14.5). In secondary schools the average number given was over 19, and in primary schools it was 14. Both these figures show small increases over the 2003/04 levels.

Across partnership Phases, the average number of sports provided ranges from 13 in Phase 8 and Phase 2 expansion schools to 16 in the longer established Phase 1 original, Phase 2 original, Phase 3 original, Phase 4, Phase 5 and Phase 7 schools.

The most widely available sports were football (97%), dance (95%), gymnastics (93%), athletics (91%), rounders (85%), cricket (85%), swimming (83%) and netball (81%). All of these are at similar levels to the 2003/04 study. The largest increases in provision, however, were in fitness (up from 58% to 66%), multi-skill clubs (up from 26% to 39%), cycling (up from 21% to 27%) and archery (up from 7% to 12%).

6 CLUB LINKS

Schools had club links for an average of about five different sports. This was a similar figure to that recorded in the 2003/04 survey. The average number for primary schools was four, and for secondary schools, ten. The number varied a little between the different Phases, with the longer established Phase 1 original and Phase 2 original achieving an average of about six and a half, compared to an average of just four in the more recently established Phase 8 and Phase 3 expansion.

The most common sports for which there were club links were football (75% of all schools), cricket (46%), rugby union (41%), athletics (33%), dance (32%), tennis (30%) and swimming (29%). Compared to the 2003/04 study, however, the biggest increase was for dance – up from 28% to 32%.



7. COMMUNITY SPORTS, DANCE AND MULTI-SKILL CLUBS

Across all year groups, an average of 22% of pupils participated in one or more community sports, dance or multi-skill clubs with links to the school during the academic year.

This proportion was much higher in Years 5 and 6: in these years about one in three have participated in such activities. However, in Years 7 – 11 the figures were much lower – between 12% and 19%. In primary schools an average of 28% of pupils participated in one or more community sports, dance or multi-skill clubs, while in secondary schools it was just 16%.


Figure 15: Percentage of pupils participating in community sports, dance or multiskill clubs with links to school during the academic year



Results were similar across all partnership Phases, with each Phase reporting between 22% and 25% of pupils participating.

A comparison between those partnerships which existed at the time of the 2003/04 survey and those same partnerships in the current survey shows an overall increase of five percentage points from 19% to 24% participation. This increase was most marked in Phase 7 (17% to 25%) and Phase 1 expansion (15% to 22%), but is apparent for *all* phases.

An examination of the results by partnership shows (Table 4, Appendix A) there is a very wide range in terms of levels of participation, from a high of 49% in the Siddal Moor partnership to just 1% in the Aylesford partnership. Similarly an examination of Local Education Authorities (Table 5, Appendix A) shows that Isles of Scilly is the highest performing on this measure (51%) while Hillingdon achieves just 6%.

8. TARGETING OF SCHOOL SPORT OPPORTUNITIES

Schools were asked about the targeting of school sport opportunities by indicating which of seven different criteria they had targeted out of hours school sport opportunities during this academic year:

- age
- disability
- ethnicity
- gender
- · gifted and talented
- religion
- special educational needs





Figure 17: Targeting of out of hours school sport opportunities

Overall, 87% of schools indicated that they targeted out of hours school sport opportunities by at least one of the listed criteria. On average schools targeted using two of the listed factors.

Schools most commonly targeted by age -81% indicated that this was the case, which represents a much higher proportion than for any of the other criteria. This was then followed by gender (44%), gifted and talented (32%) and special educational needs (17%).


There was a slight tendency for those in the longest established partnerships to be more likely to target school sport opportunities than was the case for the more newly established partnerships, as shown in the chart below. This shows the percentage of schools in each Phase which targeted out of hours school sport opportunities by at least one of the seven listed factors. Thus for all Phases up to Phase 1 expansion, at least 90% of schools targeted by at least one of the factors. For Phase 8, Phase 2 expansion, and Phase 3 the figures were slightly lower at 79%, 72% and 84% respectively.

