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#### **1. BACKGROUND TO THE CONSULTATION EXERCISE**

#### The General Teaching Council for Wales Regulations 1999.

The General Teaching Council for Wales was established by the National Assembly for Wales on 1 September 2000. It provides an independent and authoritative voice for teachers, and was established to maintain and enhance high standards of teaching.

The General Teaching Council for Wales (Constitution) Regulations 1999 http://www.opsi.gov.uk/si/si1999/19991619.htm , as amended, (the 1999 Regulations) provide for the constitution of the GTCW. The Council consists of 25 Members; twelve are elected by their peers, nine are appointed by the National Assembly for Wales following nominations made by teacher unions and other educational organisations as set out in the Schedule to the 1999 Regulations, and four members are appointed directly by the National Assembly for Wales.

Prior to the Council's Establishment, the first election of Council Members was completed in April 2000 in accordance with an election scheme drawn up by the National Assembly for Wales. The 1999 Regulations currently provide that subsequent elections shall be conducted in accordance with an electoral scheme set out in rules made by the Council with the approval of the National Assembly for Wales. Election schemes prepared by the Council require the approval of the National Assembly for Wales. Details of the Council's election scheme can be found on the Council's website www.gtcw.org.uk

Schedule to the 1999 Regulations, which sets out the list of organisations entitled to nominate persons for appointment by the National Assembly for Wales, was replaced by a new Schedule in March 2003 following consultation with interested bodies to take account of changes to those organisations listed, for example, in terms of title of changes to constitution. #### The Consultation

Following the Council's round of elections in 2004 a review and evaluation was undertaken by the Council to determine the conduct of future elections. In light of the Council's evaluation report the Welsh Assembly Government has looked again at the constitution of the Council.

On 18 July 2005 the Welsh Assembly Government's Teaching and Leadership Division 2 published a bilingual consultation document to seek views on amendments to the Regulations which would ensure the next round of Council Elections would run as smoothly as possible.

The deadline for responses was 14 October 2005.

The document was distributed to representatives from the following organisations:

#### 2. CONSULTATION QUESTIONS

The consultation document addressed the following issues/questions:

- (i) Do you agree that the existing election category of head/deputy head teacher should be amended to included assistant head teachers?
- (ii) Do you consider that the existing titles of the voting categories of 'teacher of senior pupils' and 'teacher of junior pupils' as replaced by the General Teaching Council for Wales (Constitution)(Amendment) Regulations 1999 should be retained? Is further clarification needed to spell out precisely what each title means?
- (iii) If you consider that these titles should be renamed, do you agree that the titles should be "teachers of secondary school pupils" and "teachers of primary school pupils"? If not in what way should the categories be differentiated e.g. by age of the pupils taught?
- (iv) Do you support the proposal that the head/deputy head category should include at least one teacher of secondary/senior pupils at the head/deputy/assistant head level?
- (v) Do you agree that an amendment should be made to the 1999 Regulations so that candidates standing for election may only be those persons who are required to be registered with the Council?
- (vi) Do you agree that an amendment should be made to the 1999 Regulations so as to require organisations in Part 1 of the Schedule (the teaching unions) to only nominate persons who are required to be registered with the Council?
- (vii) Do you agree that an amendment should be made to the existing regulations to remove the requirement for the Council to seek the National Assembly for Wales' approval to its election scheme? If you agree, should provision be made in the proposed regulations to ensure that the Council's election scheme must include the points shown at a-f?
- (viii) Do you agree that the Schedule to the 1999 Regulations should be amended to allow changes of names to those organisations listed (providing that there are no other changes to the nature of the organisation) or removal of organisations that have ceased to exist and without the need for further legislation to amend the regulations?

\*\* **GTCW**: "The Council has sought clarification from Electoral Reform Services and it has been confirmed that such practice is common in elections for similar organisations and can be incorporated into the voting system. The Constitution Regulations will have to be worded so as to enable at least one of the elected candidates to be from the secondary school sector and at least one from the primary school sector (although it could be argued that the latter is guaranteed by weight of numbers), whilst excluding similar provision for heads and deputies in other sectors such as Special schools, and PRU's."

