### MAPPING PUBLIC SERVICE FUNDED INITIATIVES: TACKLING WORKLESSNESS IN DEPRIVED AREAS

The Government Office Network, working with the Local Government Association and the Cabinet Office Social Exclusion Taskforce

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### INTRODUCTION

This report provides information on a selection of initiatives across Great Britain that have a focus on tackling worklessness with vulnerable groups in deprived areas.

It records a variety of initiatives (projects, programmes and joint working practices) including:

- some of which are directly aimed at reducing worklessness with both families and individuals,
- those tackling barriers to employment by providing training, improving skills and reducing antisocial behaviour, and
- a small number which co-ordinate a range of services, including health and childcare provision, alongside interventions to improve employment opportunities.

The report is the outcome of work commissioned by the Government Office for London on behalf of the Government Office Network, and supported by the Local Government Association and the Cabinet Office Social Exclusion Taskforce. The project's initial focus was to identify public sector funded initiatives that were targeted at specific families within small geographical areas in Local Authorities with high levels of worklessness. Local Authorities and other partners were invited to provide examples of relevant initiatives. A copy of the letter sent to request this information has been attached at Annex A.

The report captures the responses received. It includes a number of initiatives which although not necessarily in keeping with the original focus, do include supporting interventions which directly or indirectly may help reduce worklessness. They have been grouped under a series of headings according to the key outcomes they are seeking to secure (see opposite page).

Short summaries of each initiative are provided, noting the key characteristics under standard headings. This is not an exhaustive list, it simply records those that have been submitted by Local Authorities and partners as relevant initiatives. Some of these are not currently operational but are due to be launched in the near future, and others have closed down. Others are examples of national initiatives (e.g. Home Office's 'Respect' programme) which are taking place in particular localities.

In summary this research report provides a brief 'snapshot' of initiatives that are targeted at tackling worklessness and improving delivery to vulnerable groups in deprived areas. As a first step this has been a useful exercise in capturing information about them and we hope that this report may be of interest to those wishing to learn from the experience of others in tackling worklessness.

### PROJECT ON MAPPING JOINED UP PUBLIC SERVICE FUNDED DELIVERY FOR FAMILIES IN SMALL GEOGRAPHICAL AREAS WITH HIGH LEVELS OF WORKLESSNESS

I am writing to you to seek your help with a project that the Government Office Network, working with the Local Government Association and Cabinet Office Social Exclusion Task Force, has commissioned to be undertaken over the next few weeks. This project seeks to identify public sector funded initiatives (projects, programmes, joint working practices) across Great Britain that are targeted at specific families in small geographical areas in Local Authorities with high levels of worklessness/multiple deprivation. The focus will be on initiatives that involve organising effective public services working together for these families from multiple agencies.

One example of the type of initiative that we are seeking to identify is currently being undertaken in the London Borough of Haringey, in Northumberland Park, a deprived neighbourhood. Work is being undertaken to develop a multi agency approach to tackling the problems of 100 workless families. We understand similar initiatives may exist throughout Great Britain and would like to hear about them.

In addition to identifying initiatives, the research outputs will include short summaries of the key characteristics of each to a common format. Where information is available, it is intended that this will include items such as which organisations are involved in provision, third sector engagement, how the project is funded, how many families are targeted, the geographical location and whether any evaluation of other evidence of impacts / outputs exists.

It is intended that this research will make a useful contribution to the work that the Social Exclusion Task Force is undertaking on families at risk as well as the socially excluded adults Public Service Agreement. It will do this by adding to the knowledge base of existing service provision for vulnerable families and adults. On completion, we are intending to share the project outputs with those who are interested through a written report and possibly an event. The next steps will depend on the initial findings, but consideration may be given to commissioning further work, for example on what constitutes good practice and how to share it.

If you or your colleagues are aware of the identity of any initiatives that would fit our brief, I should be grateful if you would contact our consultant with details by 5 p.m. on 28<sup>th</sup> May 2008. [details were included in the original letter sent out on 5 May]

I do hope you will assist us in this work. Across Great Britain are a number of really good examples of joined-up public funded service delivery to vulnerable groups. This mapping exercise is an important first step in capturing what models of provision are in place with a view to communicating them more widely and, hopefully, enabling 'what works' to be shared.