In comparing the results of the 2005 survey with the previous one, there has been a seven percent rise in the proportion targeting out of hours school sport opportunities by at least one factor (from 84% to 91%). Increases are apparent across all Phases, but most particularly among Phase 1 original schools, Phase 7 and Phase 1 expansion schools.


Figure 19: Targeting of school sport opportunities by at least one factor - comparison of 2003/04 and 2005 results



9. GIFTED AND TALENTED PUPILS

For Years 5 - 11, schools were asked to provide information about the numbers of pupils in each year who are currently registered as gifted and talented because of their ability in PE and/or school sport.

Figure 20: Percentage of pupils currently registered as gifted and talented because of their ability in PE and/or school sport




5% of pupils in Years 5 – 11 were registered as gifted and talented because of their ability in PE and/or school sport. This represents an increase of two percent over the 2003/04 survey (when 3% were registered). Looking at individual year groups, the proportion is similar, with between 4% and 5% being registered. Across Phases, the proportion is between 4% and 6%.

10. SPORTS VOLUNTEERING AND LEADERSHIP


Schools with pupils in Years 10 - 13 were asked to provide information about the numbers of pupils who were actively involved in sports volunteering and leadership during the academic year.

Overall, 11% of pupils in Years 10 - 13 have been actively involved in sports volunteering and leadership during the academic year. The proportion was highest amongst Year 10 - 11 pupils, but was much lower (just 5%) among Year 13 pupils.


Figure 22: Percentage of pupils actively involved in sports volunteering and leadership during the academic year – comparison of 2003/04 and 2005 results



A comparison of the 2003/04 results with the 2005 survey revealed that there has been a three percent increase between the two studies, from 9% to 12%. There is an increase for almost all Phases, but once again it is most apparent in Phase 7 and Phase 1 expansion. However, it is clearly at its highest level among Phase 1 original partnerships (18%).

Table 6 in Appendix A gives a ranking of partnerships in terms of the proportion of pupils actively involved in sports volunteering and leadership. Langdon School partnership achieves the highest level at 46%. Two partnerships recorded no participation in sports volunteering and leadership (Carisbrooke and King Edward VII). In terms of participation levels in sports volunteering and leadership analysed by Local Education Authority (Appendix A, table 7), Newham has the highest level at 33% while North East Lincolnshire and Barking and Dagenham achieve just 2%, while the Isle of Wight has 0%.

The proportion of pupils participating in sports volunteering and leadership was fairly consistent throughout the country, although the South East has the highest proportion at 12% of all Year 10 - 13 pupils, while the North East has the lowest level at 9%.

11. CONCLUSIONS

The 2005 audit among partnership schools has provided firm evidence on the progress made within the School Sport Partnership Programme towards the achievement of the Public Service Agreement Target that by 2006 75% of school children in England will spend a minimum of two hours each week on high quality PE and school sport. Indeed 69% of pupils in partnership schools now participate in at least two hours of high quality PE and sport – and there has been a rise from 62% to 71% among partnerships which existed at the time of the 2003/04 survey. These results have positive implications for all children in partnership schools around the country.

There have also been positive movements on almost all of the measures covered by the survey (with the one exception of the average number of club links schools had), which is again very encouraging.

The fact that clear differences can be seen in levels of uptake across the partnership phases shows that as the more newly established partnerships 'bed down' the levels of participation should naturally increase. However, once this process has occurred it is likely to become harder to raise participation rates further, and so even more effort will be required at this stage. Indeed there is evidence that on some of the measures (for example, on participation in inter-school competition) this has already started to happen, with many of the longer established partnerships showing only minimal improvement.

While the overall findings are very encouraging indeed, the survey has raised some issues which need to be addressed.

Firstly, participation rates among Year groups are very varied, and there is still work to be done to bring all Year groups up to an acceptable level. In particular, only just over half of pupils in Years 1 and 2 participate in at least 2 hours of PE and school sport, and they have an average of just 96 minutes of curriculum PE. More work is required among this group.

Secondly, an examination of results by individual partnerships has shown the enormous disparity in terms of partnership performance, and not all of this can be accounted for by the length of time the partnership has been established and/or the area it covers. There is a