**\*\*\*NUT Cymru**: "It is not good enough to state that numerical factors should ensure representation from the Primary Sector – the numbers of primary schools have dropped dramatically over the past five years or so and there is a fear that they will continue to do so. Some primary schools which will

continue to operate in different sites will, nevertheless, do so as a federation or cluster of schools under the leadership of one head teacher for the whole group. There are already examples of this practice. We cannot know what the numbers of primary schools will be – or secondary schools for that matter – in a few years time. There may well be major reorganisation in the provision of education which will affect both phases.

In any case, referring to one phase and not the other in this way would smack of special treatment. We do not believe that it is intended to reflect special treatment, but there is a danger that it could be construed as such and give offence.

The matter must also be considered in conjunction with Question 1. The inclusion of assistant head teachers in the head/deputy head teacher category would mean a great increase in the numbers in this category from the secondary sector. Most secondary schools have several assistant head teachers; primary schools have none.

An additional consideration must be the imminent schools' staffing structure reviews which will take place when the Welsh Assembly Government guidance on the issue (under consultation until 20 September 2005) is issued later this year. Schools are no longer required to have a deputy head teacher and many choose not to do so following their review."

#### 6. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS

A number of respondents also raised further issues not directly related to the consultation questions.

#### The General Teaching Council for Wales:

"The Council recommends that, in amending the GTCW Constitution Regulations, the Assembly takes the opportunity to clarify the position of elected and directly appointed members.

As the Regulations stand, it is clear that members who are appointed following nomination (Regulation 7(4)) "...shall act as individual members and not as representatives of the organisation that nominated them". The Council finds this statement very helpful in clarifying the capacity in which members should approach the Council table and the Council's business.

Council would find it more helpful again if Regulation 7.4 was extended to apply to all members of Council. This would reflect the Council's existing 'Code of Conduct and Best Practice for Members' which already states under the section on the Nolan principles:

#### Integrity

"Council members should not place themselves under any financial or other obligation to outside individuals or organisations that might influence them in their performance as members of the Council. Members observe the relevant Regulations which govern their membership of the Council and act as individuals in their own right and not as representatives of any organisations to which they may belong."

Council members would find it helpful to have this further strengthened by including such a statement in the Constitution Regulations. Such a change could be brought into effect by a slight rewording and a repositioning of Regulation 7.4 along the following lines: *"Members elected under paragraph 4 or appointed under paragraph 7 or paragraph 8 shall not act as representatives of organisations to which they belong or, in the case of appointed members, the organisations which nominated them or the Assembly."* 

#### NAHT Cymru

"We feel there is a need for clarification on the roles of Elected and Directly Appointed Members, so that all members act as individuals."

#### NASUWT

"NASUWT made two further recommendations:

 The Regulations should be further amended to ensure that each teacher association in Wales be given an automatic seat on the Council of the General Teaching Council for Wales; • The Regulations be further amended to ensure that practicing teachers hols the majority of seats on the Council of the General Teaching Council for Wales."

#### **NUT Cymru**

NUT Cymru is content with the actual proposal, that is, that only persons required to be registered with the Council could be nominated by the teacher unions. The regulations already state that they must be practicing teachers. However the proposal does not go far enough. From the outset, the Union has consistently argued that there should be a representative from all seven of the teacher unions in Wales on the Council. As a union NUT Cymru has the largest number of qualified teachers in membership in Wales but although some of the other unions are very small indeed compared they are content, for the sake of harmony, that all unions be represented equally.

The current Regulations mean that union representatives could be drawn from the minority unions only. Indeed, during the Council's first term, there was no representative from NUT Cymru, although it represents close to 50% of teachers in Wales.

#### Welsh Language Board

"The Welsh Language Board would like to respond by asking whether consideration is been given to providing representation based on the linguistic nature of the education provision.

We have noticed that the categories do consider sectors (age) and other aspects. We therefore ask what steps are being taken to ensure that the Council is representative in terms of the linguistic provision in the education system in Wales."
